OUTSTANDING CHARACTERS IN THE FIELD OF RELIGION

A. V. Timpany -- Pioneer missionary to India, who died in that land on February 19, 1885, after a few hours' illness of Asiatic Cholera. He was the son of Bartholomew John Timpany, whose family trekked from Pigby, N. S., to settle in the Nova Scotia St. district of Bayham and Malahide. His mother was the daughter of Elisha McConnel and lived on the farm that is now the McConnel Nurseries.

Being a missionary was an early ambition of A. V. Timpany. At seven years of age he planted an apple tree on his father's farm telling his father that it was to be a missionary tree. It certainly was, for when Mr. Timpany went to India, his father picked and shipped the fruit of that tree to India each year.

Mr. McKillop attended school and Sunday School in Calton. He was reared in the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Kennedy, residents

of this community.
Mrs.McKillop is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Will McKibbon.
