ORIGIN OF CAMP ON ON DAGA.

Camp On endage is si tuated a mile north of Calton on the Stanley James farm.

It originated in 1961 when Mr. James, a member of Calten Baptist Church offered this pretty vally by the Big Otter Creek, as a free campsite for use by the Baptist Association of Elgin. The creek had an excellent swimming hele and gas, hydro and pure drinking water utilities were available close by, so the effer was gratefully accepted.

The campsite comprises a 6 acre grassy field enclosed on the south east side by a levely wooded hill; it is bounded on the north by the Big Otter Creek and a public road borders the west side.

Many willing workers gave volunteer labor and the first year a main building or "Longhouse) was built. In the two succeeding years three sleeping cabins have been added. An additional cabin is planned for construction this year. A number of tents have also been in service each summer.

The camp is open to young people from the 16 Baptist churches in the county as well as to children from other churches.

Sunday evening church service is held in the Lengheuse just prior to opening the camp for the summer. Last year 250 attended this service. Then a young People's Week End is held during the July I heliday period. The first week in July is for children raging from 9-11 years. Last year ever 40 attended. The second week of July elder children from 12-15 enjoy the activities.

The camp program consists of Vesper services held every evening and devotional periods held every afternoon. Then of course there are camp-lire stories, hikes, cook-outs, swimming lessons, games and crafts and the children love them. An efficient voluntary staff of counsellors, teachers and cooks serve faithfully each week. Several retired missionaries have given valuable help.

Other groups enjoy this levely camp through out the summer. Among these have been two groups of cubsefrem St. Thomas, a troupe of Boy Scouts, Sunrise Baptist teenagers, and the Calvinst Club for boys and girts, all from London. Some Elgin Regiment soldiers have had a couple of week-ends there. Last fall thirty men patients from the Ontario Mental Hospital came for a week. This last mentioned outing proved so satisfactory and beneficial that camp directors have already booked a reservation from the O.M.H. for this year.

P.S. The name of this camp was later changed to Clba Broca.

John Kennedy To Mark 100th Birthday

AYLMER — The town's oldest resident, John Kennedy, of 41 Victoria Street, will probably start celebrations of his 100th birthday tomorrow — as he begins most days — with a brisk walk around the block.

Mr. Kennedy was married to Minnie Wilson on Christmas Day 1893. She died some years ago.

Born in Bayham Township he was raised at Maple Grove near Eden.

With members of his family, Mr. Kennedy will welcome guests at his home tomorrow afternoon. To be with him at the reception are daughters Mrs. Harold Holditch and Mrs. Russell McKibbin, both of Aylmer; Mrs. Will McKibbin, of Springfield; Mrs. Earl Simons, of RR 4, Aylmer and one son, Robert Kennedy, of Calton.

In quite good health, Mr Kennedy believes in clean living and attaining plenty of sleep. He regularly attends church and Sunday School at the Aylmer Baptist Church and sometimes evening service.

A retired farmer, he worked land in the Calton area for more than 60 years and moved to Aylmer when he was 89. He is a former member of the Masonic lodge at Tillsonburg, served on the Calton Public School Board and was a deacon at the Calton Baptist Church.

CURRENT EVENTS, 1965

During the summer and fall of 1965, the road known as concession 3 of Malahide was torn up between Calton and Mt. Salem. Road was widened and built up high in readyness to be surfaced next season. Many trees were taken out.

1965 tobacco brought the highest price ever, some being sold for over \$1.00 per lb.

Direct long distance dialing came into effect here on October 17, 1965.

Power disturbance causing blackout affecting 30 million people - November 9, 1965.

CURRENT EVENTS, 1966

During August the road between Calton and M t. Salem was finished by hard top with white markings down the centre. The cost of this road was \$160,000. This includes all work done on it such as grading it up, culverts, etc., plus paving.

On November 17th Calton General store changed hands. Glen Willson bought it from Robert Kennedy.

CURRENT EVENTS, 1967

Quite a number from these parts visited Expo '67 (The World's Fair) in Montreal.

Several persons in this community planted Centennial trees. The Red Almy was spoken of as the Centennial tree.

As a Centennial project, the interior of the Community Hall was decorated.

CURRENT EVENTS, 1968

The worst ice storm in years took place in J anuary. Owing to hydro failure and ice on wires, many people were without heat and light and telephone for days. Due to this storm, London was declared a disaster area.

Cars were stranded and buried in snow. Some farm houses took in as many as 60 and 70 persons. Snowmobiles played a very important part in relieving the situation.
