church site. It was decided to accept the offer of Mr. Charles Laister of Tillsonburg for \$125 cash for the building subject to the consent of the Elgin Presbytery. The tender of Earl Greer for the church site at \$42 was accepted. A committee was appointed to dispose of the furnishings of the interior of the church. This was done by holding an auction at the church. The proceeds of the church, property and furnishings was to be used for the improvement of church property on the other appointments of the former Corinth charge. Soon the dismanteling and tearing down of the church began and the change of times went on, but the memories of the old church are cherisished in the hearts of all who had attended there.

CORINTH UNITED CHURCH

The earliest records tell there were two Methodist Churches in Corinth. One was the Moss Church located at the end of the 10th concession on the north side of the road. This was known as the Benson Chapel or Moss Church. The exact date this was built is not known. They purchased the land for the Firby Cemetry from Thomas Firby in 1855. Tombstones there show there were burials as early as 1850. In 1850, this church was part of the Malahide circuit, including Vienna and Straffordville. The ministers in charge of this circuit were Samuel Philp and John English and in 1851 George Kennedy and Thomas Peacock.

The trustees of the Benson Chapel in 1855 were Hiram Moss, Joseph Firby, George Silverthorn, William Kipp Jr., John Medcalf, Samuel McKenney and Thomas Cascadden.

This was a Wesleyan Methodist Church.

In 1884 the Methodist Church of Canada was formed uniting the Primitive Methodist, the Methodist Episcopal and the Bible Christian Churches. Therefore it is presumed that when the present United Church in the village was built in 1880 that the Moss Church then was not used any more. The old church then was moved south and became the manufacturing room for the Cheese Factory north of the Firby Cemetry. When the factory was no longer used it was torn down by a carpenter from Brownsville.

In 1873 contributors to the Missionary Fund were the Freeman family, R. Firby, John Hardwick, Thomas Cascadden, Alberty McKinney, and Miss Moss.

In 1874 about the same names appear, but in 1875 many of the same names are listed under Corinth, then a part of the Brownsville charge. The Church Archives state that the Brownsville charge included Brownsville, Bayham, McDowells, Culloden and Dereham Centre.

In 1877 this Moss Church was part of the Vienna and Straffordville circuit. These names have been recorded as donors to the Missionary Fund in that year-

The other early church in Corinth was just north of the four corners known as Jones Corners and was on the east side of the road. It was a red brick building and

first was a church of the Christian Brethern and later Methodist Epis-copal.

It is presumed that this church and the Moss Church joined together when the United Church was built in 1880 on the present sight. No information has been obtained about the building of this church. This same Methodist Episcopal church building north of the village was used as a hall for many years after being closed, and, on occassions was also used for holding court cases in this area. Court sessions were held annually in the fall. The first Crown Attorney was A. McKrimmon and the first Judge, Squire Hunt followed by Mr. Maxwell. They came out from St. Thomas in the morning on the train. This building was torn down by Charles Laister of Tillsonburg around 1935.

After Corinth was taken of the Brownsville charge it was put on a circuit with North Bayham and North Hall. The ministers on this charge from 1896 to 1925 were:

The North Hall church was closed in 1935 and and Corinth was then put on the Richmond circuit including North Bayham, Richmond, Sommers Corners, and Fairview. In 1934, the church shed at North Hall was torn down and added to the Corinth shed. The Corinth shed was sold in the year 19 - 19 . Reverend Leslie was minister on the charge at the time of this change of circuit. The ministers on the Richmond charge from 1934 to 1964 were:

In the spring of 1963 it was decided to build a fellowship room on the back of the church to be used for Sunday School rooms, choir practise and meeting place for various church organizations. Rev. K. B. Passmore was the minister. Sam Eicher laid the brick but most of the other work was done by volunteer labor. The members of the United Church Women did the painting. Cupboards in the kitchen were built by Mr. Passmore, assisted by Clifford Smith. Much of the kitchen equipment was donated by interested people. A piano was donated by Mrs. M. Holebrook. This building provided 700 square feet of floor space. This

building was dedicated on October7,1963. in honor of Rev. and Mrs. J. N. Gould, Aylmer who served as pastor on the charge from 1944 to 1955. The Building was named The Gould Fellowship Hall. Guest speaker at this service was Rev. Anne P. Graham of London and the dedication service was in charge of Rev. L. C. Coates, St. Thomas, chairman of the Elgin Presbytery.

Changes in the circuit again became inevitable and on June 28, 1964, a combined service of the five churches on the charge was held outdoors at Richmond. This service marked two changes:-


-Corinth was changed to the Spring-field Circuit made up of Spring-field, North Bayham, and Corinth.

-this was the final service of this old circuit conducted by Rev. K. B. Passmore, who was to leave to take a church in London.

The Parsonage had to be listed for sale, and on July 3, and auction was held of


the furnishings of the parsonage. The parsonage was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Leo Smith, Corinth.
