THE BALL FAMILY HISTORY.

(Copied from the Guysboro Church) (Centennial Report)

Mr. Chas. Ball Sr. who signed the Guysboro Church deed in 1860 was born in Plymouth in 1802. He came to Canada in a sailing vessel taking four months to make the trip. He later came to live on Lot 140 North of Talbot Road. He donated the land for the site of the Orange Hall at Guysboro, from his farm.

Mr. Ball raised a family of ten children, many of whose descendants are still in this p

pa rt of Ontario, a valuable asset to our country.

He died in 1898 in his 97th year. He and his wife Caroline Serpell Ball are buried in the

Guysboro Cemetery.

His descendants are quite sure that both Mr. and Mrs. Ball Sr. were Anglicans. If so, it surely shows an ecumenical spirit for him to have assisted in building a community church

for the Methodists who celebrated their 100th Anniversary Dec. 19, 1964.

Benjamin Haigh was sent from England by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the New Connextion as a travelling preacher and was the first minister of whom there is any written record. His name is on the Deed of Land for the present church property also John Scruton Andrew H. House, Charles Ball and Joseph Hobbs. Witnesses John Clifford and Henry Wilkinson.

To make it legal the land was bought for \$1.00 from Claudius Coan from their farm Lot 137

South of Talbot Road in Houghton Township.

About 1911 Guysboro was on a five-point charge with Maple Grove, Eden, Straffordville and North Hall. Once each month a local preacher supplied for a Sunday service. Some of these were: Mr. Isaac Hogarth and Mr. Robt. Woulds of Tillsonburg also Mr. Levi J. Hatch, Maple Grove.

The first Ball ancestors that first settled in Canada were M r. and Mrs Charles Ball. Charles was born near Plym outh, Cornwall in England in England in 1802., and died 1898 and buried in Guysboro Cemetery. His wife, Caroline Serpell, was born Sept. 16 1814 and died 1894 and is buried in Guysboro cemetery. Caroline was the daughter of John and Christine Coad Serfell of Lisgar, Cornwall, England. Mr. Serfell being unsucces ful came to N.Y. in July 1833 on the sailing ship "Roscoe", Captain Rogers at the helm for a fare of 20 guineas. Christine was killed (next day?) by a horse-rawn N. Y. street car. C harles Ball who evid ntly was acquainted with with Caroline, came to N. Y. in 1834 aft & 4 months at sea. He was supposed to have come out as a companion to a young man who failed to make the trip. Met Caroline. Married her in same year but kept the wedding a secret - she was disinherited. A farm in Virginia a baking business in Rochester, N. Y. and 1846 came to Brantford in Upper Canada. December 2, 1850 bought farm at Guysboro (Beaver Dam Farm) lot 140 Houghton Township Concession 1 North Talbot Road. Of interest June 15, 1903 sold for one dollar the south east corner to the Orange Lodge (Geo. Marchall James June 15, 1903 sold for one dollar the south east corner to the Orange Lodge (Geo. Marchall, James Sauders, Norman Dick, J. Priddle, Albert Swinn).

Caroline was a bonnet-maker by trade, she had learned the medical value of herbs from the

Indians and used this in helping as a mid-wife (she acted as mid-wife when C.C. Travis was born).

Robert Sergell Ball - the sixth child - b. July 27, 1846 at Brantford d. March 7, 1918 at Straffordville and was buried at Guysboro. He married Chloeann Ostrander daughter of Jacob Ostrander.

Chleeann was b. June 12, 1858 and d. Sept. 13 1941 and buried at Guysboro. There were nine children

Ball Plantation (gets its name from tradition) given by Cecil Ball Charles Ball Sr. Worshipful Grand Master of Orange Lodge - 1862, 1871, 1879, 1882; Thomas Ball in 1913; George Ball in 1915 Orange Lodges - Guysboro LOL No. 556 - May 23, 24 - 1954

The present house was built in 1884 and the barn was built in 1890. The first well at present house location about 1885 (where front yard is now (March 27, 1966) Water was on

tap in house, 1950. Electricity was installed in 1936.
The year that the telephone was installed is unknown but the Bayham and Malahide Telephone Co. was the line. The house was renovated in 1964 with basement, furnace and new kitchen.

There have been no fires.

The old barn was a hip-roofed barn and up until 1956 was used for general farming. Dates of barns, 1850 and 1890 - (20 ft. x 30 ft.) 1956 - built into a tobacco farm - by "Ball Planatation" sizes 32 ft. x 60 ft; 18 ft. x 24 ft.; 8 kilns, 150 ft. green house

Tobacco is grown now as well as corn, wheat and rye for ploughing under the farm has 48 acres rights and the outstanding yield was in 1965 with an average of \$1277. per acre. The orchards of apples, peaches, cherries etc. have since been cut down. The present acreage of the Plantation is 177 acres.

March 14, 1906 - Wedding of Ball - McKim

The residence of Mr. Robert McKim, North Road, Houghton was the scene of a very pretty wedding on Wednesday of this week, when his only daughter Bertha, was united in marriage to Mr. Carmon Ball third son of Robert Ball of Bayham. The ceremony, which was performed by Rev. A. W. Dever (?) of Straffordville, in the presence of a number of immediate relatives of the happy couple, took place under an evergreen arch. Attired in a beautiful dress of white wool tafette, trimmed with lace, the bride entered the room; leaning on the arm of her father. The wedding march was played by Mrs. Percy Spence of Brantford. The bridesmaid was Miss Sophia Ball and the groom was supported by Mr. Chas. McKim.

After the ceremony the guests sat down to a sumptous repast. In the afternoon, the happy couple left for Courtland, where they took the train for eastern points.

Mr. and Mrs. Ball will spend a few weeks with relatives here, after which they will go to reside in Wisconsin, where Mr. Ball has secured a good position as cheesemaker. The best wishes of the neighbourhood go with them.

CLINTON D. KENNEDY.

Clinton Dwight Kennedy is the youngest son of Archibald Kennedy and Laura Ann Phelps.

His birthdate., May 13, 1902.

Earliest records in their possession reveal that a tract of land approximately 86 acres was purchased from Howard Lammond & wife who gave a grant to Nelson D. Forest for the sum of \$4500.00. Apparently this land changed hands back to Mr. Howard Lammond and finally into the possession of Mr. Nathan Gray from whom in Nov. 1939Mr. Clinton Kennedy purchased one-fifth of an acre from the N.2 of Lot 23 in the 8th Con. of Bayham?

He began building a one-storey frame house which he finished Jan. 25th 1940 and moved his wife and family in. Electricity was connected the following spring and a telephone installed a few years later. Taxes which were \$14.00 per year on this property at first, have

increased to \$42.00 in 1960.

He was married to Alice Annebelle French, youngest daughter of George French and Mary Ostrander. Her birthdate was May 16, 1908.

To this marriage were born three children viz:

James 1928. who died in infancy. (2 weeks)

Grace Marilyn.... born July 21, 1935.

Mrs. Alice Annebelle Kennedy passed away Jan. 16, 1938.

Mr. Kennedy married Olive M. Fletcher (nee-Denwoodie) Nov. 22, 1952.

JAMES HOUSE.

About the year 1812, Joseph DeFields and James Gibbons built their log habitations on Talbot Street (then a blazed path through the woods) between the two Otter Creeks.

In the south of the Twp. of Bayham, at the mouth of the Little Otter, were Hollowood,

Hutchinson and Thomas Edison.

In 1816, James House came from Ancaster and settled south of Talbot Street in the East part of the township; his was the only house at this time between the Street and the Lake Shore Settlement.

Mr. House was one of the surviving veterans of the War of 1812. He drew his pension from the Government at the hands of Col. McPherson in the Town Hall, St. Thomas, October 1875.

He thought Nicholas Phillips and Joseph Marsaw would make good settlers and he moved them with an ox-team from Ancaster in 1817. Mrs. Sherriff Garnham, the wife of the enterprising and hospitable proprietor off Garnham's Mills is a daughter of Nicholas Phillips.

Then, a research of the "Joseph House Family Record" reveals that:James was the fifth child of Joseph House and Rebecca Horning of Ancaster, and was the father
of Charles, James Colbourn(Cobe) Mrs. Stephen Pressey and John House, a lumber dealer of
Courtland who is succeeded by his son Lloyd in the same business. (1966)
The family plot is in the Guysboro Cemetery.
