Edna M. Harrison was born in Dereham Township in 1896, east of Salford. She started school after Easter at Zenda, quite a little walk but her brother, Archie, was going so she had company. It was a one-roomed school. Three of the students including Edna sat on a bench up against the wall for awhile. She doesn't remember if her feet touched the floor or not.

The following spring the family moved to another farm, one mile south of Salford. She finished her Public School education at Salford, a two-roomed school, and passed her entrance exam in 1910.

She then attended Ingersoll Collegiate, drove a horse and buggy - six miles to Collegiate. In June 1914, she passed Lower School Examination for entrance into Normal. That was the first year they had to try that. She was the only one in the class that passed. She got a 10 dollar gold piece at Commencement.

She went to London Normal in 1917-1918, and got her Interim Second Class Certificate. 1918 - that was the year that she heard about her only brother Archie being killed in Action in November 10th- 12th, 1917.

In Sept, 1918, she supplied three months at No. 9, West Oxford. Jan. 3 - June 30, 1919 Union S.S. No. 3 & 19, South Dumfries and Brantford, Brant County.

In Sept., 1919 - June 30, 1921, she taught at No. 18, Eden, Bayham township, Elgin County. She got small pox while there and took it home to all her family. Her sister got married in June, and she stayed home for six months.

Then she went to S.S. No. 2 South Easthope, Brant County, for a period of one and a half years until 1923.

In Sept. 19, 1923, she married Ernest Scanlan and ceased teaching. At that time you didn't teach school after you married.
