

COPY OF LETTER DATED Aug. 20th, 1900 from Mr. Milton Inman of Eden.
1900
Eden Aug. 20th

To whom it may concern -

This is to certify that Miss Agnes Healey taught the Junior department of Eden P.S. for three years and gave up the school to attend school at Woodstock with the intention of securing a certificate to teach again her 3rd class having expired.

Miss Healey had charge of Eden school until Jan 1st 1900 leaving this place with the intention of fitting herself to pass the examination which she just passed. The Board of Trustees met and agreed to wait as long as possible with the intention of re-engaging her should she be successful in passing her examination.

Owing to lateness of reports of examinations and believing it impossible for her to pass her examination in such limited time we decided to engage a teacher one week before school began. The enclosed reference speaks for itself. By writting (sic) Mr. J. D. Eichenberg, Eden, Ont. or M.J. Inman, Vienna, you may secure further reference if required, they being former trustees and two of the trustees who first engaged Miss Healey.

EX-PUPILS HONOR RETIRING PRINCIPAL

Beneath sunny skies, an outdoor ceremony was held on the school grounds at Straffordville, Tuesday to mark the retirement of Everett McCurdy, principal at Bayham-Area Public School.

Over 200 visitors signed the register, and over 300 students were in attendance during part of the program.

Mr. McCurdy, who has been in the teaching profession 40 years, taught 8,000 days, losing only 10 days due to illness.

He began his career September, 1920, and for a year taught at Jacksonburg, in Houghton Township. The following year he was at S.S. No. 4, Southwold (River Road School).

For three years from September, 1922, to June 1925, he taught at S.S. No. 18, Bayham (Eden village school, and for $6\frac{1}{2}$ years, from September, 1925, to December, 1931, was behindthe desk at S.S. No. 12, Dereham (Brownsville school), Miss Opal Wilson accompanied him when he applied for the position at the school and three years later on Aug. 13, 1928, they were married.

Then, Mr. McCurdy took a position at Simcoe Public School, for a year and a half from January, 1932 to June, 1933. For nine years after, from Sept. 1933, to June, 1942 he taught at West Lorne. While a resident there, he was a Sunday School teacherin the Baptist Church and president of the Horticultural Society for several years.

In Sept. 1942, he started to teach at S.S. No. 8, Woolwich, St. Jacobs, where he stayed until June 1943. He returned to Eden in Sept. 1943, and taught school in the village until Mar. 1951. His wife, Mrs. Opal McCurdy, began teaching music in 1938.

In Mar., 1951, when the Bayham Area School opened, Mr. McCurdy took the principal-ship, and kept that position until June of this year, when he retired from the teaching profession.

Born on Sept. 18, 1898, in a little farm home on the Second Concession of Bayham he was the first son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard McCurdy. On Aug. 13, 1928, he married the former Opal Wilson, daughter of the late Edgar Wilson and Mrs. Florence Cridland of St. Thomas, who was his pupil in the ninth grade when he taught at Eden.

They had one son, Ronald, who is now a successful teacher in Toronto, and have

three grandchildren. Mrs. Pat Nichols of London, and Gordon Cull of Straffordville niete and nephew grew up in their home and became a part of the family, and the two were among those present at the occasion.

He began his education at Otter Valley school, and in his first year in high school at Vienna, in the fall of 1914, he contracted the dreaded disease, polio, then very rare and was left badly crippled, with his education just nicely begun.

During the following high school years he was often drawn to school on a home-made sleigh. In spite of his handicap, he successfully passed his grades and the fall of 1918 found him at Teachers'College, London. This year was also passed successfully in spite of tedious ascending and descending of so many staircases.

The above is part of an address presented in the form of "This is your Life", and read by Art Martyn of Straffordville.

Cecil Ball, of Eden presided as chairman, and among presentations to Mr. McCurdy were a gift from the school pupils, presented by Linda Francia; a book of letters by Mrs. Lawrence Mitchell of R.R. # 1, Straffordville; a watch and a purse of money from friends and members of the Home and School Association, made by Bud Thurston of Straffordville; and an honorary year's paid up membership in the Lions Club, presented by Lion George Cameron of Straffordville.

Mrs. E. McCurdy was presented with a gift and arm bouquet of roses from the Home and School Association, the presentation made by Mrs. Rose Knowles, past president of the Association.

Mrs. Lawrence Mitchell read excepts from letters received from the former pupils, staff and board members prior to presenting the book of letters. A number of visitors stood up and gave comments, among them Rev. D.M. Stinson, minister of the United Church, Straffordville.

Musical numbers were provided by George Jenkins, who played apiano solo; Paul Langohr, who played an accordion number and Don Nickerson who performed on his Violin. Grant Mitchell, chairman of the school board, in his remarks paid tribute to the honored guest for his services to the board, and Dewey Vallee gave a Board report, that outlined the activities of the group since its inception in 1946.

Charles Davis, assistant principal, read a letter from Mr. McCall, assistant inspector, who wrote his regrets at not being able to attend also those of the inspector, Earl Rawlings, who is hospitalized. Mr. McCurdy addressed the crowd briefly and Rev. P.D. Augustine pronounced the benediction.

Everett McCurdy was Principal of Eden school, S.S. # 18 for the school years of 1922 - 1925 inclusive.

He returned to Eden in 1943 and was Principal until 1946 there. He was transferred to the Straffordville School as Principal to an eight room school just recently built there. He held an Elementary Certificate in Agriculture and Horticulture, Elementary Course in Manual Training and also a Permanent Certificate First Class.

His wife, Mrs. Everett McCurdy supervised Music in Eden School and area schools, including Straffordville, for seventeen years. Summer courses were taken in Toronto.
