









Grandfather Anderson Healy

Born at Grenville, Nova Scotia, on January 17, 1819, and was married on December 15, 1842, to Mary Delamere, (born at Armagh, Ireland, December 12, 1824 and crossed over from Ireland to Saint John, New Brunswick and thence to Nova Scotia with her parents in 1830.)

After their marriage they lived at Grenville, N.S. for 14 years. They came to Upper Canada in 1857, and lived at Springford, Ontario, Township of S. Norwich, County of Oxford; then bought a farm in Dereham Township, County of Oxford, where they lived for 19 years; then moved to Township of Dawn, County of Lambton, in 1878, where Grandfather died in 1884, May 2. (Grandmother Mary Healy died September 9, 1896.)

Andrew Heath of England married first ? second Hannah widow of ? Clark.

On Feb. 4, 1699 he bought 420 acres near the Falls of the Delaware now Trenton N.J. near Trenton Junction. It was then Hopewell township, Burlington County, afterward Hunterdon County, Now in Ewing township Merco. N.J.

Occupation. He was a farmer, a ferryman, and interpreter to the Indians. The County Court also met at his house. will dated Jan. 3, 1716., buried in Church burial ground near his home on land now owned by Co. Breeze of Trenton.

In the south of the township of Bayham, at the mouth of the Little Otter, were Hollowood, Hutchinson and Thomas Edison.

In 1816, James House came from Ancaster and settled south of Talbot Street in the East part of the township. His was the only house at this time between the Street and the Lake Shore Settlement.

Mr. House was one of the surviving veterans of the War of 1812. He drew his pension from the Government at the hands of Col. McPherson in the Town Hall, St. Thomas, Oct. 1875.

He thought Nicholas Phillips and Joseph Marsaw would make good settlers and he moved them with an ox-team from Ancaster in 1817. Mrs. Sheriff Garnham, the wife of the enterprising and hospitable proprietor of Garnham's Mills is a daughter of Nicholas Phillips.

Then a research of the "Joseph House Family Record" reveals that

James House was the fifth child of Joseph House and Bebecca Horning of Ancaster, and was the father of Charles, James Colbourn (Cobe), Mrs. Stephen Pressey and John House, a lumber dealer of Courtland who is succeeded by his son, Lloyd in the same busines. (1966)

The family plot is in the Guysboro cemetery.
