When John Inman was 18, his father and three brothers and the families of all four said farewell to the relatives, the Lorrimers and Millenthorpes nearNaseborough, Yorkshire, and about 1839 sailed for Canada taking seven weeks on the seas. They settled four miles from Dunnville in what was known as the Inman settlement. Shortly after, an Inman line of Steamships (ran by Grandfather's cousin) was plying the Atlantic. This line donated free wedding trips for Canadian cousins to England until its amalgamation with the Allan Line.

At Dunnville John Inman married Julia Montgomery, their six children being born in the Inman settlement. Mary, who was born when they moved away, remembered the scows collecting farm produce along the Welland Canal feeder which ran near their home. Because of the material locality the family mooved west to Blenheim. Two years of the very heavy soil there satis fied Mr. Inman who then tried a year 'on shares' at Morpeth. The Ridge running between Morpeth and Ridgetown grew beautiful fruit, and was especially adapted to grapes for which there was then little enough market. Though Practically everybody had his domestic winepress - (hence the wine kegs later on in the Eden farm cellar) one night at Morpeth Mr. Inman came home without his supper from threshing. "Half the men drunk", he said in disgust. "No place here to bring up boys." After which came a winter at Talbotville; then the purchase of the homestead one mile east of Eden, where Mary and her brothers spent their lively school days. Mary went on to Aylmer High School and herself taught in Eden. Later, she married Edwin Bowes a schoolteacher. They settled first on a farm at Maple Greove and eventually moved to Ingersoll.

Credit to brothers

Mrs. Bowes considers that a major part of the training which prepared her for her future active life was due to her having had to fend for herself among five prank-loving brothers. She has many lively stories for her grandchildren. One, of the time when their parents went to Dunnville, the older boys were for taking the boat out on the "Feeder" - a thing they were strictly forbidden to do, unless under supervision.

Little Mary, rebellious at being ordered to remain on the dock, ended the dispute by taking a flying leap for the boat. "Try a thing once", was always her motto. Oh, those scared boys, as they fished her out of the canal, righted the upset boat and carried her dripping to the house.

"Quick decision was one thing life with my mischievous brothers taught me I was grown up when our new school at Eden was completed. One Saturday afternoon, when father and mother were off to Tillsonburg, with my dresses over one arm, and my good set of hoops on the other, I was moving my ward-robe over to my new closet. When the sight of my big brothers lounging in the sun on the wood-pile, heads up with interest, brought my senses to quick alert. Patter.! Patter.! In a split second I swung sideways in the nick of time to escape an onslaught from behind by our billy goat! The goat charged, instead straight through my good stout hoops. Oh, those next 15 minutes before Billy, bellowing and stamping in terror, could free himself from those entangling wires, and gallop to the safety of the barn: "You might have maimed your sister for life." father rebuked the boys sternly that night.

"Aw," said Fred. "We knew Mary'd come out all right. She always does?"
"Get out your pocket-books," commanded father, "and pay for damages."
Wesley, who was teaching at Rainham Centre, peeled a bill off his little roll, and handed it to me. "Twas well worth it! Never have I had such fun for my money." He was still whooping with laughter. Those scamps.

Aung Mary Inman Bowes' son moved to Rainy River District. Three of four of his sons are at Grand Prairie, Peace River - in newspaper and radio work. Her brotherswere Will. Fred - Methodist church, lived on Lorne Altan farm (evidently sold out to John Alton Apr. 15, 1907. Then it went to Lorne Alton and now run by Max Alton).

Wesly(died young), Milton and Herbert. Milton was J. Clarence Inman's father.

Herbert - never married (he lived between Ed Wilson & Nickerson.)
(Note: Walter McDowell helped him drive cattle home - he never paid.
He went to Lawyer Dower on a lawsuit over several 100 ft. of lumber.)

Mr. John Inman

The funeral of the late John Inman took place at his home at Eden, Elgin County, Ontario, on Sunday Aug. 30, The very large number of old friends and neighbours present being an indication of the esteem and respect in which he was held by them.

His illness was of short duration, only about 24 hours, the disease being acute inflammation. The subject of this short sketch was born in Yorkshire, England, on Apr. 18, 1827. After forty-one years of happy wedded life he passed away to that spirit land, leaving a sorrowing wife, four sons and one daughter.

The eldest son, William is principal of the Milton Model School; Wilfred, the second son lives on the farm adjoining his father's; Milton the third son, lives in Eden, one mile from the homestead, and Herbert the youngest son, works his father's farm as well as his own near by; the only daughter, Mary, is married to Mr. E. Bowes, and lives three or four miles distant.

Deceased came with his parents to Canada when in his 17th year, and settled on a farm near Dunnville, Haldimand county. On the death of his parents he remained on the homestead, marrying Miss Julia Montgomery of Rainham. Some 24 years ago he moved to Kent county; finally settling in this place where he has lived for nearly 22 years. He has been a consistent member of the Methodist church since 1864, being a class leader in the Eden church also a member of the official board. He will be remembered as a faithful husband, kind and indulgent father, and as one who led a life that others could see that he was serving that one whom he placed such confidence in at death.

A short time before he passed away he told his sorrowing wife and son who stood near that he did not think an earthly physician could cure his disease but that Jesus was his all, that He was his only strength. Thus, peacefully, calmly, trustfully he passed over to that better land where we too may join him if we are true to our God and to ourselves. The death of a true Christian is one of peace and happiness.

Note: The Inmans were from Naseborough, Yorkshire and sailed for Canada in 1839.
