


She was educated at West Lorne and Sutton

Fermanagh Farm.

On the corner of Shackleton Street and the Canal side road, about midway between Dutton and Lona Slitias is the two hundred acre farm, the home of Mr and Mrs. Harold C. Carrall. The back 100 acres faces on Stratton Street.

Mr. Casey was the first owner of the 100 acre block on which he built the fine home and buildings. That was in 1850. For many years the farm was known as the Lodge farm. Mr. John Lodge made bricks and tile on this farm. The bricks for the foundation of the house was made here.

Before the turn of the Century Mr. Lodge sold the farm to Mr and Mrs. Robert Hill.

It was they who built the present red brick house in 1902. It is reported to have cost \$4500 to build it. It is well built and has a slate roof. A back room was installed at that time which is still the same and in use (1967)

In 1934 Kern sold the farm to Duncan Leitch of Cowal. For some years no one lived in the house.

In 1945 Mr. David Carroll bought this 100 acres from Duncan Leitch and moved there in March 1945 from the Cowal Community.

The next year in 1946 Mr. Carroll bought the hundred back of the first hundred from Mr. Alec Buchanan. Previous owners of this farm were - Mr. Deew, followed by Mr. McLean, Mr. McPhail, Messrs Peter and Pat. Campbell and then Alec Buchanan.

The farm was named Gernanagh after the birth place of Mr. David Carroll's father in Northern Ireland.

The Carrolls have two children. Shirley the daughter is Mrs Lynn Lashbrook, publisher of the West Lorne Paper. Robert Donald is married to Margie McTear of Cowal. They have three children Robert, Sheila and Nancy.

The Milligan farm, now in 1967 a Century farm is situated on Shablon Street and along the Canal road. Mr and Mrs Harry Milligan own the farm and are the fourth generation. The grandfather of Harry Milligan was born in Nova Scotia September 14, 1832. and came as a child with his parents and settled on this farm which was tree covered and Shablon was only a blazed trail. Mr Judson Milligan was one of a family of ten. He worked on the township for forty-five years, and saw many changes in the threshing business in that time. He was councillor for the township for ten years and filled the office of Deputy Reade. His family consisted of eight daughters and three sons. One son, Arthur Milligan took over the farm on the death of his father in 1917. Mr Arthur Milligan has a family of four sons, one daughter. Mrs Leticia Milligan widow of Arthur lived her life on this farm and died in 1966. Harry Milligan and his wife Catharine now reside there in 1967.

Milligan Farm

Alexander Milligan from Ayrshire, Scotland came to Canada and settled in Nova Scotia. He married Mary Dules, a native of Nova Scotia. Their family consisted of seven children - Fannie, Margaret, Mary, Hannah, Judson, Edward and Nancy.

He came to Dunwich Township in 1843 and settled on the former farm, Shackleton Street, consisted of 100 acres, Lot 24 Concession A S.W. of A. Mr. Alex Milligan died in March 1873. His son Judson carried on. He married Hannah Griffin, a Dunwich girl in 1852. Their family consisted of eleven children, eight daughters and three sons. Cyst, Lott, Dell, Chris, Liza, Rose, Fannie, Hannah, Mack, George and Arthur Judson.

Mr. Judson Milligan had been engaged in farming and thrashing for years, and also was a Township councillor for seven years. He was elected in 1874. He was engaged in thrashing for 31 years and had never met with an accident. He took a stroke and died in 1917. His wife Hannah was deprived of her eyesight for seven years. She died in her 98th year in 1930.


Mr. Arthur J. Milligan, the son, continued farming. He and his brother George thrashed for years with a steam engine. He married Lalia Louise Hutton in 1902. They had a family of four boys and two girls (one deceased). Ray, Mack, George, Harry and Ada. Mr. Arthur Milligan died August 6, 1951; Mrs. Lalia Milligan died October 4, 1966. The youngest son Harry Milligan was now living and farming on the same farm. He married Catherine McIntyre in March 27, 1948.

The Milligan farm is a Century Farm from 1843. The first census was taken in 1861. Value of farm \$1100.00; value of implements was \$60.00. They had made 300 lbs of Maple Syrup; 440 lbs butter and had 5 barrels of pork (2 cent per barrel) at the residence at this time were 14 people, the family, hired help and folks who didn't have a home.
