At the completion of the 1962 - 63 term, the Board was faced with the problem of:--

- (1) Making repairs and improvements to the school to meet the Department of Health standards.
- (2) Hiring a qualified teacher willing to teach eight grades in a country school.

Since in all areas of the Province, the department of Education and Public School Inspectors encouraged closing the school in preparation for Central Schools of the future. at a Board meeting in June 1963 the Trustees agreed to purchase Education from the Springfield School Board for the 1963-64. term. On July 17. a Ratepayers meeting was called to decide on means of transportation, either to buy a bus or to hire a bus and driver. This meeting evoked considerable protest. Many of the ratepayers didn't favour closing the school and they opposed transporting the children, especially the lower grades, by bus. The board were instructed to meet again with the Springfield Board to discuss the possibility of breaking the contract.

They met on July 22nd. The Mapleton Board were informed that Springfield had already hired extra staff for the increased enrollment. It was decided to honour the original contract.

Mr. Jack Harrison of Aylmer was engaged to provide bus service.

At a Board meeting in February, a petition of 14 members was presented, asking that the school be re-opened in September When it was learned that the agreement with Springfield ran for 1964-1965, the petition was withdrawn and the decision to the Board be accepted.

During 1964 and 1965 county wide preparation was being made for aremachools and doing away with the little one room schools.

On November 10th, 1966 the Mapbeton School was sold to Ross Inch for the sum of \$550.00. The school bell and belfrey was sold to Eardley Finch for \$50.00.

The date on the deed of the school was 1872, making the building ninety thone years old., in 1963 when closed.

In 1926, the annual meeting on December 29th, it was moved by M.A.Claus and seconded by G.H. Taylor that the trustees hire a secretary-treas. outside the Trustees. Carried. This was the first time that the trustees ever hired a secretary-treasurer. Thus, at this annual meeting G. Herman Taylor was chosen as Sec. Treas. for 1927 with a salary of \$15.00 per year.

In November, 1926 a new stove and office supplies purchased for \$50.65. At the present time I (Lenora Free) haven't found the first book dating back to 1870 to 1891 (Nov. Book 111 dating back to 1928 to when the Mapleton School was closed on June 30th, 1963.

Mrs. William Orris formally owned the residence on the South West corner of Concession 11, Yarmouth and turned the front part into a store. Later, Mrs. Estelle Inch bought the property from her, turning it into a restaurant naming it "The Pioneer Coach Stop"

2. After, the squaring of the four Mapleton corners by the Department of Highways, Earl McKenzie tore down his old store.

We the undersigned, Trustees of S.S. No. 22 Yarmouth and part 4, bouth porchester in the Co. of Elgin, by virtue of the authority vested in us by the 8th clause of the 27th Section of the upper Canada Consolidated Common School Act have chosen Mifs Maggie Caughell who holds a First Clafs Grade B. Certificate of Qualification to be a Teacher in said School Section and we do hereby Contract with and employ such Teacher at the rate of Two-Hundred and Seventy Five Dollars per annum from and after here the day hereof; and we further bind and oblige ourselves and our succefsors in office faithfully to employ the powers in which we are legally invested by the said Act to collect and pay the said Teacher during the continuance of this agreement the sum for which we hereby become bound. The County and Legislature Grants to be paid over to the said Teacher, as soon as they are received by the Treasurer. remaining amount to be paid at the end of the year. And the said reacher hereby, Contracts with the Trustees herein named and binds herselffto teach and conduct the school in said s.S. according to the said school act and the regulations which we are in force under the authority. Also to teach in addition to the branches required by her Certificate of Qualification those, of Algebra and Geometry. This agreement shall continue in force one year of the date hereof. And shall include all lawfull holidays and vacations prescribed under the Authority of the said School Act.
