Plans are underway for the 85th anniversary of the Kingsmill-Mapleton branch which will be held on Thursday, February 6 at the Mapleton Church.


Dates to remember are October 22, Rally Social at

Welcome to the 85th Anniversary celebration of Kingsmill-Mapleton W.I. This branch was organized just 10 years after the first formal organization of a W.I. was made possible by Mr. Erland Lee and his wife Janet, along with the encouragement of Mrs. Adelaide Hoodless, February 19, 1897, at Stoney Creek, Ontario. The first branch was originally known as Stoney Creek W.I.; and later on May 9, 1978, by Ontario Regulation 352/78, the branch was renamed Stoney Creek Charter Women's Institute.

Regardless of race, creed or political beliefs all women are welcome to our meetings. Upon payment of a small yearly fee, a huge network opens up for that person, connecting her to District, County, Area, Provincial, National and world levels in 76 countries with more than 9 million women.

Since the Women's Institute is an organization for community action and personal growth, it encourages women to expand their outlook and learn to extend their influence as a motivating force in today's world.

- at our monthly meetings we collect Pennies for Friendship for the purpose of financing the operation of our ACWW. A major project for ACWW has been Clean Water For All. Did you know that 9 children out of 10 born will be born in 3rd world countries? The 1 child will consume 6 times the food of the 9 children in the 3rd world countries. We need to rethink and reshape society today or there will be no tomorrow.
- at National level, one recent project was to bring from Malaysia, to the Coady Institute in Nova Scotia, a candidate to study Community Development, and upon return to her country assist her people.
- in Ontario, FWIO has encouraged our members and the public to become involved in the 3R's Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Did you know that the Recycling Council of Ontario in 1991, granted their coveted award to FWIO as exemplifying the organization which has done the most to influence public action with regard to waste management and recycling? Congratulations!
- at Area, County, District and local levels many various Scholarships are awarded to students who are going to further their education.
 - Kingsmill-Mapleton Women's Institute members are pleased to present for you a glimpse at some of our activities and achievements to make this a better community in which to live.

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It was on February 9th, 1907, a branch of the Women's Institute was organized south of Mapleton at the home of Mr. & Mrs. John Brodie. It was irst known as the Mapleton W.I.The government speaker was Mrs. Isaac Pritchard of Aylmer, who demonstrated the proper way of changing a patient's bed. In the early years the sick were cared for in the homes and this special feature for the program was most appropriate. Just down the road at the school house the men folk were enjoying the Farmer's Institute.

Between 1907 and 1914 good meetings were held in the homes and good

works were carried out in the community. Flowers and food were sent to the

sick; quilts, clothing and fuel provided for the needy. Rapid growth and

extension of the territory resulted in a name change to Kingsmill-Mapleton

Women's Institute in 1912.

Early minutes were recorded in a proper Minute book. Listen now as the minutes of November 3, 1914 are read. Helen Widner

During the war years 1914-1918, our women were ready and willing 'to do their bit". The stirring patriotism and valiant courage of these women never lagged through all these trying years. They arose to the occasion then as women of all countries and ages have done in times of war. Our motto "For Home and Country" inspired the members to raise funds for war work through concerts, food sales and contributions. The Red Cross gave them an avenue to function systemically. By 1915 they were giving recipes for eggless, milkless & butterless cakes; special meetings were held to make up boxes of clothing for overseas, and other needed articles. (members begin to pack a box, towels, sheets, socks, handerchiefs, pillow slips, wash cloths, etc. A member asks how many articles have been packed? The reply to-day June 3, 1915 - we have 96 towels, 18 sheets, 4 pair socks, 35 handerchiefs, 1 pair pillow slips; the wash cloths will go in the August shipment, along with the soldier's outfit - be sure to put in the sleeping cap) Joyce Zavitz, Madeleine Jenkins & Agnes VanRooijen

In 1918 the Institute decided to accept the condition of the Red Cross ociety in establishing a canning centre for the preservation of surplus fruit and vegetables, chicken, etc. This huge task was carried out in Mr. Brodie's butter room.

Together with the untiring efforts of the committee and helpers the contribution of the Mapleton Canning Centre for overseas was: 6313 cans or 18,939 pounds of canned fruit, vegetables, chicken, etc. which was valued at \$4,081.60). Garden parties helped to increase the funds for the war effort. The first garden party was held in Kingsmill at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Walter Ashton, in 1916, August 11, and raised \$53.26.

After the war the people had to adjust themselves to peace and looked to the W.I. for self-improvement and inspiration. Thus it was in 1930 that the first Sunday Outdoor Service was held at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Arthur Moore. This service continued to be a yearly event at various locations, including one here in this church in 1950. The minutes record that in 1933 there was an attendance of 325 at the Service. Collection \$13.06; expenses included \$5.30 for programs, \$2.00 for the speaker and \$1.00 for trucking, leaving a balance of \$4.76. This particular time in history was during the Great Depression. Let us now hear what was happening in various parts of Canada:

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From 1934-1939, Miss Bessie McDermand was appointed Superintendent of Ontario Women's Institutes. She devoted her energies to raise the standards of home-making to the highest level. She looked upon home-making as a science and the Women's Institute as a means of furthering adult education in all that would assist women in the noble field of home-making. Local leaders training schools for members appointed as leaders were established, and the leaders in turn were to conduct study groups at the local level. Kingsmill-Mapleton Women's Institute always ready to improve in knowledge took advantage of this opportunity and sent leaders to the training school. The courses created a new joy in homemaking and a desire for further knowledge. The girls were also provided with a Junior Home Makers Club.

Then followed the 2nd World War. From the beginning of this terrible war, the Women's Institute arose to the occasion and never lagged for 6 long trying years. Gerry Jenken

(a member speaks about the sewing, knitting, sending food and comforts to the boys overseas. The Red Cross set up a branch in Aylmer and from there supplies could be picked up. To the credit of Kingsmill-Mapleton Women's Institute by the end of the war, the women had made 331 large quilts, 64 crib quilts, 314 articles of sewing, 1237 articles of knitting, 520 lbs of jam, marmalade.& jelly, along with 1000 lbs. of honey)

The tie to overseas remains to-day in our branch. In 1948, the Blackdown Women's Institute at Broad-Windsor, Dorset, England, was adopted and since then we have maintained a yearly contact with our English Women's Institute. A yearly calendar arrives just before Christmas and this calendar is brought to the meetings. On the back of each month a recipe can be found.
