Edna and Clarence Willsey were married fifty years ago September 8. Any differences they may have had over the years were never serious, says Mr.

"Being married is like running a business. Success just doesn't happen. You have to make it happen."

This is how Clarence Willsey sums up 50 years of marriage to his wife Edna.

Mr. and Mrs. Willsey, of RR 1 Belmont, were married 50 years ago today, September 8.

Of every 10 Canadian couples who say "I do," 4 of them eventually don't, according to Statistics Canada. The median length of a marriage in the country today is success, Mrs. Willsey ex-11 years.

The couple met a year before they were married. Mrs. Willsey (then Miss Charlton) had just moved with her family to Lyons, where Mr. Willsey was born and raised. He knew her younger sister from high school and had heard of Edna. His parents knew her parents.

One night when Mr. Willsey was out driving in the community, a 21-yearold Miss Charlton and her younger sister were at a crosswalk in front of his car. He slammed on the brakes to avoid hitting them.

A week later, he took her

member exactly what they did. "In those times, there was no money to spend. You'd go to town on a Saturday night, shop and drive around, but you wouldn't go out and do anything special," Mrs. Willsey said.

Both had dated previously, so this was not their first relationship. By the time Mr. Willsey had met Miss Charlton, he was ready to find a woman whose company he enjoyed and who shared his Christian values. "I met her, I took her out a few times, and I decided that was the one," said Mr. Willsey, who is a year older than his wife.

He proposed to Edna on a stormy winter night in 1943. She didn't say yes right away because, "I was brought up to understand that marriage is a serious step."

She told him she would have an answer for him the next time they spoke, which would be a few days later because the snow storm would make driving to her home difficult.

When she finally said yes, it was because, "he seemed to be a gentleman. I thought he loved me and that was important."

They began their life together on Mr. Willsey's family dairy farm east of Lyons, where they are still living. They bought the farm from his father in 1943.

There they raised eight children, which "kept me busy getting the food, and Edna busy preparing it," said Mr. Willsey, "that's why we didn't get into any real fights."

Mr. Willsey, 73, still works on his dairy farm. which his son Roy manages.

For over 35 years, Mr. Willsey has been in public office. He was an Elgin County Board of Education trustee for 12 years, a South Dorchester councillor for 13. and for the past 11 years has been Reeve of South Dorchester.

"She should have a medal for putting up with me," he said about his wife, "I've been away a lot and she had to raise the family."

"Oh, I don't know. You get your rewards. They're a pretty good family," she responded.

One thing that kept them from any serious disagreements was their refusal to hold grudges. "It's the worst thing you can do," said Mr. Willsey.

You also have to "be careful not to say things you wish you hadn't," Mrs. Willsey said, looking at her husband. "I wouldn't want to say or do anything that would hurt my anniversary. In ten years, the

husband's feelings because I respect him."

Support is also important. She always took an interest in what her husband was doing with council, and he always supported her on anything she wanted to do.

Mrs. Willsey has been involved with community events since they married. She often collects money from neighbours for flowers when somebody has died, or when a newlywed couple has returned from their honeymoon.

She is also a strong force in keeping the family close.

Every month, she sends a newsletter to each of her relatives, to inform them on the latest engagements, and to remind them of coming birthdays and celebrations. "There are so many of us, that it's hard to keep in touch sometimes," she said.

Recent statistics indicate fewer and fewer couples will celebrate a fiftieth wedding percentage of divorces has climbed 10%.

"When young couples get discouraged, it's sad. They don't know where to turn," said Mrs. Willsey, "but if they had their mind on working it out, I think some of them could."

Many couples don't take their vows seriously, and it creates problems in their marriage later on. "There's not as much commitment anymore," she said.

Her husband felt high costs of living and foolish spending are other contributors to marital problems "Some get in debt so far they have no more entertainment. Then they think they'll get entertainment with someone else."

This was never a problem for them, because they spent their money carefully. "Even now, we're still cautious." remarked Mrs. Willsey.

"Raising a large family took some planning," Mr. Willsey said, "so I have always had tough money policies and passed this advice along to our children: It's not what you make that counts, but what you save that counts. This is important toward holding a marriage together."

He uses this policy in his politics. South Dorchester operates with a reserve fund. Mr. Willsey strictly frowns upon deficit spending.

He has one more year left as reeve. He doesn't intend to keep his title after December 1994. Soon he and his wife will have more time to spend together.

"When he says, 'I guess we'll go out to lunch.' I'm right there," his wife said.

"Now that the kids are gone and we have more money, we can enjoy life pretty well," said Mr. Willsey, as he leaned back in his comfortable armchair.


Their 8 children, 19 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren will help them celebrate the anniversary on Saturday, at Springfield Lions Community Hall.












