


1819 - Peter Miller -patent (for service in war of 1812)


1896 - Andrew Miller (grandson of Peter)

Ross Tufford was a keen farmer, active in the Masonic Lodge and his church, was president of the Elgin Co-Operative Service in 1956 and 1957.

Gordon Tufford, Ross' brother, worked on the farm until his retirement in 1961. He died in December 1981 the same year as his brother Ross who passed away January 1981.



West Lot on Talbot Road

The house was severed from the 48 acre farm owned by Harold Carroll. The house was renovated in the 1970's and is now owned by John and Pat Zegars.

The Church was built in 1879, before this time the Bible Christian Readers came from Talbotville. Some were Messrs. Mallot, Rice, Allen and Rev. Whitlock. The first minister in 1879 was Rev. J. H. McCartney. In 1882 the church became a Methodist Church with Rev.Thos. Cott as minister and became at that time affiliated with Fingal. In 1907 a cyclone blew out both end walls of the church. It was rebuilt and an alcove added.

The land for the church was donated by the late Peter Smoke and son Cabel. Among the early members were the late Mr. and Mrs. John Curtis (parents of Dr, J. D. Curtis of St.Thomas) and their descendants are still active members beside Mr. and Mrs. Ross Tufford and family and Mr. and Mrs. Trevor Stinchcombe whose parents were Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stinchcombe.

The Ladies Aid has always been an active organization with Mrs. Robert Dowler as the present President.
