Lot 40 S.T.R.E. Mr. and Mrs. Irwin Phoenix 1983 Constant Frank de Deckere was born near Clinge in the province of Zeeland, the Netherlands on January 21, 1929.

Not far from there, in the same province, Maria Matilda Kerchhaert was born near Hengstdyk on April 15, 1931.

On April 4, 1956 they were wed in a double wedding which included Constant's sister, Josephine and Albert Ferket.

Constant, better known as Stan, had previously worked in Canada and by the end of April 1956 the newlyweds along with Josephine and Albert set sail for new opportunities in "America". This event was said to be done over the protest of Maria's father.

The Dutch immigrants settled in Southwestern Ontario. Stan and Mary moved from Blenheim where Stan was a farm

labourer to Strathroy where they were sharecroppers and finally in the spring of 1964 they purchased Lot 40, a farm near the City of St. Thomas from Edna Silcox. Thereafter they engaged in raising hogs and growing corn, tomatoes, cucumbers and other vegetables.

They have four children:

Constaninus (Stan Jr.) Franciscus born December 27, 1956 who is a graduate of the University of Windsor Law School.

Rosemarie Josephine born July 17, 1958 who is a Registered Nurse.

In 1964, the de Deckere farmstead consisted of the remnants of goat sheds, an old barn and a storey and a half brick home. In fact, Stan had bought the farm without Mary really inspecting the dilapidated condition of the house's interior and when Mary viewed at last the inside of the house she knew it would take years to clean and remodel the old house. Meanwhle, Stan thought it was far more important for a farmer to concentrate The old barn was torn down and eventually two other on a barn. barns were erected, one for the pigs and one for the machinery. Also demolished, was an old garage attached to the house. It covered a well which was filled in because the hook-up to "city water" had made it redundant. A new two car garage was built on the same spot. The house has become very cosy with the improvements made through the years.

Stan and Mary now ponder the future and hope that grandchildren may come some day to visit their farm.

September 14, 1830 - John Rolph - patent - 200 acres Settled by Dr. Thos. Rolph from Gloucestershire, England. He cleared the farm, front half, and built a large square log house on a small sand hill near Talbot Road.About 1815. In 1820, Dr. Thomas Rolph died and left his son, Dr. John Rolph as owner. Thomas was buried in the woods about 80 rods from Talbot Road on a slight elevation of land. 1832 - Jas. Innes


