OCTOBER MEETING.FIRST IN THE NEWS IS THE WAR IN THE EAST.

First the sudden attack on the Falkland Islands--under British Rule for many years but now attack by Argentine. In all there may have been 30 aircraft screaming in low over the Falkland Sound beach head. In successive waves they had beaten through the protective British barrier screen to the West. As defensive missiles carved red streaks in the sky, the Argentine mirages and Skyhawks answered with fire of their own-banks and were gone--both raids lasted just a few seconds--such is the speed of modern warfare!!!! The toll of that Sunday's strike was typical of the seven week war over the disputed Falkland Islands. As Argentine's jets made for home, they left behind a burning British Frigate and seven of their own number. That alone brought overall military casualties to 58 Argentine aircraft--two warships and more than 450 men. On the British side, there were more than 75 dead, two task-force warships sunk with several more damaged and 13 planes and helicopters lost--such is the initial price of war !!!!!.

It was a week in which the military and political fortunes seemed to ebb and flow with the tides that whipped the battle-scarred Falkland Islands. Then on Saturday--British Commandos and paratroops closed in from two directions on the Argentine troops' narrow defensive arc west of the Capital --Port Stanley. They were poised to receive backing of an additional 3000 troops from the liner Queen Elizabeth II. Then the military balance tipped strongly and this began closing the vise on Port Stanley which signified THE FALKLAND ISLAND'S final countdown.

NOW THE WAR TURNS TO LEBANON AND THE FAR EAST\*\*p----

The devastating military defeat of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) IN Lebanon, may ironically prove to be its political salvation and the first glimmer of hope in its struggle for a homeland for the 4.5 million Palestinian scattered around the middle East. There were signs that the Arab States wanted to salvage the PLO as a political--if not as a military force---such a mix-up--and again what is gained in any war/???? Then the great massacre! Killing of hundreds of innocent victims--it will go down in history as one of the great world tragedies--it left families fleeing everywhere to nowhere and the sheer tragedies that showed on many faces was appalling. War not only kills needlessly--it also costs outlandishly. It was roughly estimated that the outcome could run to 2.25 billion.

IT WAS REPORTED THE FUTILITY OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS.

Across the western world in worried solitudes and in mass marches, a spirited and popular outcry has arisen against the horrors of the man created hydrogen bomb. It is a movement that compels notice as much by its individual acts as by its vast numbers. On the banks of the Rhine at Bonn 250000 march for disarmament as the leaders of the Nato alliance gather for their summit. In Japan some 30 million people signed a petition against nuclear weapons and sent it to the United Nations and from Saskatoon a formal petition was sent to the House of Commons--it read---Your petitioners humbly pray and call upon members of Parliament to express their fears and concerns for the future of mankind. The movement springs from origins as different as the language it speaks but it is united in one fear--the menace of global catastrophe.
