In the early 70's the Silcox's moved to the present house on Horton St. in Shedden.

Pauline attended SS # 10 Southwold Public School (the school is now gone and Randy & Susan Harris reside there). Pauline and her best friend, Mary Jean Brown (Hanbury) who lived to the East of them, played a few pranks on Mary Jean's younger brother, Bud, who wanted to trail along with them. On one occasion, Bud and his friend followed Pauline and Mary Jean to the cottage in Port Stanley. The girls were extremely annoyed and gave the boys the last piece of chocolate cake to eat. The boys didn't understand the girls laughter as they ate up the chocolate cake that was previously crawling with ants.

Then onto High School in St. Thomas called STCI – this is where the Valleyview Home is. After High School Pauline went to the Business College on Talbot Street in St. Thomas.

Margaret was born 28th. March, 1912, the daughter of Arthur and Mary Jane (Pollard) McIntyre. She was born and raised on their farm, Lot 14, Con 5, North of Shedden and attended Shedden Public School. Her high school days were spent in Dutton where she roomed with the Carswell Sisters. In 1930 she attended London Normal School and her first teaching job was in Muirkirk. About this time, she and her sisters, Marion and Kathryn bought a car from their Uncle Jack Pollard, who had a car dealership in London. Margaret got the driving lesson which lasted 15 minutes and was a trip around the four roads that surrounded their farm. Kathryn was in the back seat observing the lesson and watching for traffic. The next day Margaret drove to Springbank Park, Byron, to the Sunday School picnic. The 4th sister, Frances, went too.

While Margaret was teaching, she spent several summers as a waitress in a large hotel in Windermere, Muskoka. She also went alone on a bus trip out west to visit relatives in Rosetown, Sakatchewan. Other summers were spent at Summer School in London.

Margaret also taught at Middlemarch and Shedden, where she ended her teaching career in 1948 when she married Alex Turner. They resided at Lots 11, 12, Con. 4 for many years before selling the farm in 1974 and retiring to their new home on # 3 highway east of Shedden.

Although they had no children of their own, Alex and Margaret had eleven nieces and nephews who enjoyed many great meals and holidays with them. One time they took Beth, Dave and Mike Turner on an overnighter to Bracebridge. The cabin we stayed in had walls that were not very high with a large space between the walls and the roof. The Turner brothers threw clothes, bedding, shoes, etc. into the other bedrooms. Little sleep was had and we weren't invited on a holiday again, at least not overnight.

Margaret Turner was very active in community life. She was a member of the Covenented Baptist Church and Bethany United Church, Shedden. For many years Margaret was the Librarian at the Shedden Public Library, which her mother had helped to found. She was also an active director of the Shedden Fair Board. A life member of the Shedden Women's Institute, she also received a certificate of appreciation from the Ontario Government for her volunteer work at the Elgin County Pioneer Museum. She was also a member the Kensington Club, Lawrence Sta. Margaret spent many hours recording the history of Shedden and area in the Tweedsmuir History and she wrote histories of the Shedden Library and the Southwold Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

Alex and Margaret enjoyed travelling and were members of the Goodwill Tours led by Vic Langton and tours led by Roy Jewell. They visited many places in North America and Overseas.

Margaret enjoyed having meetings in her home and for several years was a member of the Dutton Bridge Club. The most memorable meeting would have to be of the Kensington Club in the farm house, when a very large garter snake slowly made its way across the living room carpet. The meeting quickly came to a close.

Alex Turner died November 3, 1985. Margaret continued her many community activities for several years, then she moved to Caressant Care in St. Thomas, where she died September 20, 1997. Always thinking of her community, she left bequests to Bethany Church, Shedden, Pearce Williams Christian Centre, Elgin Pioneer Museum, St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital and the Salvation Army.

She was a 4H homemaking club leader for several years, starting in 1968.
