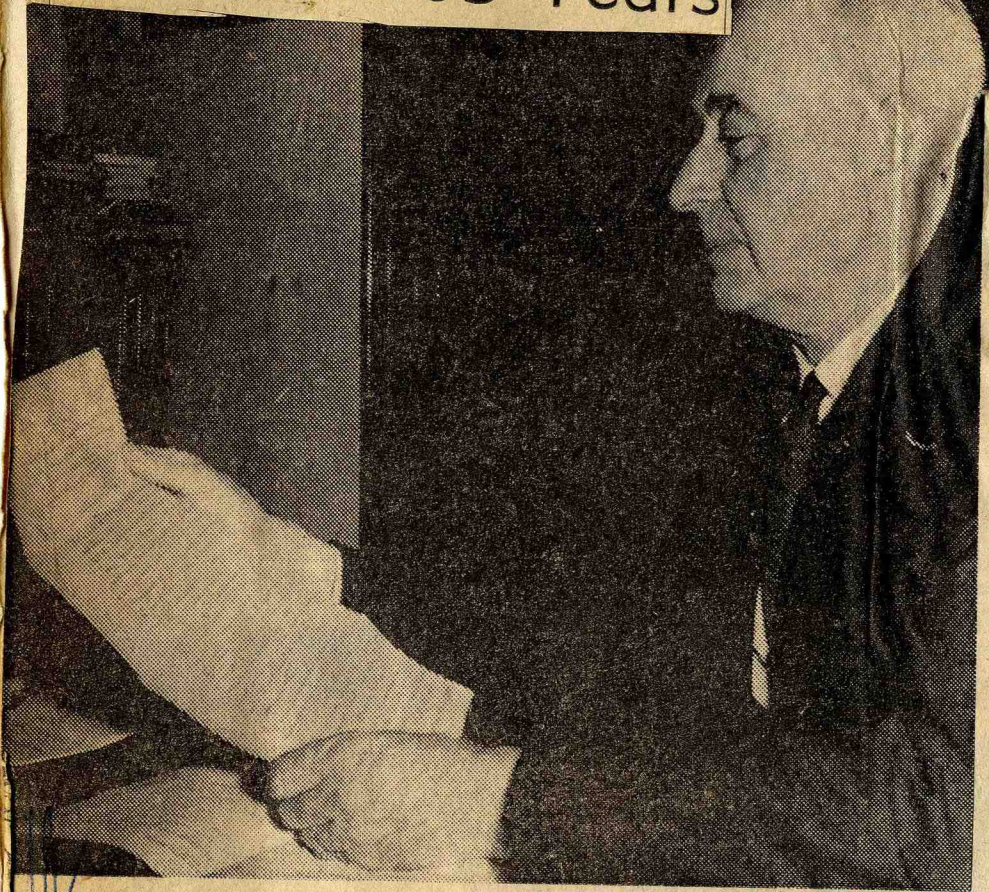

Auctioneer Fee ^{Feb 23 1962} Stable 103 Years

ST. THOMAS — "What authority do you have to charge \$12 for an auctioneer's licence?"

Auditors are always asking questions like that. But in this case it brought to light the fact that for the past 103 years Elgin County has been issuing licences to auctioneers for the same sum of \$12.

County Clerk-Treasurer J. D. Thompson was forced to seek the source of his authority when the question was asked by Donald Grant of the auditing firm of Fred Page Higgins.

His search revealed that a bylaw establishing the fee was approved by county council on Jan. 28, 1859, and has remained unchanged since that time.

"It's most unusual," said Mr. Thomson, "and we probably haven't got another bylaw like it."

The original bylaw remains within the county's vaults, written in admirable longhand by Elgin's first clerk, William McKay, grandfather of the present city solicitor, W. Scott McKay, QC.

65th Anniversary to Be Marked By WI ^{Feb 14 - 1962}

TORONTO (CP)—Three char-

ter members of the first branch at Stoney Creek will be honored at a 65th anniversary luncheon of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario in Toronto Feb. 19.

Mrs. H. P. Van Wagner of Burlington and Mrs. J. M. Mordey of Hamilton will be among the 1,300 guests Mrs. Maud Glidden of Hamilton, the other surviving member of the group, will not be able to attend be-

cause of illness. Other head table guests will include Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lee of Stoney Creek. It was Mr. Lee's father, Erland Lee of the Farmers' Institute, who helped Mrs. Adelaide Hoodless organize the first branch on Feb. 19, 1897. The group became international later.

By 1900 there were 33 women's institutes functioning in Ontario and the Federal Women's Institutes of Ontario came into being in 1919. A similar Canadian group was formed the same year and in 1933, the Associated Country Women of the World, an international organization of Women's Institutes, was formed.

There are now 38,000 mem-

bers in 1,450 junior and senior branches in Ontario.

To mark the 65th anniversary, it has been proposed that a \$50,000 foundation fund be established to send a trained economist into one of the newly emerging countries to teach leaders. It is hoped the fund will be closed by the end of this year so that the first worker can be sent in 1963.
