County Council Acts On Southwold School Problem

Farmers Must Pay Burden of Taxes For Familites Moved to

Talbotville From St. Thomas

Elgin County Council Thursday afternoon, acted on the recommendation of the petitions and legislation committee, and supported the action of the Southwold Township Council in taxation relief for farmer taxayers in the township on school accommodations for the children of residents in the urban and surburban sections of the municipality.

The outcome of the discussion was that a permanent of the control of the control of the control of the control of the discussion.

The outcome of the discussion was that a new resolution was presented by Deputy Reeve C. A. Bell, Port Stanley and Deputy Reeve Allan Kilmer of Aylmer, asking the Ontario Department of Planning and Development to acquaint rural municipalities with the benefits to be derived from passin legislation restricting the division of undivided lands.

As explained to Council, in committee of the whole session, by Reeve Walter Auckland of Southwold, the situation at Talbotville caused action to be taken. Families have moved to Talbotville from St. Thomas to such an extent that the present one room school will not accommodate their offspring. A new two-room school, estimated at \$50,000, is required. Farmers of the township will have to pay the bulk of the costs of the building while the people who have created the problem will get off with light levies on assessments of only \$600 or \$800. Some of them worked in industries in St. Thomas which paid school and other taxes to the city.

"A great many of the farmers

"A great many of the farmers have few children and the farmers feel that it is an injustice to have to build a new schot, for these children." said Reeve Auckland He said he thought that the reason the trustees had not taken action in the matter of building a new and larger school.

"What's wrong with the farmers in Southwold that they can't raise children?" asked Reeve W. K. Bodkin of Yarmouth, laughing.

"I think they have to work too hard," Reeve Auckland replied.

A Similar Problem

Deputy Reeve Kilmer of Aylmer said that Southwold was not alone in this problem. He had heard similar complaints aired at sessions of the Industrial Development Board in Toronto. Such a situation had arisen in North York Township where so many workers, seeking to escape high taxation, had bought or built homes in the township, with the result that the farmers were faced with high taxation to provide the school accommodations required for these families. The only answer was to seek industrial development or to restrict the sale of undivided land That was one way of lessening the burden of school taxation on the rural ratepayer.

Deputy Reeve Beil explained that the Southwold Council reducest for legislation to relieve farm owners of this taxation burden was directed to the Department of Education, but he felt a resolution

should be sent to the Ontario Department of Planning and Development instead.

Southwold farmers are not the only ones in Elgin who have high school taxation. Other members of County Council, Thursday, told the Times-Journal of farm owners in other parts of the County who are assessed school taxes of \$200 and higher a year.
