Bayham WI Has Two Living Charter Members

The Bayham Women's Institute was organized in the home of Mrs. A. B. Riddell in the village of Richmond in the summer of 1907 by the East Elgin District officers; president Dr. Anna Backus, and first vice-president, Mrs. D. D. Finch, Mapleton. The officers elected that day included Mrs. Riddell as president with Miss Addie Cook as secretary - treasurer. There are two living charter members, Mrs. H. L. Godwin who is still quite active in Institute work and Mrs. Odber McGregor, Aylmer, who is still a member, but owing to ill health is confined to her home most of the time.

During these 57 years there has always been a variety in the programs.—talks by members on different subjects and also guest speakers from other places, demonstrations, debates, short courses, and entertaining other neighboring institutes.

During World War I the members were busy, knitting, sewing for Red Cross, packing boxes, also making donations of money to all the dif-ferent reliefs from the overseas countries asking for them. After the war was over the members purchased a plot in the Richmond West Cemetery and had a Memorial Monument erected in memory of the 12 boys from this community who did not return and have held a Decoration Day service every summer since around this plot which is always decorated with summer flowers and flags. We also help with the upkeep of this cemetery.

The members have always tried to live up to the motto-For Home and Country.

During the depression years, the W.I. helped the shut-ins, needy families, with food and clothing, quilts, and other articles, also any family burned out. In fact this has been practiced all down

through the years.
In 1939 World War II, the members continued Red Cross work which included 2000 articles made and several ditty bags sent to the armed forces. A large sum of money was given to the Red Cross Central Fund to be used for the boys overseas as they saw fit. During these four years we made a total of 6,704 pounds of jam. As the boys returned home social evenings were held for them and they were presented with

leather billfolds and belts.

The W.I. is interested in short courses and the co-operative programs as set up by the Department. In 1947 two active members were

given life membership certificates and pins, namely — Mrs. George Orton and Mrs. Lorne Laing and in 1953 Mrs. H. L. Godwin and Mrs. Geo. A. Procunier were made life members. The above mentioned members were also charter members at that time. In 1949 Mrs. Ward Benner brought honor to the Institute by being elected a provincial board member, which office she held for three years. The members presented her with an Ontario Board Member Badge. SUBSTANTIAL DONATIONS

Substantial donations have been made during the last few years to the St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital; The Elgin County Pioneer Museum; The Aylmer Arena; Friendship school at St. Thomas and The Westmount school for Retarded Children at Tillsonburg; United Welfare Services, and to local community work.

For a number of years the W.I. has corresponded with a Friendship Branch of the Merstham Women's Institute in Surrey, England, and each Christmas gifts are exchanged. For the last 25 years annual bus trips are enjoyed every summer and the members have toured a number of factories and plants and went sightseeing in many different places in Ontario and the United States. Members also attended the 50th anniversary of the Institutes of Ontario held at the O.A.C. Guelph and in 1953 a number of members attended the A.C.C.W. convention held at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto. The above is just a few of the many nice things enjoyed during the past

When the 50th anniversary was celebrated in 1957 Mrs. Von Brown and her sister Mrs. William Berdan were made life members. Guests from all the neighboring Institutes were entertained. In 1962 a 10 year-old girl in the Caribbean Christian School for the Deaf, in Spur Tree, Jamaica, West Indies adopted, Besides paying \$60. per year the members corresponded with her and send presents at Christmas.

The same loyal support will be given in the future as in the past to the Provincial-F.W.I.O.; Dominion F.W.I.C. and to the Associated Country Women of the World A.C.W.W. projects which include Adelaide Hoodless Home, Scholarship Fund, Pennies for Friendship, and community projects.



History researched

Bayham Women's Institute celebrates 75 years of community aid, service

Bayham Women's Institute was organized in 1907, but minutes are available from only 1917 on. Barbara Cross, presi-dent, compiled a history of the WI from those records and presented it at 75th anniversary celebrations, recently.

Throughout the years, Mrs. Cross' research brought out, the

fact that service to the community and further afield was the prime aim of the members. Sick and needy in the community were aided, and much knitting, sewing, and packing of baskets done for soldiers in both world wars.

Socials, always popular in earlier years, was one way to raise money, as well as bring community members together. One lunch much favored by the community and WI members consisted of 'weaners, baker's bread, small cakes, candy and

During depression years, District President Mrs. Firby urged women not to let hard times make a difference about joining the WI as it meant only one-half cent per week.

Homemade jam was a big production during the war years. In 1945, due to the scarcity of sugar, it was, members decided, easier to purchase cases of factory jam, instead of

making it.

Mrs. Cross noted the willingness of members to support the WI, whether catering to a small reception for a local wedding or preparing and serving a huge banquet for a large organization.

Through the years, bus and side trips have been taken, not only for entertainment but to provide a better knowledge of local and provincial industries. The Royal Winter Fair, Ice Capades, Dominion Glass Works, Libby's, Carnation Milk Plant, Imperial Leaf Tobacco and recently, the Ontario Police College have all been visited.

Still active members include Mrs. Bertha Orton Berdan, life member, who was secretarytreasurer 1922-23, and Mrs. Annie Crane Benner, also a life member, attending at that
