The homemakers in our fair township (Yarmouth) had long been an enterprising group of Red Cross workers. We believed there was a vast amount of satisfaction in a job well don. We failed to see, where life could bestow a finer gift, than loving toil, so throughout the long war years, we worked diligently for the welfare of our boys, across the seas; and the comfort of their dear ones left behind.

At our June meeting, 1948, the possibility of forming a W. I. Branch was discussed and on September 1, 1948, the Central Yarmouth Women's Institute branch was born.

Our Red Cross president, Mrs. Charles McLean was prevailed upon to be our first president and with the able assistance of Mrs. W. E. Walters, secretary and Mrs. George Flintoft, treasurer, carried us very successfully on our new voyage. Our 1949-1950 year ending April 1st, showed our receipts to be \$505.95, expenditures \$315.50 with a balance of \$190.40.

In the five and one-half years that have followed our inception, we feel that we have much to be proud of. Until 1952, we were the baby Institute of the East Elgin area.

A few of our highlights in these few short years have been as follows: A devotional period at each meeting; hot lunches for the school children; showers for the newlyweds; flowers for the ill and bereaved; sponsoring of girls' clubs; bales of clothing sent overseas and to the tornado victims in the Parkhill area; layette and bathinette to polio victim's new baby; quilts for

sick children in London hospital; white gifts for the Salvation Army at Christmas each year. On May 3, 1950, we voted \$200. to the new St. Thomas-Elgin General Hospital, also small donations to all the worthy funds from time to time.

We enjoyed many splendid department speakers, also some trips through fine Canadian industries.

We have played host to the East Elgin District in First United Church in 1951. In 1952 we made an original souvenir quilt, called the "Pride of Elgin" and presented it to Lady Elgin, when she and Lord Elgin visited our county for the Centennial celebrations.

Talent money, food sales, teas, quilting and social card games have been among our mediums for raising funds and at the present ime our most important project is making linens and garments for our new hospital. Our members, numbering 28 have turned in several hundred articles at time of writing.

We began our new year 1954-1955 under the capable leadership of Mrs. George Flintoft, president; Mrs. Gowan Young, secretary; and Mrs. Marshall Field, treasurer, and we are looking forward to a most successful and happy year.

May we always cherish the friendships
We have made in this little band.
And for our blessed "Home and Country"
Work together hand in hand.
