

West 1/2, Lot 19, Concession 4 (continued)

The mid 1960's were a time of expansion in the beef business. A feedlot was constructed north of the original barn in 1966 with the first 20 foot by 60 foot cement silo being built over the foundation of the McNabb house. A second 20 foot by 60 foot silo was added in in 1967 and a red steel barn 72 feet by 102 feet was erected on the lot in 1974.

The farm has remained basically a pasture farm with periodic cropping. It has been rented by Russell and Stan Campbell since 1979 to expand their beef operation.

Lot 19 was first owned by Arch McLachlin who lived on the East half of it in a log house along with his daughter for a few years. He then sold to Lachlin McLachlin who lived across the river in Ekfrid Township. Archie and his daughter went back to Scotland. Lachlin McLachlin gave the land to his two sons Dugald and Duncan. The Lot was divided into two long hundreds, Duncan living on the East half, and Dugald on the West half. They built homes on the North end of the farms. Dugald was never married.

Duncan married Belle Watson who lived on the farm now owned by Byron Murray. They had three sons and one daughter. Janet married Thomas Small who lived in South Dunwich. Dugald James went to Vancouver. John Lachlin and Dan were bachelors.

Duncan sold his farm to John W. McCallum (son of Angus McCallum, who lived on North 1/2, Lot 18 Concession 4) about the year 1884. He paid \$3,800.00 for it. John W. married Agnes Crawford from Campbellton on 25th October 1888 and lived in the log house for 12 years. They built the present white brick house in 1900. They had a family of two sons and one daughter, Duncan, Archie and Alda. Duncan bought a farm in the Largie district and married Maribel Leitch in 1922. They have one son, Jamesian. Alda married Douglas Campbell, son of Dugald J. Campbell, and moved to their farm on East 1/2, Lot 21 Concession 4 - three farms East of her home. They have two sons and two daughters, Archie T., John, Katherine and Anne.

Archie, who married Jennie Campbell (daughter of Archie C. Campbell of the 3rd Concession) in 1928 continued to live on the home farm and took over <sup>the</sup> farming operation from his father who moved to Dutton and lived there for several years. He later returned to live with his son until his death in 1964 at the great age of 100 years. His wife Agnes passed away at the home of their daughter, Mrs Douglas Campbell in 1950.

Archie and Jennie McCallum have one daughter Janet Regina who moved to the Parkhill district and married Leo Bodkin in 1959.

John W. built a frame barn in 1890 which had high posts so that the stable was underneath. This barn was originally built across the ravine but was moved to its present site in 1904. The granary was built where the house now stands, but was later moved back for a drive shed and is now used for a garage and workshop. The log house stood near where our present drinking well is. The Dutton & Dunwich telephone came around 1906. We got the Hydro in 1938 and also put in a bathroom.

Archie bought a threshing machine along with his cousin Angus McCallum in 1917 from Alex McLachlin. He sold out his share to Angus in 1921 then bought another thresher in 1932 and threshed for a number of years. A combine was purchased in 1957 and a corn harvester with wagons in 1964. Duncan McLachlin planted apple and pear trees. The pear tree still stands and bears a lot of pears each year. One snow apple tree is also still standing and bearing fruit.





East ½ Lot 19, Conc. 4

In February 1981, David Aubrey and Brenda Darlene ( Lunn ) Murray purchased the farm from Janet Bodkin for \$158,000. Janet's father Archie Tom McCallum died in 1974 and her mother Jennie McCallum died in 1977. Before the Murray's moved into the house they completely remodelled it. The foundation was repaired, new beams were put in; insulation was added, replastering done in all the downstairs and part of the upstairs. The walls were papered and the kitchen was updated with new cupboards, dishwasher, and new plumbing. The floors were sanded and in 1983 carpeting was installed in two bedrooms upstairs. The stairs leading to the basement were removed and a bathroom installed there, just off the kitchen.

In the barn, old stabling was removed and a new roof was added. The shed was painted and the water supply was filtered and chlorinated for use in the house. In 1980 a municipal drain was dug along the 5th concession. David farms the land with cash crops and sheep the main income. Dave was a lecturer-researcher with Ridgetown Agriculture College in Ridgetown until May 1983 when he became Agriculture Representative in Elgin County. He commutes to work each day.

In 1982 the Murray's named their farm Clay Creek Farm.

1992 UPDATE

David Murray divided the farm into two 50 acre parcels of land. The north 50 acres were sold to Ron and Teresa Ouellette. Ron is retired from the armed forces. They have redecorated the whole house and farm on a small scale. They move in the fall of 1990.

The south 50 acres were sold to Daniel McCauley. There are no buildings on this parcel of land.



West ½, Lot 21, Concession 4.

West ½, Lot 21 was obtained in 1852 by Malcolm McIntyre who lived on the Scotch Road. He gave it to his son, Donald, who was known as "Long Ten". He had a family of ten children.

Donald McIntyre married Liza . Their family were: Malcolm, Sarah, Lizzie, John, Peter, Daniel, Maggie, Eleanor, Mary and Nancy.

John McIntyre later made an agreement with his father, whereby he traded the farm to a Mr. Nelson for a hotel in Dutton, still known as the "McIntyre House". Next Mr. Nelson sold the farm to William Little, who sold it to John M. Campbell, who sold it to Dougald J. Campbell. This farm is still owned by J. Douglas Campbell, son of Dougald Campbell.

J. Douglas Campbell married Alda McCallum in June 1920. There were four children:

Katherine Campbell, London.

Archie T. Campbell married Ruth McCutcheon in August, 1957, and moved to West ½, Lot 20, Concession 4. They have three children - Margaret, Grant, and Jean.

John D. Campbell married Elaine Revington of Lucan in September, 1955 and they have two children, John and Janice.

Ann M. Campbell lives in London and is a primary school teacher.

### 1983 Update

J. Douglas Campbell, who was born on August 30, 1880, died on June 18, 1974. His wife Alda continued to live alone until she passed away April 29, 1982. She was born May 3, 1895. John D. Campbell, their son, is now the owner of the farm which he rents to his brother Archie T. and his son Grant.

1984 John D. Campbell's wife, Elaine, passed away on August 3, 1984, in her 53rd year with burial in Clandeboye Cemetery.



East 1/8, Lot 21, Concession 4

The West 1/2 of Lot 21 was obtained in 1852 by Malcolm McIntyre who came from the Scotch Road in Elgin. He gave it to his son Malcolm, who had a family of 10 children, - namely, Malcolm, Sarah, Lizzie, John, Peter, Daniel, Mary, Maggie, Eleanor and Nancy. The farm was passed on to Malcolm who married Flora Patterson. They had one child, Ada. She married Andrew J. McMillan, but died when young, leaving no children.

The farm was later sold to Daniel Patterson, (brother of Flora) whose ancestors, John and Roger Patterson came from Argyleshire, Scotland. He married Annie McGugan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archie McGugan, who lived on the South West 1/4 of Lot 22.

They had two sons, John Archie, who lives at Cowal, and Donald Stuart. The latter took over the farm on the death of his father in 1932. He married Jean MacMillan, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex J. MacMillan, Lot 12, Concession 4, Dunwich. By this marriage there are two children, Anne Alexandra, Mrs Don Nugent, at present in British Columbia, and Donald Robert, who married Joan Welsh and lives on Lot 24, Conc. 1.

The present house was built by Malcolm McIntyre for his bride Flora. It was a white frame house, and is on its original site, midway on the lot on Concession 4. It was remodelled about 1947.

The telephone was installed about 1912 by the Dunwich & Dutton Telephone Company, and the original instrument is still in use. In 1952 electricity was installed in both house and barn at an approximate cost of \$700.00. A barn was erected - 32 x 50 - frame in 1938 by Peter McCallum, Carpenter.

In 1958 an additional fifty acres was purchased situated on S. W. 1/4 of Lot 22. Mixed farming has been carried on through the years. In 1939 a H. E. P. C. line was built across the South part of the farm, and later in 1951 a larger second line was erected.

There is an old orchard East of the house, which has been there as long as the present owner remembers.

Taxes have increased greatly;-

1983 Update

Since 1966 there have been few changes. The barn has been painted red and new roofs have been put on the house and the barn. Stuart is semi-retired and his son Bob farms the land with the help of his two teenage sons John and Jim.

Jean Patterson died suddenly on 30 November, 1987 from a heart attack at age 84 years. She is buried in Cowal-McBrides Cemetery. Stuart then went to reside in the Byrne Nursing Home in Fingal. He passed away on 11 June, 1990 at the age of 90 years. He is buried at Cowal-McBrides Cemetery.

Stuart and Jean celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on 23 January, 1987.

For a year the house was rented to Dennis and Dawn (Douglas) Markowski and their two children. At present the house is vacant. Bob Patterson and his sons farm the land.



North 1/2, Lot 22, Concession 4, Dunwich.

In the year 1842 Angus McTavish (Thomson) and his wife came to Canada from Argyllshire, Scotland, and purchased the above farm from the Crown. The farm was all bush, and they proceeded to clear the land, build a log house and log barns.

They had no family of their own, but in 1854 they took Mary and Jane McTavish (Thomson), daughters of his brother John, when their mother died at the age of 37 years. She was the first person buried in Cowal Cemetery. *NANCY MCLAREN MCTAVISH d. May 3, 1854.*

About 1860 the log house was replaced by a frame house built by Hugh McCallum from materials on the farm, regular barn timbers, pole rafters, split lath and plastered. This same house is occupied by the present owner.

On October 26th, 1874, Angus was killed by a steer while driving cattle to Iona. Archie Thomson, his nephew, and brother of Mary and Jane, came to live with them and work the farm on shares till 1897, when he married and went to live in the village of Cowal. He continued to work it until November 1913 when he purchased the farm from his sister Jane, (Mary had died in 1911) and moved to the farm with his wife and three children, John, Archie and Annabel.

The log barns were replaced by the present barn in 1901. The driveshed was built in 1917, and a hog pen in 1929. In 1915 a kitchen was built onto the house.

Archie died in September 1927, and John, the eldest son, took over operation of the farm. He lived there until August 1942, when he and his wife Helen and four children, John, Douglas, Joyce and Elizabeth moved to St. Thomas. He was appointed Clerk of Elgin County that year; a position he held until his retirement in 1964. He was also County Treasurer for a number of years. He leased the farm to Mr. and Mrs. William Gunst.

Mr. Gunst purchased the farm in 1949 and lived there until he died in 1952. Mrs. Gunst sold the farm to the present owners Mr. and Mrs. Horace Guest, and moved to Ridgetown.

Mr. and Mrs. Guest have four sons and a daughter, Gordon, living in London, Eric at Dutton, Reta, (Mrs. Jack Mann) at Iona Station, John and Roy at home.

The farm produced wheat, oats, barley, hay, corn as well as beef cattle, hogs and sheep.

The telephone was installed in 1915, and hydro in 1938.

A Silo was erected by Mr. Guest in 1963.

The family of Horace and Eva Guest are:

Eric Guest married Carolyn Mann on November 4, 1961. They have four children: Glen born June 30, 1962, Vaughn born February 27, 1965, Gayle born May 28, 1966, and Emily born February 1, 1977.

Rita Guest married John Mann on April 27, 1962. (John Mann and Carolyn Mann are brother and sister.) They have three children: David John, born November 4, 1962, Dwayne born February 13, 1964, and Diane born February 28, 1975.

Gordon Guest married Betty Fraser on July 15, 1962. They have three (two) children: Kim born March 2, 1965, and Tammy born July 4, 1967, and Sheri born February 27, 1969.

John Guest married Shirley Szklaruke on June 24, 1972. They have two children: Tracey born February 16, 1976, and Cameron born July 3, 1979.

Roy Guest married Marian Small on September 10, 1977. They have two children: Natasha born January 2, 1980 and Brian born November 17, 1981.

Since 1969 there have been extensive alterations to existing buildings on the farm and some new structures have been added. In 1969 a new farrowing barn was built. Prior to that the farm was a beef operation.

In 1976 Roy graduated from RCAT and joined his father in operating the family farm. At that time they erected a 2400 bushel corn crib. All the lumber for the project was sawn by John Mann from logs cut from the woodlot on the farm.

In the spring and summer of 1977 a new brick, three bedroom, ranch-style house was built by Roy and Marian to the west of Horace and Eva's house. That year another corn crib was erected. This one will hold 1100 bushels.

In 1978 the old cattle barn was extensively remodelled. Changes included a new cement block foundation, a new cement floor, pens, for finishing and breeding pigs, and a new feed room.

In 1980 a new 4000 bushel grain bin was erected. Also the old pig pen was enlarged and a new floor and pens for finishing pigs were installed. A cement block walkway was also built the same year. This connects all three barns and greatly facilitates moving pigs.

In 1981 a bulk feed tank was erected and in 1982 the barnyard was cemented over.

1992 UPDATE

The former owner of this farm, John D. Thomson, died on 7 September, 1985, aged 86 years. He is buried in Cowal-McBrides Cemetery. He was County Clerk and Treasurer of Elgin County for many years. J.D. Thomson was warden of Elgin County in 1935.

Eva Guest's health failed in she was a resident of the Bobier Convalescent Nursing Home for some time. She passed away on 25 July, 1991, aged 72 years. She is buried in Cowal-McBrides Cemetery.



North  $\frac{1}{2}$ , Lot 23, Concession 4John Archie Patterson

John and Roger Patterson, young sons of Roger Patterson, Argyleshire, Scotland, immigrated to Canada in 1839, landing at Montreal. They came to Elgin County and obtained grants of land from Colonel Talbot.

John Patterson married Margaret Patterson, no relation. She could not read or write. They settled on Hogg Street when they first came to Dunwich, later moving to the 5th concession where they owned 200 acres - Lot 23, north and south.

John Patterson cleared three farms in his lifetime. This couple had a family of eight children.

North-East  $\frac{1}{4}$ , Lot 23.

On May 17, 1802 the crown sold a 400 acre parcel of land consisting of Lots 23 and 24 to Sarah Lottridge. In 1847, 200 acres consisting of Lot 23 were sold to a John Smith, who in turn sold to Joseph Van Norman the same year. In 1853 George Van Norman became the owner, then he sold the 200 acres to John Patterson in 1854.

In 1882 John Patterson sold some of his land to his two sons. This 50 acre parcel was sold to Daniel Patterson for \$650. He farmed it until his death in 1932 when his son, John Archie Patterson, inherited it. When John Archie died in 1977, his daughter Mrs. Donald A. McCallum, became the owner. The north-east corner of this farm was part of Cowal, where buildings were located on the west side of the main street (the sawmill, Griffin's Store, and several houses.)

North West  $\frac{1}{4}$ , Lot 23

John Patterson gave this 50 acres to his son Duncan. Duncan was a bachelor who lived in Cowal where he died at the age of 48 years from the grippe. On February 22, 1893 Archie McLachlin purchased the 50 acres for the sum of \$1,500 and Dougald Morrison purchased the house and lot in Cowal for \$300. (This house was later bought by Archibald Thomson, J.D. Thomson's father, and later by Archie McLachlin and his sister, Effie. The house was burned in 1939.)

In 1894 Archie McLachlin built the white frame house that still stands today. Archie farmed the land until he retired in the 1920's and had a farm machinery sale. He and his sister, Effie, then bought the Morrison house in Cowal, and moved there.

Mr. and Mrs. William Gunst rented the farm for several years. Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Keates lived in the house for a few years. When Tena Carruth married John Archie Patterson in 1932, she bought the 50 acres from Archie McLachlin for \$2,700. John Archie farmed these two parcels (100 acres) until he retired. When he died in 1977, his daughter, Mrs. Donald A. McCallum, became the owner. The McCallums rent the land and Duncan McCallum and his wife Debbie (Johnson) live in the house. Their son, Donald Jeffery, was born March 3, 1984.

In 1901 Chalmers Church was built and Daniel Patterson bought the old church building for \$30 and moved it to the north-east  $\frac{1}{4}$ , Lot 23, where it became a barn for the Patterson's. It became run down and was demolished, with the remains being burned. With the building of the new church, the new community hall had to be moved, so Daniel Patterson donated the land for the site of the present building. Land was also donated for the Farmers Club to build the stockyards for their consignment sale which lasted for 40 years, the last sale being in 1961.

In 1939 hydro was installed in the house and barn and in 1969 the kitchen was remodelled. One bedroom was panelled and improvements made throughout the house.

In 1968 oil was found on the NE  $\frac{1}{4}$  and this became part of the Willey Oilfield which is now owned by Sasko Oil Company in Calgary. Much earlier gas was found but nothing was done with it. Water was easily obtained. There is a well with spring water at the barn. Over the years the farm has been completely tiled. McCallums tore out the stabling in the barn and made an open area for cattle to winter in, with a hay loft above. A cement bunk silo was built along the east wall of the barn. At one time there was a good orchard but it has been cut down as have a number of large maple trees which grew along the road. Ontario Hydro cut them because of the power lines near them.



John Archie Patterson (1897 - 1977) married Emma Christena Carruth (1904 - 1972) on October 22, 1932 . Their family:

Marilyn Yvonne born 1933, married Donald Alexander McCallum born 1931, at Lawrence Station at the United Church manse with Rev. Harrower as the minister, on August 30, 1955. Their family is Nancy (Mrs. Robert McKillop), Jamie and Duncan. (see lot16, Concession 2, Donald A. McCallum)

Margaret Jeanne born July 2, 1935, died March 27, 1943, from heart failure in her 8th year.

John Archie farmed until 1951 when he had to go to Beck Sanitorium for a year and a half. In 1958 he became Road Superintendent for Dunwich Township, retiring in 1969. He was always interested in politics and served on council for several years.

Yvonne attended London Normal School and taught for three and a half years, later doing supply teaching for several years.

1992 UPDATE

North  $\frac{1}{2}$ , Lot 24, Concession 4Stanley Campbell

The Crown granted Lot 23 and 24 to Sarah Lottridge in May 1802. Lot 24, consisting of 200 acres, was then sold by one William Lottridge to David Ghent in 1848. David Ghent then sold to Malcolm McIntrye for \$3,000 (200 acres) and took a mortgage for \$2,000. In 1877 John and William Carroll then became involved and several lots of  $\frac{1}{5}$  acre each were sold ranging in price from \$50 to \$100. These same lots became the sites of the blacksmith shop, carriage shop, shoemakers, stave mill and several houses, forming the East side of the street in the hamlet of Cowal.

Persons involved in these lots were: Lachlin McGugan, Daniel Pollock, Malcolm Gillmore, Duncan McNabb, William Wride, James March, John and Robert March, James McDougall. The remaining part of Lot 24,  $N\frac{1}{2}$  was sold by John and William Carroll to James McDougall in May of 1878. Throughout the years the lots have changed hands and other persons involved were: Dugal McKenzie, Aynsley Carey, John Gordon, Archibald McTavish, James D. McBride, John Martyn, Thomas Sawyer, David Holmes, Emiline Wilson, Peter McKenzie, Chancey Peckham, Maggie Forsyth, Alexander Stewart, Elizabeth Meyer, Laban Schnekenburger, George Kennedy, George McCarty, John Tennent, John McNeil, Herbert Myer, John Mulligan, David Anderson, Reuben Adams, James Pool, Alexander McKillop, Nancy Campbell, G.J. Weeks, Susan Adams, James F. Reilly, Herbert Hales, and Archie McLachlin. In 1954 the lots were rejoined to the original 100 acres for payment of taxes, amounting to \$9.03.

In 1883 Daniel Thomson purchased the 100 acres or what was remaining after the lots were taken, from James McDougall. In 1910 Julia B. Thomson sold the property to William S. Little for \$4,000. It became the property of Gordon Little in 1917 and in 1921 Archibald Whitelock purchased it for \$4,100 and also took possession of the Effie McLachlin lot for \$120. In 1951 Alexander Campbell became the owner and also acquired the remainder of the lots. In 1976 Kenneth Campbell, through the Veteran's Land Act, became the owner and in 1979 Stanley James Campbell purchased the entire 100 acres from Kenneth Campbell. The only building on the property is a barn.



Lot C, Concession 4

John McTavish (or Thomson)

John McTavish, born in 1768 in Argyleshire, Scotland and his wife, Jane McNichol born in 1781 in Argyleshire, came to Canada in 1842 and settled on North 1/2 of Lot 22, Concession 4. With them came their three adult sons and their families.

The eldest, Angus, lived at Lot 22, Concession 4, where Horace Guest now lives (see N 1/2, Lot 22, Conc. 4, by J.D. Thomson).

The second son, Archibald, lived at N 1/2, Lot 23, Conc. 3, where Donald and Shirley Campbell live. (see N 1/2, Lot 23, Conc. 4, by Mrs. Margaret McTavish.)

The third son, John McTavish (or Thomson) was born in Scotland in 1819, married Nancy McLaren and came to Canada with his parents in 1842, settling on Lot C, Concession 4, Dunwich. They had three sons and three daughters. Nancy McTavish died at the age of 37 years on May 3, 1854 and is the first person to be buried at Cowal Cemetery.

John McTavish married a second time to Mrs. Battin, nee Christena McLarty, who had six children by her first marriage, thus making a family of 12 children. To their union two more were born - Lauchlin and Christena.

After his father's death, Lauchlin left the farm and it was sold to Clinton Stanley, who in turn sold to AlexPollard. He sold the buildings off the farm in 1920. Robert Campbell was the next owner and when he died left it to his two children, David Campbell and Mary Irvine. Ronald Campbell now rents it for corn and soybeans.

John McTavish, born in 1819, married Nancy McLaren, born in 1817 and died in 1854, age 37 years. They came to Canada in 1842.

Their family:

- Angus died 1871 at the age of 30 years.
- John died 1862 at the age of 20 years.
- Archie born December 5, 1848, married on December 27, 1897, to Annie Morrison. Lived in Cowal. Their family is John D. Thomson, Archie Thomson, and Annabelle Thomson Quigley.
- Catherine died 1853, age 11 years.
- Mary died 1911, never married.
- Jane died 1914, never married.

Second family with Mrs. Battin, Christena (McLarty) :

- Lachlin born 1869, died 1947. He married Lizzie Hamilton. For many years was a Superintendent for a hydro station in Lucan. One daughter, Minnie, married Jack Gernaey, and after his death married Harold Fisher, London, where they make their home.
- Christena married Peter Carruth. They had two daughters, Florence, born 1900 and died in 1926 from pneumonia, buried in Cowal Cemetery. Emma Christena (Tena) born August 28, 1904, died June 20, 1972. She was only a few days old when her mother died and the Battin family in Middlemiss raised her. Tena married J.A. Patterson and had two daughters, Yvonne and Jeanne (see Lot 23, Conc. 4, J.A. Patterson).

The Battin family were Belle, Mary, Jane, John (who never married and lived with the McPhail family in Largie) Alex (who married Margaret Kennedy, a native of Belmont, but resided in Ekfrid for over 50 years)

The family of Alex and Margaret (Kennedy) Battin were:

- Linda born 1888, never married, lived in London where she worked as a secretary and a nurse. Died 1972
