Groundbreaking at Arts and Cookery

A groundbreaking ceremony was held at the Arts and Cookery Bank in West Lorne Oct. 1, bringing the project another step towards completion.

Over 60 people joined in the fun at the Dig Day Celebration, with guests as young as five months and as senior as old as 95 years were encouraged to pick up a shovel for a ceremonial turning of soil where the building's planned extensions will go.

"This 'shovel-ready' project offers immediate benefits for our communities, including job creation and community-wide economic benefits," said Graham Warwick, Warden of Elgin County and Mayor of West Elgin. The Bank project is slated to be completed by the end of March 2010. The project will restore, retrofit and equip a 1914 heritage building on Graham Rd.

The finished building will be a regional, cultural destination, offering a snapshot of Dutton-Dunwich, Newbury, Southwest Middlesex and West Elgin's rural communities, by blending photographic and cooking experiences.

Supporters of the project hope The Bank will promote local heritage/culture and tourism, and also attract new investment and jobs into the region.

"The uniqueness of our heritage, from the Thames River watershed to the shores of Lake Erie, con-

nects people in the villages, hamlets and outlying farmlands of Dutton-Dunwich, Newbury, Southwest Middlesex and West Elgin. This interrelationship began in 1803 and continues 205 years later. Our similar history and development has resulted in a common heritage," said board member Norma Schnekenburger in a press release.

"In the end, this will be the bank that the people built, the community built," said board member Duncan Morrison.

The project is scheduled for completion in Fall 2009. The board is using a public-private partnership approach to raise funds for the project, including government and private grants and community fundraising. The board of the Arts and Cookery Bank also hope the bank will

> allow an opportunity for heritage and cultural workshops for school programs.

"This centre has an opportunity, as a cultural hub, to act as a magnet, pull many facets together in our community. And be able to stimulate economic development," said Grace McGartland.

West Lorne to get community heritage centre

West Lorne is getting a new community heritage centre, which hopes to draw tourism and celebrate local history.

The Arts and Cookery Bank will showcase local heritage and culture through photographs and cuisine. The not-for-profit Bank will have a photo gallery that will display the community's past, images of what makes it great in the present, and some visions of what it could be in the future. The Bank will also try to inspire interest in local foodeconomy with hands-on cooking experiences. The Bank will be at 242 Graham Road in West Lorne, in the building that was once a real bank.

Project Chair Grace McGartland said that our community's strengths are it's unique rural heritage and local food-economy. The board for the Bank have a vision of this attraction pulling together the farming community, restauranteurs, people involved in recreational clubs, and the rest of the public.

"We plan to restore the 1914 Bank of Montreal building. This two-storey existing brick structure will become a photography gallery with a multimedia component. There will be an addition on the west/back side of the building to house a hands-on chef's demonstration kitchen facility as well as a digital photography learning lab," said McGartland.

McGartland said that research indicates that tourists are likely to spend more money if they stay in an area overnight. One of their goals is for the new Bank to have that kind of drawing power.

"Research done by Tourism Ontario, cited in 2004 indicates that the traveler who has more discretionary income is looking specifically for rural experiences," she said.

Heather Bell, President of the West Elgin Chamber of Commerce said this project is something to look forward to.

"I think it's an absolute asset; a cornerstone to the community and our community improvement plan," said Bell.

There will be a public open house at the Arts and Cookery Bank from noon until 4:00p.m June 7. The \$750,000 project is meant to show heritage from the four surrounding municipalities, Dutton/Dunwich, Newbury, Southwest Middlesex and West Elgin.

THE OLDEST BUILDING IN CRINAN

In the late 1840's Colin McLennan built a log house out of black ash logs and tamarack rafters. Colin made a wonderful job, that building is not only standing today it is still in use. The black ash logs were hand hewn with a broad axe. It was a 2-story house but there were only 7 logs used on each side.

Colin married Janet Finlayson and they had 5 boys and 1 girl. Colin died when he was still a young man. The oldest boy was only 14 years old. Janet and her family ran the farm for the next 12 years. When Janet died one of the boys ran the farm for a few years. Then he sold the farm to John Campbell a next -door neighbour. In 1910 Jack Webster bought the farm and built a new frame house and some barns, and changed the log house to a pigpen. In 1918 Jack Webster sold the farm to Urquharts. He ran the farm until 1945, when he sold it to Harold and Muriel Carroll. We roofed the log pen twice and put pine siding on the outside of the logs.


We sold the farm to son Alan and Karen in 1979. They put a metal roof on the pigpen and used it for pigs until 2000. He then took one end out and uses it for implements.

The logs served as a house for 61 years, as a pigpen for 89 years and implements for 6 years.

OCTAGONAL BARN

(Information provided by Branika Savic - present owner in 2007)

This barn was located in the Municipality of West Elgin - aka Aldborough Township, concession 7, SE ¼ Lot 20.

The property on which this barn was situated has a long history, for much of which Charles W. Baker or his descendants owned it. The BARN was constructed in the fall of 1899 when owned by Herbert Baker, son of Charles. Herbert and his family had left Aldborough in the spring of 1889 to live in South Dakota where the construction of octagonal or circular barns was popular most likely giving him the idea to construct a similar barn here in Aldborough.

The farm was in Frank Baker's name when sold to Milutin and Natalija Savic in 1958. This property had been in the hands of the Baker family for 86 years.

The Savic's sold the BARN to a Ms.Spence who dismantled it to be reconstructed in Kent County at a later time.



1861-2006

It was between the years 1850 to 1860, that the first Presbyterian families came from the Highlands of Scotland to this area, which was to be known as Crinan. They were people with vision and daring enterprise. They were imbued with religious principles, anxious to have the word of God kept before them.

Occasional services were held from 1853 to 1860. In 1860, the union of the Presbyterians of Wardsville and Crinan formed a self – sustaining congregation. In 1861, Rev. Neil McKinnon, then a missionary, accepted the call to be their minister, making his home in Wardsville.

In 1871, Wardsville wished to dissolve the union, joining with Newbury. The Presbytery granted the request and the Crinan congregation carried on, on its own. In 1885, the old frame church was remodelled, with brick veneer and re-seating some of the changes. In 1896, the congregation built sheds for the accommodation of the horses.

On June 25th, 1911, Crinan celebrated the Golden Jubilee with Rev. R.F. McKay of London as guest speaker. In honour of the pioneers of the community, former residents gave a fumed oak pulpit and communion table to the church.

In 1925, after church union, Argyle Church voted to remain Presbyterian and the pastoral charges of Crinan and Largie were linked together.

In 1947, it was decided to remodel the church building. The structure was moved back twenty feet from the roadway; most useable material from the old building was used in the new. The original cherry and oak pews were refinished and re-installed in a new seating arrangement. New memorial windows replaced the frosted white panes. There were other changes made which enhanced the building to make it the beautiful church it is to-day. In the afternoon of Thursday, June 17th, 1948, London Presbytery dedicated the remodelled building.

Much of the honour for the accomplishment of the project was due to the leadership and time given by the minister Rev. Wm. Sutherland. We remember also Alexander "Sandy" Stewart who planned and supervised the work and the community volunteers who worked together in such a fine spirit of cooperation.

When, in September 1998, the West Lorne Knox Presbyterian Church closed its doors for the last time, several members transferred their membership to the Argyle Presbyterian Church. This union has strengthened the church in its work to God's glory.

On this, one hundred and forty-fifth anniversary, may we ever be mindful of the ministers and the people of the congregations who through the years gave us this church as it holds open its doors today. They can rest assured "their labour is not in vain in the Lord". May God bless us and make us worthy of our rich heritage.
