Community Outreach Seminar

Participants in the second annual Community Outreach Seminar held recently near St. Thomas were told to aim for a goal in order to get the most from what was offered.

Pat Ferraro, president of Well Said, proposed the 125 women attending from across Southwestern Ontario set a goal they felt so strongly about they would not want to give it up.

"That's how I want you to feel about today. Succeeding is fun but, to get the most life has to offer, you have to contribute, aim for goals and motivate yourself to suceed," contended Ferraro.

The owner of Well Said, a public speaking service company which offers consulting, guest speaking and seminars, has spoken at Women's Institute conventions and meetings.

She suggested the trouble with human beings is they don't motivate themselves to take great challenges.

She felt participants could turn the day into a success for themselves by taking a challenge or go home with it being mediocre.

She pointed out they wouldn't learn from the workshops unless they set a goal to learn.

"A big mistake in life is to believe you only learn in school," she said.
"I have learned more from people I have met than any other source of education."

She returned to school at 34 after having quit in grade 11. She received a degree in Business Administration with a major in Sales and Marketing from Sheridan College of Applied Arts and Technology and an English credit from Guelph University.

Ferraro said people involved in her seminars differ very little since most are concerned with increasing their ability to verbally communicate.

"If you want to suceeed today or at any goal in life you have to put some effort into it," she suggested.

The workshops available provided not only that motivation, but some unique and unusual experiences.

The program which was organized by last year's committee made up of Women's Institute members, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food personel and Women for Support of Agriculture representatives provided diverse and interesting topics for the day.

They included learning how to stencil, various aspects of interior decorating, expressing oneself with confidence, make-overs, aspects of the Ontario Family Law Act and "incredible edibles" which included dandelion root coffee, rosehip syrup and Day Lily stir-fry.

DOROTHY FUTCHER HONORED

Were she still alive, Dorothy Futcher would have felt humble on Sunday, says her son Allison.

The Elgin County woman, who was active in the Women's Institute and worked hard to improve the quality of rural life before she died in 1984, was inducted into the Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame.

"She just loved a challenge," said Allison Futcher. Mr. Futcher, his brother, John, and sisters Robin Jeffery and Isabel Martin attended a special ceremony at the museum in Milton, located about 50 kilometres west of Toronto. With the exception of Mrs. Jeffery, who now lives in Belleville, Ontario, all the children still live in the St. Thomas area.

Mrs. Futcher held executive titles in all levels of the Women's Institute, and was concerned about education, religion, history and the quality of life in the country throughout her life.

She was president of the Middlemarch Women's Institute, West Elgin District, director and president of the Federated Women's Institute of Ontario and travelled to Copenhagen and Toronto to take part in two world conferences of the Association of Country Women of the World.

She was given the Ontario Agricultural College Medal after sitting for many years on the board of directors of the college, and was appointed by the province to the Archeological and Historical Sites Board. The also served as director of the women's division of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto.

She founded the Elgin County Pioneer Museum in St. Thomas in 1954 and put in many long hours to develop the facility. She served as its chairman from 1954 to 1980. Mrs. Futcher was named woman of the year by the St. Thomas University Women's Club in 1971 at the Talbot Shivaree.

A member of First United Church, Mrs. Futcher was an active member of the United Church Women. Her husband was J. R. Futcher, a preminent Elgin County farmer. Mrs. Jeffery said Mr. Futcher would have been proud of the recognition his wife had received.
