

'Senior Power' was overflowing in the St. Thomas-Elgin General Hospital atrium Friday.

Several presentations and information displays were set up for the Senior Celebration Health Fair. The one-day event was organized by representatives from the Valleyview Seniors Drop-In Centre, the Elgin-St. Thomas Health Unit, the YWCA, and many other individual volunteers.

"Retiring doesn't mean you stop living," Ruth McCully, program coordinator for the drop-in centre, said.

She said a senior at Valleyview came up with the health fair idea and organizers also heard about a similar event in Windsor at Expo '90. Since January of this year, they were busy getting various displays together. June seemed an appropriate date because it is seniors month, organizer Shirley Kosky said.

"We really wanted to capitalize on wellness," she added.

Ms McCully said seniors have much more vitality these days be cause there is more emphasis on get ting involved, and leading healthier lifestyles.

Eva Curtis is one of 35 members in the drop-in centre's Young at Art program. She is 82 years old and has been painting for the past few years. Three of her watercolor paintings were on display at the fair.

"It gives us something extra to do," she said, adding that events like the health fair encourage seniors to get out and be active.

The art display had a variety of watercolor and acrylic paintings. Other displays included: Fitness for Seniors by the YWCA, Faith, Hope and Love - The Spiritual Life of Seniors by Rev. Malcolm Rust, Tai Chi (Chinese martial art) by Lyn Levandoski, Cooking for One by the health unit, and Linedancers by the Silver Threads. There was also a dance Friday night.
