Standing of Payne's Mills Community Hall, Past and Present, Is Explained.

Old and New Trustees Set Forth Terms Under Which It is Operated.

Editor; The Times-Journal; Sir--

As there is an erroneous impression abroad regarding the Payne's Mills Community Hall, we being the old and the new trustees of the hall wish to correct this impression with a few facts. We are all residents of the community.

1. The old trustees (in trust) were appointed by the community before the hall was built as was also the land deeded (in trust) and all funds (monies and donations included)—Lumber, Timber, Gravel for concrete, a number of chairs, curtains (for entertainment) which has since been removed with the closing of the United Church.

2. The trustees (in trust) were further handicapped by not being allowed to charge the community for the use of the

hall, which left them without any funds to maintain the hall and sheds.

3. Now the Provincial Government passed an Act in 1920 to assist rural halls in such standing as this:

(a) The hall must come up to a standard; (b) Deed must be placed with the Township Council, which is a permanent body, which holds the deed for the community as the community is constantly changing; (c) The Council in turn appoint the trustees from the community, organizations having first place. Therefore, if there was a church here they would be entitled to one trustee on the board, a privilege they could not enfoy before. The grant from the Government is 25 percent of finished building.

4. The old deed (in trust) states distinctly that the land was given for building of a hall for Sunday School, preaching, social and business gatherings.

5. Contributors to the building of the hall: The community at large, Union Sunday School, a Presbyterian mission under the Rev. Robert McIntyre, patrons of the cheese factory, ladies of the community, later known as the Gleaners, and a number from outside points among whom were the Messrs. Payne of London, their ancestors gave the name of Payne's Mills. All these were working with the trustees (in trust) to complete the hall.

This hall was given the name Union Hall Payne's Mills.

6. This hall was given the name Union Hall, Payne's Mills, as all were working in unionism. The name is displayed on front of the hall which was built in 1906.

7. For some time back there has been an agitation to have the trustees elected from the community at certain intervals, which was as it should be, but was impossible only by a course of law as the hall was "in trust".

Council and the trustees duly elected. The trustees at present are: John McGugan, George Milligan, E. N. Styles, Charles Munro and Alf Blackman, all from the community, and R. Kimble and F. Coutts for the Council. 9. The uses of the hall is fully explained in the following: Section 6. of Regulations Community Halls, 1920: "Every hall erected under this Act shall be available for public gatherings of an educational, fraternal, religious or social nature or for the discussion of any public question, and no organization shall be denied the use of the hall for religious, fraternal or political reasons. 10. Regarding the closing of the United Church at Payne's Mills: A letter is on file with the present trustees showing that the church was closed on account of church union. 11. In regard the dances and entertainments given in the hall lately, there have been a few dances, two social emenings, one a presentation to George Berdan (an old neighbour and former trustee): a Christmas tree, with other doings in the near future by the young people of the community; a play: Elgin Girls Institute and the Community Club of the community, all of which has been and will be conducted above board and with an eye to the welfare of the community. 12. All doings in the hall must be in connection with the community. All the above doings are under the direction of members of the community.

Payne's Mills United Church Closes October 30
Friends of Rev. George Gilmore and Family Tender Them
Banquet and Present Well-filled Purse.

Payne's Mills, Oct. 28---Sunday, Oct. 30, marks the closing of the Payne's Mills United Church. On Wednesday evening a large gathering of the friends of Rev. and Mrs. George Gilmore and family honored them by a farewell banquet. Mr. Gilmore has been pastor of this church for nearly five years. An appreciation of his labors was shown by the presentation of a well-filled purse, Vermont Pow, one of the leading elders, making the presentation and Albert Bawden, another elder, reading the well-worded address. Mr. Gilmore was assured that his preaching had been clear, forcible, with comfort, encouragement and instruction, but above all had rung out with clearness the message of the wickedness and destruction of sin; of a living faith in Christ as the one effectual remedy: of the vanity of expecting any marked spiritual attainment so long as there is admixture with sin. All had been deeply impressed with the thorough consistency of his daily walk. He had not made the pastorate a mere social function. He had given time and energies unsparingly. It would be hard to overestimate the good influence exerted by such a personality as Mrs. Gilmore's in her kuskand influential position. She had entered heartily into the various branches of the church's work and had shown herself the pastor's worthy helpmate. In his response, Mr. Gilmore assured his people of his deep appreciation, and reminded them that theugh they might not be aware of it, they had, by their sympathy and co-operation, contributed largely to whatever success he had attained. Mrs. Gilmore also made a feeling reply. Morley Parker, another elder, acted as chairman for the evening. General regret is expressed at the closing of the work at Payne's Mills. Sunday School was organized here in the schoolhouse in 1898, when the late Dr. McBane was the teacher and was largely his interest. Preaching services began in 1905, conducted by Rev. Robert McIntyre. Out of this grew the Presbyterian church, organized three years later, the hall being erected because of the need felt for a place of worship. Rev. W. T. Cranston and Rev. N. Stevenson are other NEXXX pastors who have labored here.
