#### Farms of River Road Community

In our River Road Community with the possible exception of one farm none remain in the name of the grantor of the Crown Deed.

Many have been sold several times. Some have been subdivided or enlarged by the acquision of neighbouring land, others remain in the same family with the owner bearing a different name. It is difficult to write a completely detailed history of each but we have endeavoured to give the names of original and present (1966) owners as well as many of the names of some of those who have owned the properties through the intervening years. The farms are situated on land bordering the Bush Road, Mill Road, Southwold Road, West River Road, River Road, East River Road, which formerly was east of its present location in the valley below.

In the southern part of the community several farms were settled by members of the Fulton family from Iriland. The Campbells from Scotland settled on the River Road. Included in the names of other early settlers are, Monro, McIntosh, McLarty, McIntyre, Mellor, Chaplow, Doan, Davis, Francis, Nicol, Joiner, Brady, Thompson, Geary, Rapelji, Lipsey and others.

Lot 41 -

Mr. Richard Lindsay's farm was originally the property of Mr. Chas. Treadwell, he being the son of T.M. Treadwell who originally owned the Talbot street farm now owned by Jack Ferguson. Dr. John Rolfe once lived in a humble log house on the Treadwell farm. He was paymaster to Col. Talbot's regiment during the war of 1812.

Mr. Lindsay married Annie Jones and they had seven children Thelma, Addelene, Jack, Morley, Fred, Mildred and Robert.

Fred Lindsay Jr. has built a house on a lot on his father's farm in 1943. He lives there with his wife Catherine McPherson Lindsay and their two children Alice and Alex.

Mr. R. Lindsay passed away June, 1945, and his wife still resides on the farm.

Fred Lindsay Jr. passed away Feb. 1949, and his wife and children still reside on their lot.

Jack Lindsay built a new home on the farm in 1959, and he passed away Jan. 1961. His wife with her two sons, John and David and daughters Bernice and Patricia reside there.

Mrs. R. Lindsay passed away in Oct. 1961, and the farm is now owned by Mrs. J. L. Lindsay. (Mrs. C. Haley)

Jim Coleman's farm was settled by Mr. Lee. He had one son who lived in Detroit. Mr. Lee died and his widow married Larry Coleman and she gave the farm to Larry who afterwards gave the farm to his son James. James had two sisters Mary and Alice. This farm was later conveyed to John Sommerville and then to J. Y. Harper. Tenants now occupy this place.

Adair Douglas built on this lot on the corner of the J.Y. Harper farm. Later Adair Douglas sold the house to a Mr. W. Airheart and moved to Glencoe.

william Chaplow immigrated from England in 1843 and settled in St. Thomas where he carried on the business of manufacturing for 17 years. He then bought the farm afterwards occupied by John and William Chaplow and went into farming and stock dealing until his death in 1884.

Mr. Chaplow bought the farm from Honsinger who lived on the flats.

The William Chaplow farms was afterwards owned by his son Fred but it is occupied by Mr. Bob Johnson who resides there with his wife and family.

This farm was sold to Dr. R. Tucker and then to Mr. L. Van Tright and then to a Mr. E. Bridge and is now occupied by tenants. This house was destroyed by fire in 1969.

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## THE CLAY BARN

An old landmark that has disappeared from the River Road neighborhood was a combination drive-barn and horse stable on the John Chaplow farm on the south corner of East River Road and the Bush Road. This farm is better known to present day residents as the Douglas or the Van Reppelin farm.

The barn was situated at the end of the long lane to the right of the house. The size would be approximately 36 x 40 feet. The walls of the stable were about 2 & feet thick and the mixture which formed them was blue clay mixed with wheat straw and water. Horses were walked back and forth through this mixture until it was the right consistency to be handled by men and shaped into the walls. It stabled six horses. The stalls were in a row along the south wall and the horses faced into the wall. This made it necessary to walk in beside the horses in order to put feed in the manger boxes. There were double doors both at the east and west sides of the building which were wide and high enough to drive ( ) ligh top buggy straight through. There was enough room behind the stalls to store two or three buggies and a cutter. In this part there were about four windows along the north wall. Overtop was a hayloft. the floor of this made the ceiling for the barn and stable below. It was made of unhewn logs with the bark still on and rough pine flooring over them. The roof was formed of unpeeled poles covered with the rough pine sheeting and cedar shingles.

With the six horses in there it was always warm and never reached freezing point in winter. To supple the water needs, a huge cistern was built right against the outside wall and wooden eavestroughs fed the rainwater down into it. The cistern was planked and when the planking started to give way this caused the crumbling of the clay walls at this point.

I do not know if there was another barn like this in the district and have no record of when it was built. It was torn down in the early ninteen-thirties while the Douglas family were residents on the farm.
