fairgrounds on Francis
Street in the village. The
building was split and
widened and the hip roof
installed. When it was
first used at the present
site, it was just a shell,
meant for summertime
use only, housing displays at fair-time.

In the 1960's Murray "Barnie" Walch approached the fair board with an idea to improve the building to use it for dances. Mr. Walch, who had a band, installed the terrazzo floor and corrals along the sides and soon dances were held on a

regular basis there. Nicknamed "T Corral" it did not become the Shedden Country Club until several years later. At the time it was considered one of the best dance floors in the area.

Over the years there have been many improvements to the building such as adding insulation, finishing the walls, and an addition to the building for washrooms, a kitchen and furnace room. Owned by the Shedden Fair Board, it has been in continual use.

The exact origin of the Shedden Country Club building is somewhat hazy. Apparently there are several different opinions on where the building came from and when it might have actually been built.


According to the Ontario Association of Agricultural Society's history book, the first Southwold and Dunwich exhibition was held in 1854 in Iona. Exhibits were housed in the drill shed of B Company 25th Battalion Ontario Militia. The exhibition was then moved to

the Village of Shedden where it was held on rented land, moving to its current location in 1951 when the board purchased a parcel of land. Shedden Agricultural Society was formed in 1966. The present land for the Shedden fair was purchased from Albert Bautenheimer who offered to sell the front 20 acres of a 50-acre lot.

While one person believes that the building was constructed at the present site, many think that the building was moved from the former



Wraps come off Keystone Complex

SHEDDEN — Sod was broken during a thunderstorm and the grand opening was held during an ice storm.

But weather aside, the new Southwold Keystone Complex officially opened Saturday.

Adverse weather events do not deter the determined, hardworking community-minded people of Southwold who, very appropriately, have an industrious beaver as their township logo.

Standing before the large crowd who braved the ice storm to attend the opening of the new community centre building,

of Southwold and warden of Elgin, said, "This shows what a people working together can do."

Following the singing of O Canada, led by Betty Gribbon, master of ceremonies Iim Swan talked about the endurance of Southwold residents.

"Mother Nature had one more little test to see if Perry Clutterbuck, mayor - you would come out for the opening of this building, and you made it, and made it in legion numbers," he said. "Today we're going to have a good time and make history."

The land where the new building sits was purchased originally from Albert Bautenheimer who sold a 20acres tract in 1966 to the agricultural society as a site for the Shedden fair. The site is just east of the main intersection.

The building that eventually appeared on the land was a mere shell of a structure for fair displays until Murray "Barnie" Walch, who had his own band, approached the fair board with the idea to improve the building to use for dances. He installed a terrazzo floor and built corrals along the sides. Soon he was drawing capacity crowds to Saturday night country dances in "The Corral" as it came to be know. Later called the Shedden Country Club, this building remains standing near the new facility. Future plans for the old centre may include a picnic shelter and basketball court.

The new complex cost about \$500,000 and was built by HIRA Ltd. The township now owns the new building and the whole section of land formerly owned by the Shedden Agricultural Society. The society sold the land to the toumchin for

\$1 when the complex was in the planning stages. The community has raised about half the total amount, and fundraising continues. Clutterbuck said the building was not meant to be paid for by tax dollars, and all future donations will come off the reserve loan.


The Rosy Rhubarb festival was created mainly as a fundraiser for the new building.

"It was Rosy Rhubarb that really got it going," Clutterbuck said.

The grand opening was a time to remember a man who Southwold community steering committee member Pat Quin described as "the spirit of Rosy Rhubarb", the late Gary Carr. Each year he donned the red-andgreen rhubarb costume to help raise money for his community during the rhubarb festival.

His widow, Eileen, and his son, Dan, were called to the stage by Southwold Coun. Stan Lidster to help carry a photograph of Carr in the rhubarb costume to the wall of the meeting room in the new building, which will be named the Rosy Rhubarb Room.

"We will remember Gary with warmth," Swan said. "He epitomized how far people in Southwold will go to get things done."







Planning tribute to Southwold war veterans

As a tribute to the men and women of Southwold Township who served in the World Wars, a War Veterans' Memorial is being constructed at the Southwold Keystone Complex.

This project is the second phase of the landscaping of the recently-constructed facility to create a public memorial to those residents who fought for their country.

Two huge rocks, each weighing between 4-5 tons, have been placed in the centre of a circular walkway. According to Project Co-ordinator Len Lynch. drawn from the roots of the township, these are meant to be symbolic of the two great wars.

One rock was donated by former Southwold Reeve Albert Auckland. The stone was discovered in the 1930's w''s several attempts move it

LIVECT TITTE earthed the massive rock in 1973 and it has remained on the familv farm near Talbotville since then. The second rock was donated by the Jenner family near Boxall.

Centred between these stones will be a 4-foot old world sundial, representative of "time remembered for all ages." The area will also include three flagstaffs, with the Canadian flag in the centre, and the provincial and municipal flags on either side, slightly lower than the Maple Leaf.

Trees will be planted to frame the area along with other landscaping.

The names of those who served from the township in World War I and II are needed to be included in this memorial. The committee in charge of this phase - Melba Marr, Karen Collard, Brenda and Jamie McArthur, Pat and Fred Temple and Stan Jones - are asking for the public's help in obtaining the names of these people.

Depending on the research for the names of veterans, organizers would like to hold an official dedication ceremony of the area during Rosy Rhubarb weekend in June. 2000. A township Remembrance Day service is planned for the site on November 11th, 2000.

Along with collecting names, the committee would like to obtain listed men and women and any personal family and military records to produce a "Book of Remembrance" as a secondary project.

THE SHEDDEN AND DISTRICT GOLDEN AGE CLUB

The Shedden and District Golden Age Club was formed in the fall of 1975. The club had about thirty members initially and they decided to meet every Wednesday afternoon in the Odd Fellows Hall in Shedden. It was decided to apply for a New Horizons Grant from the Federal Government and \$8,986.00 was received. The money was used to remodel the first floor of the Odd Fellows Hall and to purchase new chairs, games and a movie projector.

In July, 1977 the club name was changed to the Southwold Golden Age Club as so many of the members came from the outlying district. Frank Martin of Shedden was the first president Mrs. Arthur Carder (Margaret) also of Shedden was the first secretary and Charles Jackson of Fingal was the first treasurer.
