

Complex "Dream-to-Reality"

Despite the less-than-ideal weather conditions, a good crowd was on hand to witness the official opening of the Southwold Keystone Complex on Saturday afternoon. CKSL radio personality Jim Swan acted as master of ceremonies for the event.

Mr. Swan, who emceed the Friday evening program of Rosy Rhubarb Days for its first four years, was pleased to be involved in the opening of the building. He admired "the grit, courage and conviction needed to make this building possible."

"We will make history as we open this building," said Mr. Swan.

Weather Uncooperative

Southwold Mayor Perry Clutterbuck, who is also Warden of Elgin, said that the weather just doesn't seem to co-operate with this building since the sod turning was held in a thunderstorm.

"This building shows what people working together can do," stated Mayor Clutterbuck. He made note of how Rosy Rhubarb really got things off the ground.

In the absence of Elgin-

Middlesex-London M.P. Gar Knutson, Ann McLean brought greetings on his behalf. In his written letter he stated, "I consider myself lucky to represent a riding where the constituents care so much. You must be very proud of this accomplishment." He also donated a Canadian flag with a promise to replace it whenever needed.

Community Spirit

"This complex is dream-to-reality," said Elgin M.P.P. Peter North. He noted that in his seven years as Elgin's M.P.P. he has regularly attended the Shedden Fair and Rosy Rhubarb Days. "People do the strangest things here. There was a man who dressed up as a rhubarb leaf....I'm sure today that man is very proud." stated Mr. North.

Ribbon Cutting

Cutting the ribbon to mark the official opening of the complex were Mayor Clutterbuck, Ann McLean, M.P.P. North, and members of the Southwold Community Steering Committee Connie Silcox, Glenn Doan, Allan Bogart, Ralph Palmer, Eileen Carr, Christine Roberts and Pat Quin.

The keys to the new facility were presented by Andy Spriet of Spriet Associates, engineers of the building, and Jeff Bill of H.I.R.A. General Contractors to Mayor Clutterbuck and John Carder, manager of the Keystone Complex.

Shedden's famous rhubarb sauce closely guarded community secret

SHEDDEN — The Colonel's secret recipe would be safe with Jean Palmer. He may have written the book on finger lickin' good chicken but Jean married rhubarb with ice cream to put Shedden on the culinary map.

And like the Colonel, don't dare ask what goes into her secret rhubarb sauce.

For eight years it has been the talk of Rosy Rhubarb Days although few are any

the wiser as to the exact ingredients.

"It began with the first festival," Palmer said, "when we decided we should have something different. Someone suggested hot rhubarb sauce."

An old family recipe proved ideal and that June a new taste sensation was the talk of the town.

"I have this recipe in the family, and we use it at other times of the year but it's mainly for Rhubarb Days."

That first year her committee sold about \$450 worth of

ice cream and tangy rhubarb sauce.

"This past year it was about \$1,500," beamed Palmer. "And the recipe hasn't changed over those eight years."

Each year she entrusts the preparation to one or two other women who are sworn to secrecy.

"We buy the rhubarb and all of the other ingredients and this year we made up 14 pails of sauce."

No amount of prodding or skullduggery will reveal any of those ingredients. In fact the closest you will get is the

briefest hint of the taste that would do a vintner proud.

"It's not too sweet, just a little tart because the ice cream sweetens it up. It's a happy medium."

The nameless topping has not been committed to paper or neatly typed into some computer recipe file although her children are aware of it which should ensure the ice cream will be brightly topped for many festivals to come.

"The recipe is not written down," she said. "People think I go by guess and by golly sometimes, but we know what we're doing."



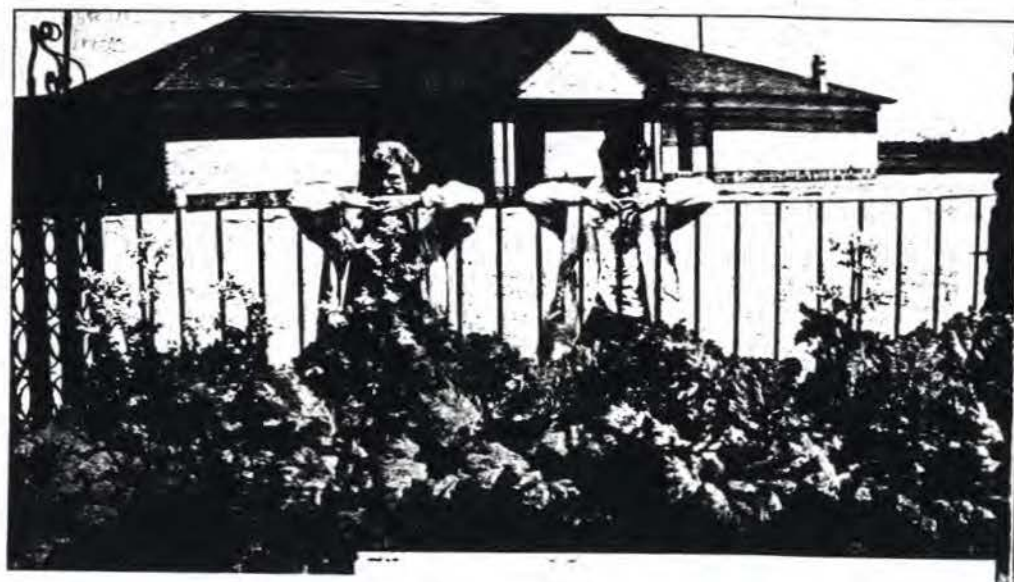

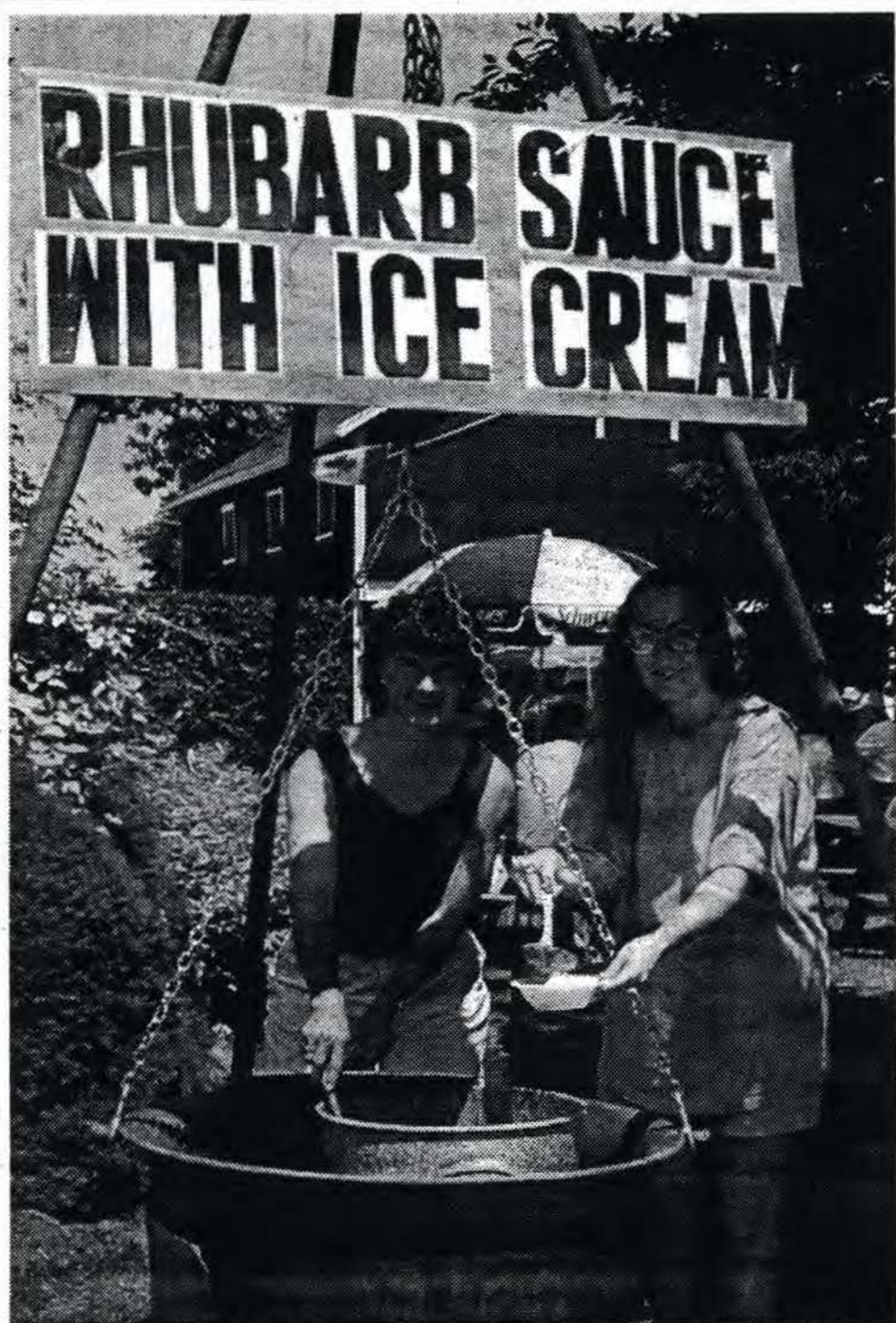

Rosy Rhubarb Festival celebrates 10th anniversary

"Slow Down and Listen to the Rhubarb Grow," exclaims the sign as you drive into the Village of Shedden, a peaceful little enclave located along highway # 3 in the heart of Elgin County's Southwold Township.

Rosy Rhubarb was born out of a plan by community members to raise money for a much-needed sports complex and community center. Now celebrating its 10th anniversary the annual event has raised thousands of dollars and most of it continues to go to completing projects connected to the Keystone Sports Complex, which was opened in 1998 and serves, not only Shedden but the entire community of Southwold Township and many of its nearby communities. The complex is now home to a variety of community events and organizations. Funds from this year's festival are being

directed to the completion of a picnic pavilion adjacent to the complex.

As you drive through Shedden, the building that is most likely to catch your attention is Palmer Bros. Supermarket with its flaming red and white façade. The business has been operated by the Palmer family for 80 years and continues to function as the village's hub. Family member, and co-manager, Murray Silcox his the business has flourished since 1922 but added that when Highway 401 was completed it took many travelers off the village's main street. "The Rosy Rhubarb Festival gives people a reason to get off the main highway and enjoy the village's many amenities. The festival creates a kind of carnival atmosphere and the event raises a lot of money for the community," he says. "The committee is pretty good, they help out in a lot of community

projects along with supporting the sports complex."

Silcox adds that his store sells nearly a ton of rhubarb each year that make up the ingredients of the 3,000 to 4,000 pies that are sold at the festival each year as well as jam and a plethora of other food items. He adds that he bakes and sells rhubarb pies in his store all year round. "It's such a versatile product," he says.

One of the original Rosy Rhubarb committee members, Eileen Carr says the annual festival is a phenomenon that continues to grow each year. She adds that rhubarb had little or nothing to do with the founding of the village by John Shedden, who was responsible for bringing the railroad through the area in the 1800s. Or indeed, she admits, did it really have anything to do with the area's agricultural production.

"A lot of people in town grow

small patches of it but it isn't like we have hundreds of acres of it ...when we first got together to plan a fundraising event we thought we'd like to have it early in June before the children were out of school," she said. "Strawberries seemed like a logical choice but we decided against that because you can never depend on how long the strawberry season will last ... so we settled on a rhubarb festival and the thing just took off from there."

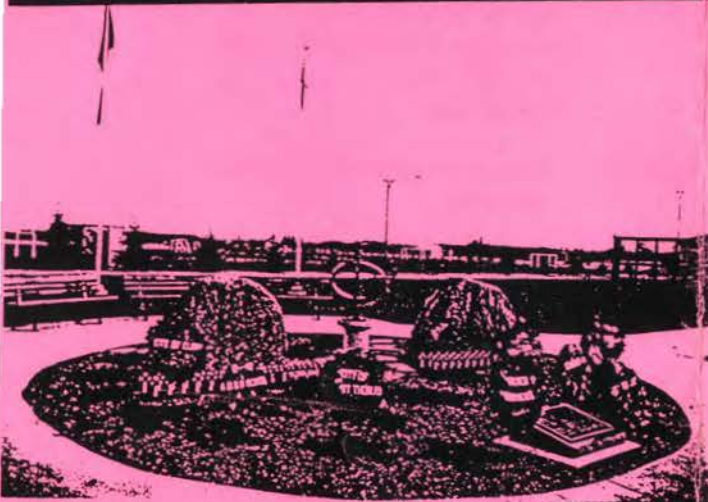
Carr says that thousands of people from all over North America attend the festival each year. "It's really got so big we wonder if we are going to be able to handle it at times," she says and adds, "A lot of home-town people like to come back to it."

This year will mark the event's tenth anniversary and Carr says a number of new events are planned. "The train that normally runs from Port Stanley to St.

Thomas will run three trips a day from St. Thomas to Shedden," she says. "On the Friday evening Dutton's town crier will welcome the first train with a special ceremony."

Carr says the three-day festival will continue to include the traditional events such as entertainment, horse-drawn rides and garage sales all over town. But the premier fundraising event will continue to be the annual Pie Baking contest and sale. "Pies are judged and the winning pies are auctioned off ... the winning pie often brings more than \$100," says Carr. "I wouldn't want to guess how many pies are sold each year but I know it's in the thousands ...they are sold whole or by the piece with ice cream." She adds that a local business donates a homemade quilt each year that is also auctioned off and last year brought more than \$1,000.

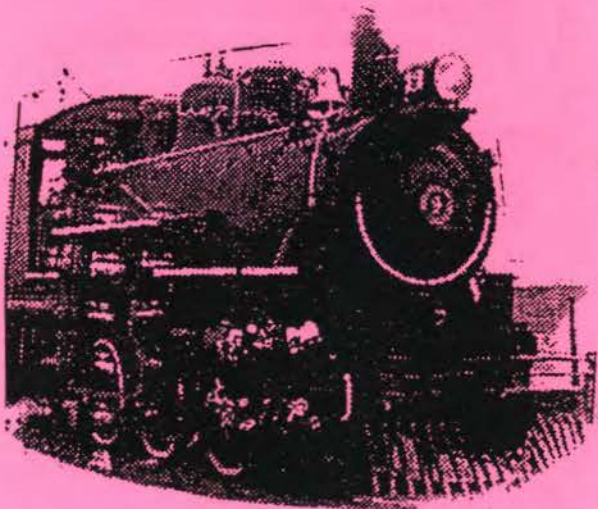

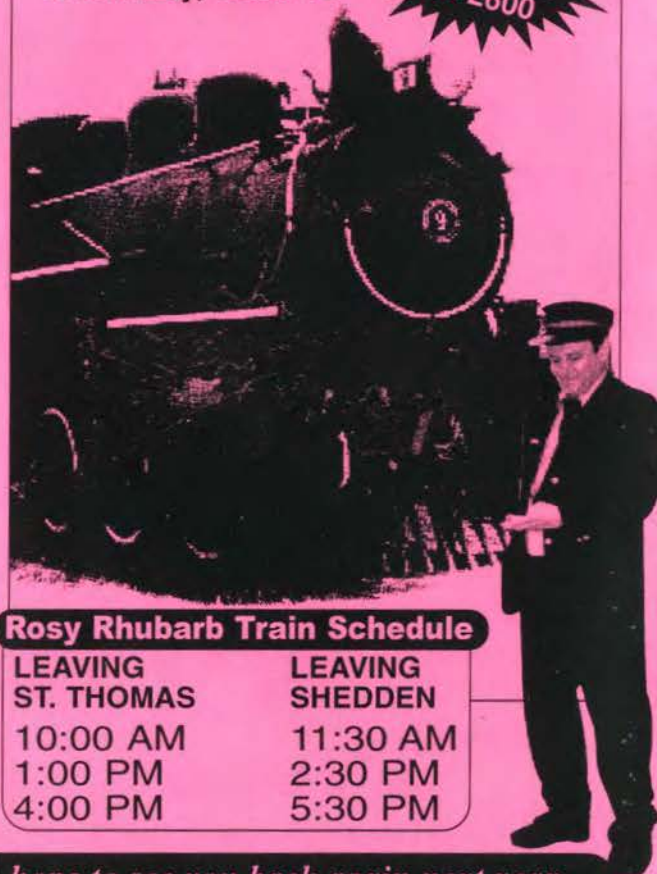
