200 books seeded library's growth

Carol O'Connor, librarian for in County Library, Shedden , located at the intersection of Highway 3 and County Road 20, was the speaker at the October meeting of the Shedden Women's Institute, which was held in the library.

Mrs. O'Connor with Mrs. Joyce Boughner and Mrs. Dora McArthur staff the library Tuesday and Friday from 2:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. and on Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Mrs. O'Connor said there are about 8,000 books on the shelves with a monthly circulation of over 1,000. Shedden is one of 11 libraries in the county and has large-print books and talking books for the vision impaired to enjoy. A medical certificate is requested to take out the talking books which number 150, mostly fiction.

There is a large reference section of local histories and these can be read in the library in a quiet spot located at the back of the room.

Mrs. O'Connor said that the first library was made possible by the late Sydney Silcox, who started the former Mechanics library with 200 books. These books were kept in private homes now owned by Mrs. Sydney Orchard and Mr. and Mrs. Scott.


Elgin naturalist is guest

Brazil exchange student speaks to Shedden WI

Miss Mary Donkers, Frome, spoke to members of the Shedden Women's Institute recently on her experience as an exchange student in Brazil for one year. Miss Donkers, who is a Grade 13 student at Parkside Collegiate, won a scholarship from the Rotary Club after grade 12 to attend school in Brazil for one year.

Miss Donkers lived with 3 families in the city of Curitiba, Brazil with a population of $1\frac{1}{2}$ million and attended a private school from 7 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. with the afternoons free. The usual subjects were taught with typing emphasized and with no computers. The language used is Portuguese and she learned very quickly as not many Brazilians speak English. During some afternoons Miss Donkers taught English to some children.

The country is quite rolling and the scenery lovely with a very warm climate all year round. There is good bus service in the country and the accomodations are excellent. There is a class difference with a very rich and a very poor class with no middle class people.

Miss Donkers showed pictures of Brazil and had many articles of native craft to show. Mrs. Maxine Silcox introduced the speaker and Mrs. Brenda Silcox expressed thanks to her.

Mrs. Cowell showed a film demonstrating how to deal ith a blind person in everyday events such as crossing the treet and eating in restaurants.

A guide dog should not be touched or petted by others hen in harness as the dog is "working." When it is out of arness, the dog is "not working" and can be petted by thers. One guide dog costs about \$6,000.00 and can work for bout 10 years.

Several games, watches and other items which aid the blind were on display. Only about 10 per cent of blind people actually read or write braille.
