and repairs were completed in the Fall of I894 and school was held for a few months in the old Good Templars' Hall. In I889 a new woodshed was built at a cost of \$47.9I and in I9I2 an excavation was made under the school and a furnace was installed. In the year I935 the school was partitioned into two rooms, basement enlarged to accommodate a new furnace, coal bins and indoor chemical sanitation.

In Feb. I938 music was first taught in the schools of Yarmouth and in S.S. No.9, it began under the tutorship of Mr. Jas. Medlyn of St. Thomas, and later for a short time by Mr. F. Holcombe. Also Miss. Helen Barnum of Aylmer was a very popular music teacher for a few years and later Miss. Murchison of the Seminary School staff and now at the time of writing, the music teacher is a Miss. Guymer.

Several years ago, school nurses began making regular visits to the rural schools, caring for the health of the pupils. This was later taken over by the Elgin Health Unit when it was organized in the year I946; at the present time it is under the supervision of Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Roger Knipe. (Dr. Knipe recently purchased and makes his home in the big brick house, north of Union pond, built years ago by Solomon V. Willson.)

At a special meeting on May 8th, I946, of trustees and rate-payers addressed by Inspector J. C. Smith and Mr. A. D. Mc. Coll re S. S. No. 9 Yarmouth, joining the school area plan beginning Jan. 1st, I947, a motion was proposed and carried that this plan be undertaken. According to school records dating from I877, these are the teachers who have taught the pupils at Union, as follows:-



In I885 the children of the school put on a concert to raise finances for a bell. At this concert, Lila Montgomery and Ida Hathaway sang a duet "Wait Till the Clouds Roll By, Jenny" accompanied on the organ by Jenny Combs. It was a most successful event financially and with a few cash donations added, they had enough to buy the bell and build the cupola, the finished job costing \$20.00. The bell is still in use, having called the children of Union to school, for more than sixty years.

Many men and women have gone out into the world to take their places in positions of trust and responsibility, former students of the Union school, who doubtless cherish happy memories of their favourite teachers of days gone by, in the old white school house on the hill.


#### DR. GEORGE H. JACKSON, M.D.

born in Omemes, ONT 1870

and Susan Dr. George H. Jackson was the son of Rev. George Jackson, one time minister of the Methodist Church at Sparta. Dr. Jackson attended public school in Sparta and High School in Aylmer. He attained his Medical Degree at the Toronto University and graduated at the age of 26 years in the year 1897. In that same year he came to Union and boarded with Mrs. Gonzello Hannan, before he was married.

He was married in I898 to Miss. Carrie J. Brown. daughter of Mr. Enoc B. Brown of Brownsville. He asked his bride "where she would like to settle down" and she said "she did not care where". As the Doctor did not like the thought of living in the city, they settled in the village of Union. Their first home was the first house south of the pond on the east side of the highway. They moved from there to the house on the corner opposite the old hotel and then to the house owned by Rev. F. Burgess. After some years, they built a beautiful brick house, with the Doctor's office adjoining, on the west side of the highway, half-way up the hill.

This South Yarmouth community was most fortunate in being served by as clever and astute a physician as was Dr. Jackson. His brusk and sometimes severe manner, covered a kind and tender heart- one had only to be critically ill, to know how true this was. His revered memory lives on in many a home in this community. He was at the service of everyone, unfortunate enough to be ill or hurt, rich or poor, any hour of the night or day. No night was too dark or stormy for the good Doctor to respond to any demand made of him. On his night calls, during the terrible flu epidemic of 1918, some of the Union men, close



friends of the Doctor, took turns driving his horses- (he had 4 of them, using each in turn) as the Doctor kept going almost constantly twenty-four hours a day at this dreadful time. Only a man of iron determination and dedicated to the service of his fellow citizens, could have attempted such an effort as he achieved at that time.

All through their life to-gether, Mrs. Jackson was a fitting helpmate to such a man. With her cheery disposition, quick wit and always ready with a merry quip, made lighter many a weary task during her time of leadership of the Patriotic Society of World War I. She was a member of the choir in the Union Church and was always ready to do her part in any worthy community project.

During their 22 years at Union, the Doctor and Mrs. Jackson had made a wide circle of friends and in I920, when they moved to Port Stanley, it left a big gap in the community life of the village. Dr. Jackson later became Reeve at Port Stanley and was also the Coroner of this district. His death occurred at his home on December 28th, I946.
