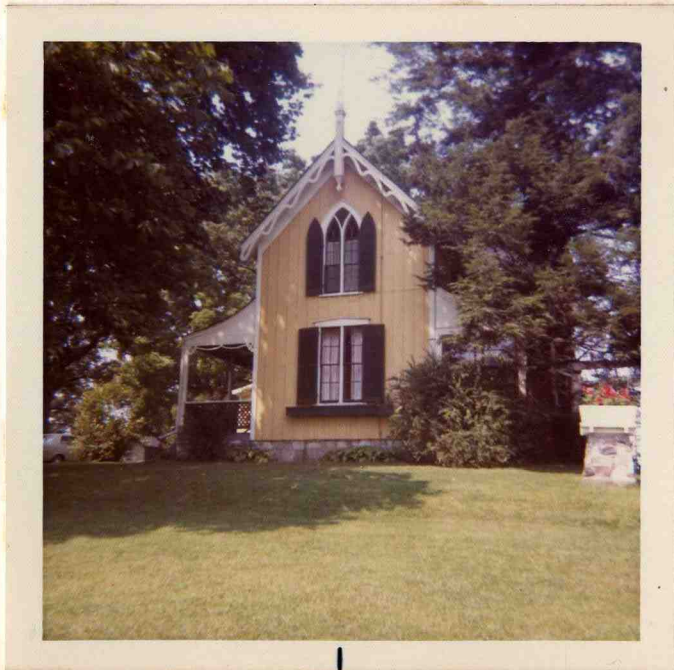


In 1951 the Teachers and pupils moved into the new building on the Sparta Road and the old school was sold to the Union Sports Club.

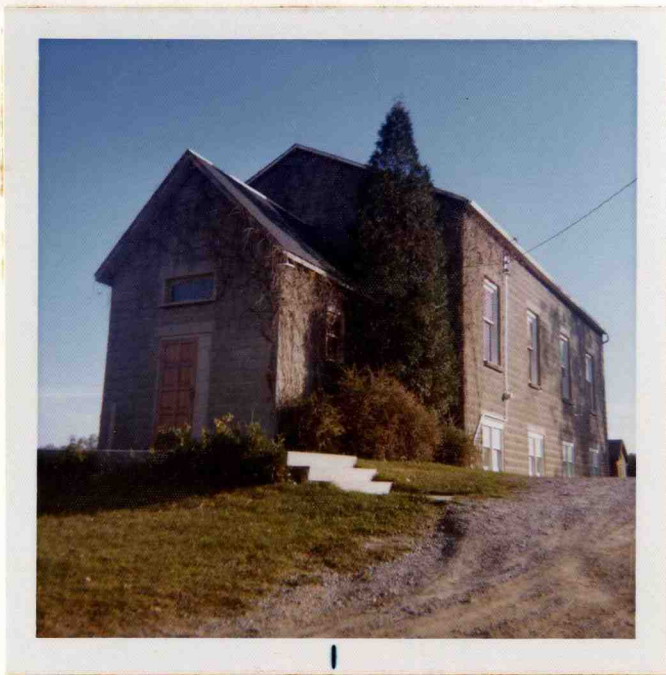

Historic Plains Baptist Church will mark its 144th Ann.

On Sunday, Sept. 14, 1975, the Plains Baptist Church will celebrate its 144th anniversary. It is believed to be the oldest Baptist Church in this immediate area. At the 11a.m. service Rev. Jim Louis of London will be the guest speaker and daughter Pamella will supply special music.

At 7:30p.m. there will be a singsong service, Rev. Gordon Hill will be the evening speaker and the Graves Family will bring special music. All are welcome to attend.

Plains Baptist Church, called First Yarmouth Baptist Church because it was the first Baptist Church in Yarmouth Township, was organized in 1832. However records show that meetings were held in houses as a branch of a Southwold church before that date, going back as far as 1824.

The first church clerk was John Lanning who remained as clerk until his death in the 1870s. Elder Samuel Baker preached the first sermon and Elder Thomas Mills was the first pastor.

In the early days if a member was absent from the church for more than one service a committee would be appointed to interview that member, and if no satisfactory reason was given, he would be dropped from the care and fellowship of the church until such time as a reason was given.

Elder Mills received about, \$150 per-year salary and some of that was given in meat for himself and oats for his horse. When the church was organized it was in an area then forming part of Middlesex County. Men and women who started this church are buried in the little cemetery across the road from the church.

The late Clayton G. Axford composed a poem about the church in the 1960s. He died in 1969. He was a member of long standing of the church. Church pastors include: Pastor Lang, 1879; Rev. D.B. Davidson 1883-85; Pastor R. Marshal, 1885-89; J.H. Sowerby, 1889-91;



John Gray, 1891; G. B. Davis, 1894; J. J. Baker, 1901; Rev. Kirkpatrick, 1902; Rev. Reekie, 1903-09; Rev. W. D. St. Delmer, 1909-14; Rev. Westell, 1914-17; Rev. J. Marshall, 1917-19; Rev. H. W. Bower, 1920-24; Rev. Thomas France, 1924-25; Rev. Charles Waddell, 1925-30; Rev. G. W. H. Medley, 1931-36; Rev. J. Maitland Jones, 1936-38; Rev. G. W. Sherman, 1939-59; Rev. Seymon Boyce, 1959-63; Rev. Anthony Penner, 1964-67; Rev. Brian Sherry, 1967-68; Rev. John Dickinson, 1969-73; Rev. Gordon Hill, became the present pastor in March, 1974.
