In June 1923, John E. Pearce bought the original grant of 70 acres from Colonel Talbot to Mrs. Storey except the 10 acres which she deeded to Right Reverend Charles Stewart, Bishop of Quebec. In 1955 the wooded part and ravine were given to the Province of Ontario under the Lands and Forests Department which in 1960 purchased a field from St. Peter's Church consisting of about three acres and lying adjacent to the Park, South of St. Peter's Church.

Just a few days ago the Lands and Forests have taken over the balance of Lot 11, Con. 10 still owned by John E. Pearce and now the park will extend from the line between Lot 10 owned by John E. Pearce to Lot 12 owned by Alistar Littlejohn except 100 of an acre purchased last year by Louis Marcus.
