
**Tiffany Barber** is graduating from Carleton University with her BA Arts Honours in Criminology and Criminal Justice. Her concentration was in Law

with a minor in History. Tiffany has decided she still wants to learn more about the law and is enrolled in a 2 year Law Clerk course at Fanshawe College in September.




Megan Lackey graduating from Niagara College in Welland, in Recreation and Leisure Services. Megan is presently working part time for



# STRATHCONA CREAMERY 100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The Strathcona Creamery was jurchased in 1906 by the late Roy Fraser. In 1929, Clifford Wight, Fred Leslie and graduated with a dairy diploma at the Ontario Agricultural School, currently known as the University of Guelph. In 1930, both began their careers at the Strathcona Creamery, eventually purchasing both the creamery and egg grading businesses in 1956.

In the creamery's early days, they had several trucks that would go from farm o farm picking up the cream cans and cases of eggs. A truck covered a different route each day so that the farmer would know the approximate time that the cream

truck would arrive at their farm.

After the cows were

milked, the cream was separated and placed in a shot-gun cream can. These cans were usually stored in the basement to keep the cream cool. Each can was tagged. at the farm with the farmer's name, and the number of cans that he was sending to the creamery. The truck would then take the cans back to the creamery where each can was tested and the weight recorded. The cream test was the basis for payment to the farmer. These test results were written in a book and given to Ruth (Clifford's wife) to figure out the amount each farmer would receive in his envelope. The

envelope was referred to as the "cream cheque", even though it was always paid in cash. The cans were then dumped into a hopper to take out anything that should not have been there. The cream flowed into a separator and was then pasteurized to take out any and all impurities.

The pasteurized was taken cream to the butter churn where the cream was turned, over and over, adding just the right amount of salt, until butter formed at the bottom of the churn. The butter was taken out and packed into 90 pound cases. These cases were usually sold to other manufacturers. The balance of the churn was put on a stand

where wire cutters would cut it into one pound blocks. These one pound blocks were then wrapped under the branded of "Thistle name Brand Butter" with a special parchment paper to keep the butter fresh. These cases were then sold grocery stores from St. Thomas to Windsor. Over the years, Strathcona Creamery won many awards for top quality butter.

In the 1960's many farmers, because of the work involved, decided to quits ending cream. Although the creamery also picked up eggs at the farms, there was not enough business to make it a worthwhile enterprise. In 1968, the creamery was

sold and Fred Leslie and Clifford Wight both retired. They both worked for the Board of Education as custodians for a few years.

The creamery was located near the corner of Main Street and Strathcona Drive. The egg grading station was located on Main Street where the Senior's Centre and the Alexandria Lodge are now located.

JANUARY 18 1900
C.A. Ostrander is contemplating the moving of his cheese factory to Dutton and establishing a creamery in connection with it.

**DECEMBER 13 1900** 

The cheese factory owned by C.A. Ostrander burned to the ground.

FEBRUARY 14 1901
C.A. Ostrander has decided not to rebuild his cheese factory that was recently destroyed by fire.

**APRIL 4 1956** 

Clifford Wight and Fred Leslie take over creamery operations as R.E. Fraser retires after 50 years.

# Colonel Talbot got us started...

Reality based T.V. shows are everywhere today... but we all know that if push came to shove the producers would stop in, rather than risk the death of one of their participants.

When Col. Thomas Talbot landed at the mouth of a creek on the north shore of Lake Erie, in what was later called Dunwich Township, in 1803, there were no producers, directors or cameramen! The settlers that followed were totally dependent on themselves. No big box store for lumber needs, no associates to assist you, no power tools... nothing but muscle, bone and ingenuity.

Part of the entitlement duties each settler was obligated to do to get clear title to his land was to clear 10 acres, build a dwelling/or barn, plant a crop, and clear the road allowance in from their property... or no land!

Imagine, no chain saws, no log splitters, only a handful of horses and oxen in all of Canada West (Upper Canada - Southern Ontario)... so most had to chop with axe or a two man saw... many trees were sweet chestnut, ash or oak... some bigger than several men could span linked arm to arm.


This road built by these men

was later referred to as the Talbot Trail. The very beginnings are here in Elgin on the Fingal Line just west of Burwell's corer (at Iona Road) at the top of the hill at Port Talbot where a stone chair now stands.

Today that trail is blazed through Elgin with eye catching emerald green and amber reflective signs going east to the county line outside Port Burwell and west to the Elgin-Kent Line on Highway 3. The westerly route then led to Fort Malden (Amherstburg) and in the east to Longpoint and the settlements and Fort at Niagara and Fort Erie.

Want to experience even a portion of what these settlers had to deal with? Park your car and hike the Trans Canada Trail in Dutton/Dunwich and see what it's like to hike a few kilometers in a Carolinian Forest. Or... challenge yourself to walk the Talbot Trail on the grassy road allowances.

Start at Port Talbot, walk what you can... mark where you ended and begin there next time. How long will it take you? Can you do it? What if you had to carry a 30 pound sack of wheat to the mill at Longpoint... the only mill left after the Yankee's raid in



the War of 1812? Don't forget... you must keep the wheat/flour dry and you have no plastic. Interested in hearing more about the settlers and their hardships? Visit the Tourist Association website www.elgintourist.com or any local library. There are several books on the Talbot settlement.

Backus-Page House is a living museum in the heart of the Tal-

bot settlement, Dutton/Dunwich. It's a great place to learn about Elgin's beginnings and see some on the lifestyles of bygone days... or take the family on the Spicer Trail for a more sedate hike where the various tree specimens are labeled... so it too is a learning experience. Now that's life!

# **History Summary of** West Elgin Daffodil Auxiliary Cancer Fund april 21, 2004.

About 1956 a local doctor's wife started driving cancer patients for treatment, doing home care duties and even helping financially. In due time, others came to her rescue with financial assistance – particularly the Women's Institute. Bear in mind that was a period prior to any government medical plans.

In 1967 the Daffodil Auxiliary applied for a charity number so receipts could be issued to individuals contributing to either the Welfare Fund or Cancer Fund.

For over 28 years a Quilting Group from the hamlet of Fingal has donated a special quilt for a draw to raise money for cancer patients.

An increasing number of people over the past 15 years have made memorial donations in lieu of flowers.

These two sources of funds have allowed caregivers to attend to the needs of local patients and make sizeable donations to local hospitals and Medical Centres.

Listed are some of the larger donations made by the Daffodil Auxiliary (Cancer) from 1990 on -

- 1990 To St Thomas Elgin General Hospital, funds to make available the first Palliative Care Room for seriously ill patients and their family members.
- 1991 To Four Counties Hospital, the same amount given to make the first Palliative Care Room there also. (A plaque is still on the door of that special room.)

- 1995 Another donation to the St Thomas Elgin Hospital Radiology Department - for a Special Reclining Chair for ladies being tested for Breast Cancer.
- 1995 To Four Counties Hospital towards the purchase of and Electric Bed.
- 1995 To Camp Trillium to help children with cancer to attend a special Family Camp.
  - 1997 To the Building Project of the Bobier Villa Nursing Home.
  - 1999 To the Bobier Villa towards the purchase of a Mechanical Life.
- 2001 To St Thomas Elgin General Hospital to purchase a Vital Signs Monitor.
  - 2003 To the Bobier Villa for a Special Release Mattress.
  - 2003 To the Building Project of Elgin Community Health Centre.

To my knowledge there is not another Registered Organization in Ontario or Canada that can raise funds for cancer and not be required to forward the funds to the Cancer Society.

N.B. – In April for many years you have purchased Daffodils and sponsored individuals participating in the "Great Ride". Those funds are all forwarded to Toronto.

I am sure there is no one reading this report that has not contributed to the Daffodil Auxiliary Welfare.
