Peter Cameron of Tyrconnell, formerly of Dunkeld, Perthshire Scotland, bought 1DO acres of bush land north of Coynes Corners, Con. 6, lot 6, in Dunwich Township, Elgin County from George McBeth on Feb. 26, 1867. He and his family lived here until he sold the farm to his son John R. Cameron on Jan. 26, 1892. John R. farmed the land until he sold it to his brother Peter G. Cameron on June 2. 1919. Peter G. sold this property to his son John S. in 1928; who still owns the property and works the land. J. Allister, son of John S., built a new home in 1966 just west of the old Cameron home.

Daniel D. McKillop of Argyleshire, Scot. settled on 100 acres of land on Lot 10, Conc. 6, on Clay Street west, Dunwich in 1853. Present owner is John McKillop, a grandson of first owner. John D. McKillop and brother Weil from Scotland settled on 150 acres of land, Lot 14, Conc 7, Clay St. East in 1852. The next owner was John D.'s son, Daniel J., Daniel J.'s son, John D. is the present owner in 1969. Four generations to present time have lived on this farm.

Donald McGugan, his wife and son came from Argyleshire, Scotland in 1819. In 1820 he bough 200 acres of land at Coynes Corners, Dunwich Township from the Mathesons of Coynes Corners. The property was passed on to his youngest son Donald in 1857 who lived on the farm until he died in 1924. The land was then left to his son Donald (Dan) Alexander who farmed the property until his death in 1946. He left the farm to his sister Mrs. Neil (Jessie) Crawford who lived on it until she sold a part of it in 1961 to Stewart McGugan a great grandson of the first Donald McGugan. Stewart still owns the property and works the land.



Duncan McCall Farm 1969.

Duncan McCall was born at Appin, Argyleshire, Scotland. His son, Elder Thomas McCall and his grother Samuel and their father came to Canada in 1819 and settled on a farm in Aldborough where the McCall cemetery and Brock's Creek now are.

They bought 300 acres from the crown (Col. Talbot was the agent) for so many barley corns. Duncan McCall settled on part of this land (140 acres) in 1828. His brother Samuel farmed the remaining 160 acres now owned by Douglas Lyons. Hugh Fergus McCall who is living on the McCall farm is the present owner. He is a great grandson of Elder Thomas McCall.

Braddon Farm
Mr. and Mrs. Humphrey Braddon bought 100
acres of land at Coynes Corners in the spring
of 1861. When two of their sons married, George
and William, the land was divided each being given
50 acres. Humphrey Braddon and his wife continued
to live on the farm until their deaths in 1902
and 1914 respectively.

George Braddon worked the 50 acres until his son, Bert, was able to take over the farm. When Bert's son Raymond was of age he worked with his father, the farm being somewhat larger as adjoining land had been purchased over the years. Bert Braddon lived on the farm until his death in 1968. His son, Raymond, continues to live on this farm. Hence this farm has been handed down from father to son for four generations.

The other 50 acres given to William Braddon was passed on to his son Ernest and then was bought by Humphrey Braddon's great granddaughter and her husband who are the present owners. Therefore the original 100 acres are still in the possession of the direct descendants of Humphrey Braddon.
