James McFarlane Farm

On July 25th, 1829 Henry Coyne obtained land from Hon. Thomas Talbot paying 48 pounds 15 shillings. This land was located at what came to be known as Coyne's Corners. Henry Coyne died in 1852.

Humphrey Braddon bought the farm at Coyne's Corners approximately 100 acres in 1861 for \$ 3.50 an acre.

When two of his sons married, about 1875, George and William, the farm was divided each son getting 50 acres.

William Braddon died in 1943 and his son Ernest, a bachelor, became owner.

In March 1945 Ernest sold the farm to James and Thelma McFarlane, she being a great granddaughter of the late Humphrey Braddon.. James McFarlane died in 1962. His wife still lives there. Their daughter Doris and her husband, Russell Barber, who live in London, work the farmland.

Krin Dieleman's Farm

This farm is on the south side of Highway #3; being Lot 5, Concession 8, Dunwich Township.

In 1821 this land was granted to Colonel Talbot by the Crown; in 1837 it belonged to Angus, George and Donald Gunn; in 1866 Angus Gunn was the sole owner. In 1874 to James Hanna; in 1878 to Henry Garbutt; in 1890 Eliza and Henry Garbutt sold it to Thomas W. Garbutt and in 1891 it passed to Robert Garbutt; in 1903 it was left to Robert's wife Catherine during her lifetime and then was to go to their son Harry; in 1921 it was registered in the names of three children, Harry and his sisters Jean Dickinjon and Roma; in 1957 it was sold to Mike, Rosa and Julia Borosh; in 1970 it was purchased by Krin and Jacoba (Connie) Dieleman and family, who have made several changes to the home and farm buildings.

Walter Robson Farm

This property is on the north side of Highway #3, and is Lot 2, Concession 7, Dunwich Township.

This land was given to Colonel Talbot by the crown in 1821, in 1853 it was sold to George McBeth; in 1856 to Henry Lumley; in 1860 to Archibald Graham; in 1868 to Archibald Taylor; in 1877 to John McLean; in 1879 to William Buchanan; in 1881 to John Buchanan; in 1916 to Joseph Wiley; in 1918 to John Faw; in 1919 the owner was Richard Robson. In 1937 it was passed on to a son, Walter. He married Dorothy Kriter; they had one daughter Ellen. Walter passed away in 1982 (December). Dorothy remained on the farm until February, 1984 when the farm was sold to Michael and Ingrid Hentz and family; Dorothy moved to Wallacetown.

Lundehn's Home

In 1945, George W. Gilbert and his wife bought this lot from Alfred and Lottie Koehler, intending to build a house there, but the following year they bought the home across the street. The Gilberts' daughter, Mrs. Ruth Bedford had the lot transferred to her in 1955, but the year previous, 1954, Ruth had bought a cabin from the Bibbys' below Wallacetown and had moved it unto the lot. She remodelled and built unto it and lived there until 1984 when it was sold to Horst and Elsa Lundehn from London. In 1985 it was enlarged again, adding a bathroom and a dining area, which can be seen at the left back corner in the winter picture.

It was sold in 1988 to John Sharp.

Update of "Fairwood" Pearce Farm -1986.

The original picture and history of this farm, Lot 11, Concession 8, Talbot Road, is on Page 58 of Book 1. Miss Frances Pearce passed away Nov. 8, 1952 in her 75th year. She was active in church work at St. Peter's Anglican Church, Tyrconnell, being organist for many years. Her sister, Miss Eva Pearce passed away December 3rd, 1965 in her 85th year; she also had been active in church work. Their brother Stewart L. Pearce died on Nov. 24th, 1967 in his 85th year. The farm was willed to the Canadian Bible Society and remained in their hands until the early 1970's when it was sold to James L. Harrison of Toronto. The Dyck family of Aylmer rented part of the land, growing tomatoes and cucumbers, for a few years, living in the house in the summer. About ~~50~~ years ago James Harrison and his wife Dorothy came there to live and are still here.

Gary Kalita's Home

This home is on the corner of Gordon and Rose Streets, part of Lot 13, Block C. The land purchased by Donald Currie from Colonel Talbot in 1833, had several owners and for many years from 1874 on belonged to the Cameron family. This parcel of land was purchased from Christena Cameron in 1946 by Norman and Lottie Sutton, who moved the present house there and renovated it. Mr. Sutton owned and operated the Wallacetown Mill just across on the opposite corner. Mr. Sutton sold the mill and house in 1962 to Elmore and Constance McQuiggan. The McQuiggans sold the house in 1964 to Harry and Sarah Simms of Tyrconnell. Following Harry's death, Sarah became the owner in 1967 and resided there until her death. Her family, Robert Charles Simms and Eileen Hull, inherited the home. In 1979 it was sold to Gary and Audrey Kalita and family.

Since 1987 it has been occupied by Gary Kalita and Linda Howie who operate "Kalima's Grooming".

Fred Drouillard's Home

This home is part of Lot 15, Block D, on the south side of Rose Street in Wallacetown. It originally belonged to the lot on the highway, which was owned in earlier years by Miss Isabella Gunn and in 1941 by Mrs. Jennie Campbell.

Around 1942 or 43, a lady, we think by the name of Mrs. Vollans purchased the lot and built a small house on it. A niece of this lady, Carlotta Pilsworth, who worked at Alex White's store resided with her. Carlotta, her mother and sister had previously lived in a house next to the Post Office - formerly Mrs. McIntyre's Restaurant.

In 1947 Ernest Braddon of Coynes Corners, bought the house and lot and also purchased a small parcel from a lot belonging to the grist mill to the west of this home. Following Ernest's death in Feb. 1952, the home was sold to Clarence and Myrtle Holland. In November 1957, William and Barbara Weston purchased the home, also another few feet of land to make a driveway. The Westons enlarged the home and made many renovations. They sold the home in July 1966 to Mrs. Annie Trothen; the Westons' built a new home on Pierce Street next to the fairgrounds. Annie passed away in the spring of 1980 and the property was left to her nephew Bruce Trothen of Windsor. In April of 1982 the home was sold to Fred and Mabel Drouillard of Toronto; Mrs. Drouillard passed away before they had moved in, but Fred moved here and has made many improvements. A glassed-in sun porch was built on the front of the house in 1986.
