Betty Ross, reunion co-chairman, said the event took a whole year's planning and a lot of digging for people's addresses.


Mrs. Ross said the only problem was that so many former students showed up for the event, that others (who hadn't registered beforehand) had to be turned away.

40th West Elgin Secondary School reunion this weekend.

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
