Born and educated in lacetown, Sifton joined the eighteenth Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force in October 1913 Expeditionary October 1914. Canadian atta During the attack 1917, his Ridge on April 9, 1917, his company was held up by the fire of a German machine gun. Lance Sergeant Sifton charged it single handed killed the crew and held the position against enemy counter attack until his comrades arrived. In carrying out his gallant act he was killed but his conspicuous valour out his conspicuous but his conspicuous undoubtedly saved many lives contributed largely to the success of the operation.


