County council has approved a grant of \$2,000 to the Seniors Day 2000 party. Ken Verrell, who helped organize this year's successful picnic, explained the committee will stay together one more year to make a similar event happen for the millennium.

Verrell said organizers expected about 350 to attend this summer's picnic in the park, and about 1,000 seniors showed up.

"The food vendors were sold out by noon," he told council Tuesday.

During his presentation to county council, Verrell jokingly claimed as picnic supporters a delegation from the Wallacetown Women's Institute who filled the Elgin county council meeting room. The group, headed by Warden Rien Van Brenk's wife, Helen, was actually on a tour which included a visit to the county council meeting.

Verrell was wholeheartedly supported in his mission by county council members.

Terry Carroll, of the Elgin-St. Thomas United Way, also made a presentation to county council. He handed out the 1999 United Way brochure and outlined United Wayfunded projects in Elgin county. They include the West Elgin Community Health Centre in West Lorne, Mennonite Central Community Resource Centre in Aylmer, West Elgin Support Services, Be-Resource reavement Council, Youth Tutors Elgin and foot care clinics at county homes provided through the VON.

Carroll said the committee would welcome more county representatives.

This year's local United Way goal is \$900,000.

Raising about \$12 for every man, woman and child in the Elgin-St. Thomas area ranks the local United Way campaign as one of the highest United Way fund-raisers in the province.

An In Memoriam Service was held honouring departed members.



The meeting closed by singing God Save the King.

Wallacetown WI tour Arva Flour Mill

On Friday, June 2nd, Wallacetown Women's Institute visited the Arva Flour Mill. Convenors for the meeting were Kay Lilley and Kay Waite, with 12 members present and 4 guests.

With roots going back to 1819, quality has been a tradition at the Arva Flour Mill. Between 1842 and 1917, the mill had five owners. In 1917 the mill was purchased by C.W. Scott and H. Templeman, which was the beginning of where it is today.

The mill was then acquired by Clarence Scott's son, Harold, in 1961. Harold then sold it to his son-in-law Bill Matthews, in 1981. Today, Bill's daughter and two sons work at the mill in hopes of taking it over in the future.

Bill Matthews gave a guided tour of the mill, pointing out the original cherry beams still holding up like they were placed there just yesterday. The belts and flour mills used are also well cared for and cleaned regularly, all originals.

The flours processed are unbleached white, 100% whole wheat, spelt, pastry, gluten, specialty flours and organic flours. They haven't used bleach for

20 years, it is all natural flour.

They can process 12-1/2 - 100 lb bags of white flour in one hour, and 19 - 120 lb bags of whole wheat flour. It takes 142 lbs of wheat to make 102 lbs of flour. There is a paper trail on all organic flour by code. They have a large scale for measuring and weigh-A few daring ing. members tested the scale to make sure its accuracy was dead on and both Dorothea and Don Monteith confirmed the scales.

Also a number of animal feeds are made up for horses, goats, rabbits and birds. All of the spelt grain is grown locally, 600 acres is needed to pro-

duce enough flour to supply the demand, of which most goes to the USA.

Bill then gave a tour of the surrounding area, the dambuilt and still very much needed torun the mill, a lovely deck and cabin built for Bill's wife a few years back, now used by the youngest son.

There are 250 acres which the mill sits on along with the rights for the use of Medway Creek. There are 8 workers at the mill, and on Friday mornings fresh bread is baked with Arva's own flour.

Kay Lilley thanked Bill for giving up his time to show the group around the mill, which everyone could all see was his pride and joy. Everyone then loaded up their shopping baskets with all kinds of baking ingredients and fresh baked breads.


Still using water power from Medway Creek, this family-run operation is truly unique and an experience not to be missed.
