His many friends in this community, and particularly in the Wallacetown district, were shocked to hear of the death on Friday at a Florida railway crossing of Dr. W. J. Glanfield. Mrs. Glanfield, ricing with her husband when their car struck a fast-moving New York-bound train, was injured Dr. and Mrs. Glanfield were holidaying in the south and were driving a road near St. Petersburg when southbound on Haines road. The auto hit the train with a terrific crash. I saw the car spinning around and parts of it flying through the air. The driver of the car was hurled out from the impact, and slammed into the train.

"I was knocked kind of numb by it for a second then a man rushed to my

for a second, then a man rushed to my door and asked if he could use the telephone to get the ambulance. I ran across the street then. The woman was still inside the car, but unconscious."

Upon regaining consciousness in hospital later, Mrs. Glanfield reported that they saw or heard nothing of the train until it hit them. Mrs. Glanfield was quoted as saying that she experienced that first "awful impact", then unconsciousness.

31 Years at Wallacetown

Dr. Glanfield came to Wallacetown from Appin 31 years ago and had practiced their since. At the beginning of this year, he decided to take things easier and announced his retirement. Since then he had operated on a somewhat curtailed basis, still looking after many of those who had come to regard him not only as their doctor but a valued friend

Dr. Glanfield graduated from University of Toronto medical school in versity of Toronto medical school in 1908 and during his years of practice had established an excellent reputation. For several years he had acted as medical officer of health for Dunwich Township. He was a member of the Elgin Medical Association.

Dr. Glanfield did not take an active part in municipal affairs. Whatever soare time he had while not looking after his practice was spent with Mrs. Glanfield at their attractive home. He was a member of the United Church. A native of Jarvis, Ont., where he was born in 1881, Dr. Glanfield had no children, but is survived by his brother,



DEATH AT LONDON OF EDWARD BOBIER

Prominent Dutton Resident Dies in His 80th Year

DUTTON, Nov. 20 .- For many years a prosperous south Dunwich farmer and a man who found much pleasure in travel and seeing the world in his years of retirement, Edward Bobier, died on Wednesday afternoon at Victoria

Wednesday afternoon at Victoria Hospital, London, Ont., in his 80th year. For the past 20 years he has been one of Dutton's most prominent residents.

Edward Bobier was born at Enniscorthy, Eire, on January 9, 1868, a son of the late Joshua and Eliza Bobier, who brought him and the rest of their young family to settle near Port Talbot 71 years ago. He grew up on the farm and made farming his life work, having engaged in it until he retired at the age of 60. His farm on Con. 10, Dunwich, near Port Talbot, is now the Gordon Bedford farm.

Following his retirement, Mr. and Mrs. Bobier (the former Mabel Christina Graham, who died at Dutton nine years ago) took up residence in the large white brick residence in Station street. Since Mrs. Bobier's death, Mr. Bobier had continued to live there alone, although he had spent several winters in Florida. During the past 20 years, Mr. Bobier had made three or four trips to Ireland, and in 1938 extended his travels over a large part of Europe, thus achieving an ambition of long standing with him.

Mr. Bobier, who had a host of friends throughout West Elgin, was a man who was "a friend of everybody, a genial, witty old Irishman," to use the words of ome of his friends.

Although he was not actively interested in municipal affairs or politics, Mr. Bobier was well read and we'l-informed. It was mainly due to a keen interest in threatening developments in Europe during 1938 that he spent a good deal of time on his European trip in Germany that year. Throughout the war he was a supporter of the Red Cross and contributor to the various causes serving Canada's war effort.

In his later years, Mr. Bobier found much pleasure and enjoyment in gardening as a hobby and the flower beds around his home were always lovely. He was particularly interested in roses.

Mr. Bobier was an active churchman throughout his life. While actively engaged in farming, he and Mrs. Bobier attended St. Peter's Church, Tyrconnell. After moving to Dutton, they attended Nativity Anglican Church, where Mr. Bobier's funeral will be held on Friday afternoon.

Mr. Bobier had no children, but he is survived by one sister, Miss Margaret Bobier, London, Ont., an older brother, Joshua, and a vounger brother, Henry, both of Wallacetown. Two other brothers and a sister predeceased him. They were John Bobier, Delaware, Jonas Bobier, Dunwich Township, and Mrs. Arthur Liberty, London, Ont. Also surviving are a number of nieces and nephews throughout this district and elsewhere.

The remains are resting at the McNeill funeral home, Dutton, until noon Friday when they will be removed to the Anglican Church for funeral services at 2.30 p.m., conducted by Rev. C. O. Pherrill, the rector. Interment will be made in Fairview Cemetery.
