WALLACETOWN — Queen Victoria brought Victoria Day spirit to Dutton/Dunwich, when she alighted from her carriage at the historic Backus-Page House museum, south of here Saturday.

The crowd in attendance soon learned that proper royal protocol would be essential for

those wishing an audience with the queen in her tent, where she was partaking of afternoon tea.

After being escorted past rows of onlookers to the royal tent by Col. Thomas Talbot (Rev. Nick Wells), Victoria (Joanne Reynolds of Markham, Ont.), took her seat at the tea table, assisted by Lord Elgin (Dennis Johnson) and Lady Elgin (Ruthan Johnson). The colonel

then doffed his hat and led three rousing cheers for "Victoria Regina."

The West Elgin Secondary School brass quintet struck up God Save the Queen, and Henry Dryfhout, president of the Tyrconnel Historical Society, prayed for a blessing on the queen and her subjects.

MPP Steve Peters read official greetings from Hillary Weston, the queen's representative in Ontario.

"It is most appropriate that you have chosen the Backus-Page House to visit, since it was built during your reign," Peters said. He thought the timing of the visit was fitting because this year the Queen Mother marks her 100th birthday.

By now the crowd gathered at the Backus-Page House was beginning to believe the queen, whose birthday is celebrated Victoria Day weekend, had actually arrived.

Peters said the only reigning monarch ever to visit Elgin county was Queen Elizabeth, who spent the night at Red Tail Golf Club in June, 1997.

Festivities at Backus-Page House Saturday included tea on the lawn, announcements by Dutton town crier Dave Phillips, black history story telling by Shannon Prince, curator of the Buxton National Historical Site and Museum, located near Chatham, Ont., an art show by artist Jenny Phillips and music by flutist Michelle Anderson of Oakville, Ont., granddaughter of Morley Page, the last person to own the Backus-Page House as a private residence.

The occasion brought out some direct descendants of Morley Page. Bill Page of Toronto is the son of Morley.

"My dad bought this place in 1924. I was born in that house and raised here. I left when I joined the army in 1945. Morley Page's maple syrup was know all over southwestern Ontario. We had 96 acres of sugar bush. We used to sell it 65 years ago for a dollar a gallon. Mother cooked it on the stove. My father sold it at the market in St. Thomas."


