Outline a household hint from our

Grandmothers day still used to-day. One which comes to mind would be Canning of stewed tomatoes. Ripe tomatoes are washed in cold water, then put into boiling water on the stove until the skin breaks, then taken out and peeled. The skin comes off very easy this way. Cut tomatoes up in chunks and cook in an open kettle with salt to taste and about $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white sugar to a large kettleful to sweeten just a little.

When cooked put into sterilized jars while hot, put on lids, not tight and then put into a pan with an inch of hot water in the ^{oven} pat 350°F until tomatoes boil in jars.

Immediately tighten jar tops as tight as possible and sit on Counter. Today you can tell when mason jars are sealed by the popping noise they make when they seal. It must have been harder in Grandma's day with crown jars.

Years ago women canned around 100 jars of stewed tomatoes in a season as they could be used right out of the jar, also they are used in so many meat and pasta dishes.

A Medical remedy from our Grandmothers day which is still in use by many mothers to-day is the "Mustard Plaster" used to break up a tight chest cold.

It is made by taking 1 teaspoon of dry mustard and 4 teaspoons of flour and 1 teaspoon of baking soda in a tea cup - mix these together and wet to a stiff paste with lukewarm water - spread this on ~~a~~ half of a piece of cloth about 7" x 12" and fold to cover mustard mixture. Spread this on chest for an hour. The soda keeps it from burning the skin. This was an old faithful remedy years ago and lots of people still feel it works to-day.
