On Thursday, August 15th, 11 members and 1 quest of the Wallacetown W.I. met at South Dunwich Community Hall, then proceeded to the Deko Dairy Farm northwest of Dutton. Linda DeKort welcomed us and explained their milking goat operation of 50 milking goats and their offspring. Linda, along with the help of her mother Elaine, are kept busy year round. The milk is picked up and sent to Woolrich Dairy in Orangeville once a week. The milking goats are fed roasted red kidney beans & 18% protein concentrate at time of milking, then have mineral, salt and an abundance of hay available at all times. No quota is needed to ship milk and each goat can produce 21/2 to 3 litres per day. All goats are given a name gave an update on progress.


