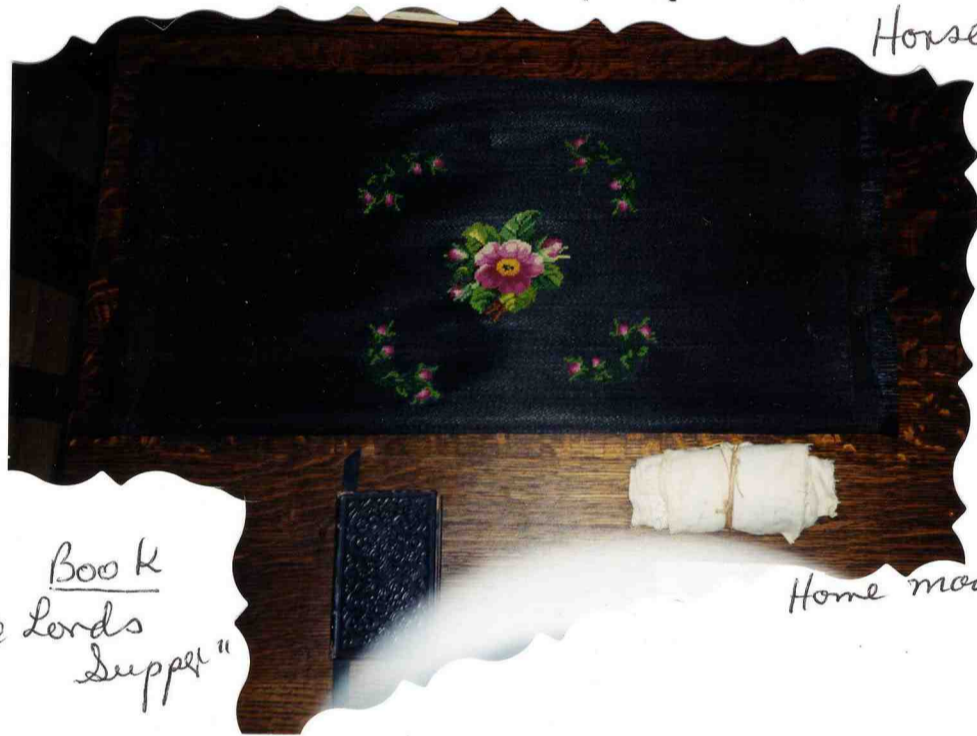

Unknown when this was made.

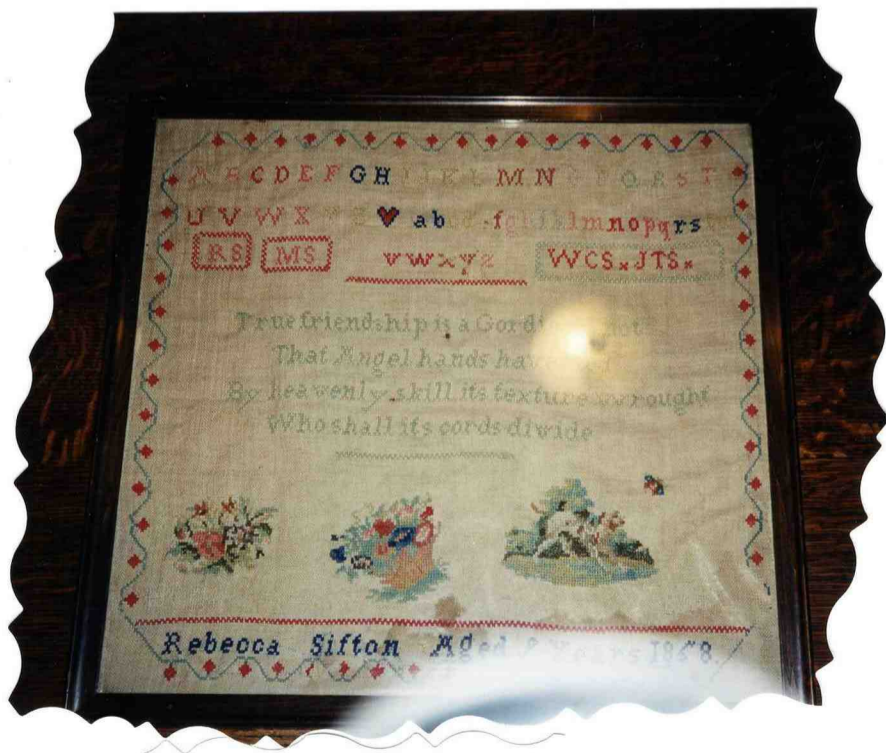

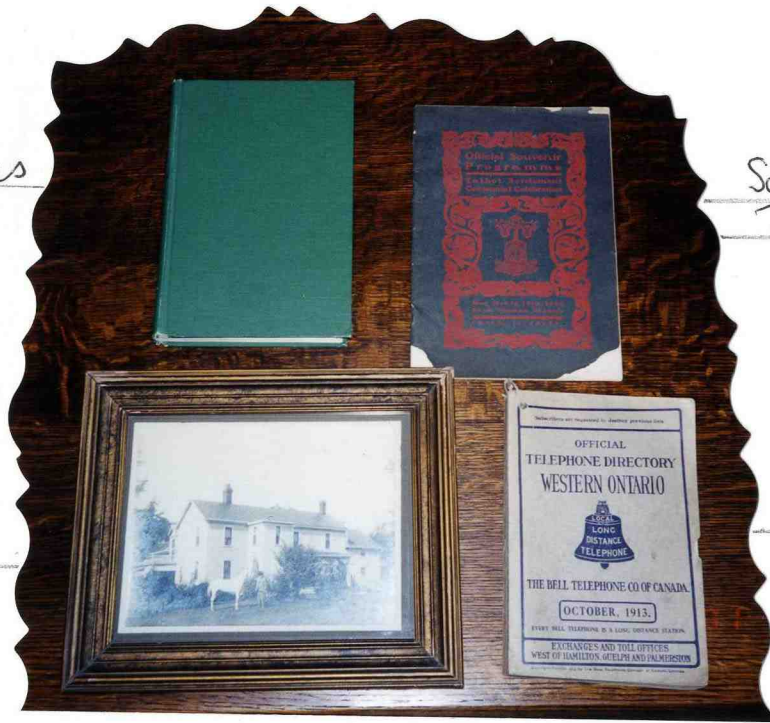

141st annual Wallacetown Fair

The countdown to the 141st Wallacetown Fair is now on! Directors of the Wallacetown Agricultural Society are busy with final preparations for the fair which will be held this weekend, September 28th, 29th and 30th. This year's theme is "Hallowe'en in September."

The buildings will be open on Thursday evening, September 27th, from 7-9 p.m., for people to bring their exhibits and they will also be accepted on Friday morning from 8 a.m. until noon, at which time the buildings will close for judging.

Friday

Friday's events begin at 6:30 p.m., with the Prince and Princess Contest, in the Junior Fair building (registration at 6 p.m.) and the Pet and Goat Shows in the 4-H building.

The official opening of the fair by Society President Tracy Tru-

dell and the conclusion of the Ambassador Contest will begin at the grandstand at 7:30 p.m. The fair is pleased to have 2001 Junior Talent Search winner Sam Taylor as part of the evening's entertainment prior to SYNC IN, an N'SYNC tribute band takes the stage.

Saturday

Things get underway bright and early on Saturday morning with the 4-H Senior Horse Club Achievement Program at 8:30 a.m. Other events taking place include 4-H Achievement programs for the Dutton/Dunwich Goat Club, West Elgin Dairy Calf Club and West Elgin Beef Club as well as a number of 4-H Inter-county and Interclub shows. Other livestock competitions include the Barrow, Beef Cattle and Sheep Shows.

Be sure to check out the best area farmers as they exhibit corn,

beans, honey, maple syrup, hay, fruits and vegetables. The Homecraft Department added a number of new categories this year along with the traditional quilts, needlework, mouth-watering baking and beautiful flowers. A number of demonstrations will take place throughout the afternoon in the General Exhibits building.

See how things used to be done by visiting the Antique Tractor and Machinery display. The Baby Show and Diaper Derby, held at 1 p.m., in the Junior Fair building, are always fun to see. Kids, don't forget the Scavenger Hunt which gets underway at 2 p.m. (registration 1:30 p.m.) The Ben Show will be on stage in the Junior Fair building Saturday afternoon or you can see this wonderful entertainment strolling the grounds.

Try your luck at picking a winner during

the Harness Races at 2 p.m., and be sure to get a seat in the grandstand for the perfect view of the parade at noon. The Mini Rod Tractor Pull, which gets underway at 7 p.m., will provide lots of thrills to end the day.

Sunday

The ever-popular Demolition Derby will help to close out the weekend with a bang. This smashing event gets underway at 1:30

p.m., on Sunday. Two new events have been added to the afternoon schedule. A Women's Skillet Throw will give ladies a chance to test their skill at tossing a custom-made frying pan. Make sure that your vocal chords are warmed up and step up to the mike to give Spouse Calling a try. Husbands get to call their wives, and wives call for their husbands. (continued on page 7)

Pilot balloon to fly high at Wallacetown Fair
