The recipient of the 2010 Rosalie Krebs Memorial Award for Volunteer of the Year is Dorothy Staddon.

Staddon was given her award July 1 by last year's winner Bill Prieksaitis at St. Mary's Parish Hall in West Lorne.

"I'm so overwhelmed I don't know what to say. This is really an honour. I'm going to cry," said Staddon.

Prieksaitis introduced Staddon by saying she has a volunteer career spanning over 40 years.

"The selection committee of the West Elgin Chamber of Commerce has made 2010 the year of the lady," said Prieksaitis.

"In 1988 she was the first lady member of [the West Lorne Optimists] club and since then has held every office at the local, provincial and national level."

# in West Elgin

The PIER project, with the goal of contending with substance abuse among youths, is working on raising awareness in the West Elgin area.

PIER (Peers, Information, Education Resources) is a two-year funded project by Health Canada, lead by Addiction Services of Thames Valley Youth Prevention Workers.

People who volunteer to become Youth Leaders assist in making presentations, facilitating focus groups and be leaders in the community toward the prevention of illicit substance use.

"We're in the process, now that it's the end of the school year, looking for recruits. We're looking for any youths who might be interested in participating and getting some community volunteer hours," said Jessica Austin, Youth Prevention Worker for PIER Elgin. "We did a presentation June 9 at the Talbot Teen Centre with some of the St. Thomas Youth Leaders involved, and I'd like to try to organize it for West Elgin as well as Aylmer."

West Elgin Secondary School student Rylie Hunt, 17, has volunteered to be a PIER Youth Leader. She participated in a one-day prevention training session, where she learned facts about drugs, and how to facilitate work groups.

Rylie has previous experience working with you-support groups as a member of Stomp Out Smoke, active at the St. Thomas Talbot Teen Centre.

"I was involved in Stomp Out Smoke, with Youth Action Alliance, but the government cut the funding," said Rylie. "So I thought, why not get involved in [PIER]? It's a good cause."



Music and Art in the Park, an event put on by the Centre Ice Youth Centre, was first held two years ago in Miller Park. The event was meant to generate interest in talent from the local area; it included local artists displaying their work and local musicians performing on an outdoor stage.

This year, the event didn't materialize because their weren't enough volunteers to go around.

## Mother and daughter honoured for life saving

Two local women have been honoured for the part they played in saving a life, almost two years later.

On August 26, Tracy Van Breda and her daughter, 19-year-old Courtney, received a Commissioner's Citation for Lifesaving, presented to them by Jack Goodlett, Detachment Commander for Oxford County. On September 28, 2008, the two women administered CPR to a 65-year-old woman of Wardsville who went into cardiac arrest while she was driving in West Lorne.

I feel quite honoured. I can't say anymore. It's amazing,"

said Tracy Van Breda.

After the woman fell unconscious behind the wheel, the vehicle's passenger took control of the wheel and brought the vehicle to a stop. Tracy and Courtney Van Breda were out driving and stopped when they came upon the scene. The two took turns administering CPR to the woman until an ambulance arrived. The woman was revived en route to the hospital.

# West Lorne councilor honoured for assisting police

A West Elgin councilor has been honoured by police for his assistance at the scene of a vehicle accident last year, where an OPP officer lost his life.

Jonathan Wolf, a councilor on the West Elgin municipal council, received a St. John Priory Meritorious Certificate and a Commissioner's commendation from OPP Commissioner Chris Lewis at an award ceremony held in Wingham, Ontario, October 15.

On July 6, 2009, Probationary Constable Alan Hack, 31, was killed in an automobile accident on Furnival Rd. at Thomson Line in West Elgin. Constable Hack and his partner were pursuing a suspected car thief when their patrol car collided with an asphalt truck at 1:20 p.m., causing both constables to be thrown from their cruiser. Hack succumbed to his injuries at Four Counties Health Services in Newbury, while his partner sustained serious, but non-life threatening injuries, and survived.

On that day, Wolf was picking strawberries at a nearby field when he heard the accident. He made his way over to the crash site and was the first to arrive on the scene.

"I was trying to communicate with Constable Hack. I tried to get initial coordination of emergency services to respond, as well as trying to tell people to stay off the road and slow traffic down. Then I assisted the St. John's ambulance with stabilizing the officers," said Wolf.

Now that police have decided to honour Wolf for his actions, Wolf says the whole experience of receiving an award leaves him feeling "conflicted".

"Typically, the idea of a reward is to feel proud, and I do feel proud... but when people pay such a high price, and their families continue to pay the price, it leaves me feeling conflicted."

Constable Hack had served with the Ontario Provincial Police for only six months and was assigned to the Dutton satellite of the Elgin detachment. He had previously served as a cadet with the agency for two years and as an auxiliary officer with the London Police Service for two years.

## Libraries accept donation of books about coping with suicide

A book about helping suicide survivors work through their grief is now available at the Rodney and West Lorne libraries, after it was donated by the Nick Knapp Kindness Fund (NKKF).

The book is called 'After Suicide Loss: Coping with your Grief' and is intended to help people who have lost someone by suicide understand what they may experience; stages of guilt, fear, and it includes recommendations of healthy ways to cope. The book was co-authored by Dr. John Jordan, a licensed psychologist specializing in working with loss and bereavement, and the book includes input from suicide survivors.

"It's related to suicide loss and grief and dealing with the 'postvention', after you lose someone by suicide," said Melanie McLeod of the NKKF. "It's kind of like a handbook for survivors, for working through

the process."

The NKKF, under Penny Knapp, organized a workshop in March, with Dr. Jordan as guest speaker, which covered new developments in suicide epidemiology and prevention programs in the community and school settings, risk assessment and intervention with suicidal individuals, and guidelines for work with bereavement after suicide.

McLeod said that invitations were sent out to the municipality of West Elgin, but since Council could not attend, they offered to cover the cost of the books. With the books printed, the NKKF decided to donate a copy to the two local libraries to share the resource with everyone.

"We're happy to know this resource will be available in this community," said Shelly Fleming, Branch Supervisor at the West Lorne and Rodney libraries.



Dr. Jordan works in private practice in Wellesley, Main and Pawtucket, Rhode Island. He was the Founder and director of the Family Loss project until 2007, and has been specializing in work with suicide survivors for over 30 years. He said that suicide survivors frequently turn to mental health professionals and other caregivers in their community for advice and support, but many caregivers have very minimal training about suicide prevention or postvention (the

term used for helping people after a suicide has occurred).

"I was honored to have been asked to present at the conference, and salute the important work that Penny and other highly motivated survivors like her are doing to help bring suicide and its aftermath out of the darkness and into the awareness of the public," said Jordan. "Her efforts will help to prevent suicide in Ontario, and to reduce its traumatic impact on the families and friends left behind."

## Walking for awareness

The 3rd annual Suicide Awareness Walk marched through West Lorne September 5, inviting suicide survivors to symbolically let go of their grief and bring the issue of suicide into the light of day.

The walk was organized by the family of Nicholas Knapp, a West Lorne man who died by suicide in 2007. Many people who walked carried balloons with the names of loved ones written on them who died by suicide. The walk proceeded through the streets of West Lorne, ending in Miller Park behind the Scout Hall, where they released their balloons to the air.

"You can let go of that grief, let go of whatever it is you're walking for," said Melanie McLeod, one of the organizers.

The balloons were blue and purple, which McLeod said are colours used internationally for suicide awareness.

At the back of the procession of

walkers was Brian Dyck, who showed his support by driving his '97 Sunfire, which he plans to enter into the Demolition Derby at the Rodney Fair September 19.

"I see there's a need for [suicide] awareness in this community, in all communities," said Dyck.

Before the releasing of the balloons, Penny Knapp, Nicholas Knapp's mother, said a few words in front of the memorial tree in Miller Park about the need to be open about grieving.

"Often these emotions are new and unfamiliar, that grieving persons will not dare share them," she said. "This fear then drives them to greater isolation... Is it any wonder that it takes courage to grieve?"

## **Upcoming Nick Knapp golf tournament**

Dear Editor,

Nicholas, my younger brother, died by suicide at the age of 20, just over three years ago. As you can imagine, his death devastated our family, but we all pulled together, took action and vowed not to let Nick's death be in vain. What also saddened us were the suicide facts and stats; we just had to make a difference. Now, organizing our 4th annual Nick Knapp Memorial Golf Tournament (October 2, Wardsville Golf Club), we know we have a long way to go in raising awareness about Suicide and its prevention and post-vention, but we also know we are all doing a great job of advocating.

Thanks to all our sponsors and 156 golfers, last year's tournament helped us to fund so many new initiates.

It is our goal to make Suicide prevention awareness and funding for research become more available and accessible in local communities. Our Suicide Awareness Committee does just that and through our "Aftershock" support group, we have been able to provide support to the families who have also lost loved ones to Suicide.
