Prices of Cattle, Grain, Cheese and Other Produce at Home and Abroad.

Breadstuffs.

Toronto, June 2.—Flour—Ontario wheat flours, 90 per cent., \$3.30 to \$3.85, seaboard, and at \$3.85 to \$3.90, Toronto. Manitobas—First patents, in jute bags, \$5.60; do., seconds, \$5.10; strong bakers', in jute bags, \$4.

Manitoba wheat—Bay ports—No. 1 Northern, 99½c, and No. 2, 97½c. Ontario wheat—No. 2 quoted at \$1.04 to \$1.06, outside, and \$1.06, on track, Toronto.

Oats—No. 2 Ontario oats, 39½ to 40c, outside, and at 42c, on track, Toronto. Western Canada oats quoted at 42c for No. 2, and at 39½c for No. 3, Bay ports.

Peas—\$1 to \$1.05, outside. Barley—Good malting barley, 56 to 58c, according to quality.

Rye—No. 3 at 63 to 64c, outside. Buckwheat—88 to 90c, outside. Corn—No. 2 American, kiln-dried, 78½c, Toronto.

Bran—Manitoba bran, \$24 to \$26 a ton, in bags, Toronto freight. Shorts, \$26 to \$27.

Country Produce.

Butter—Choice dairy, 18 to 20c; inferior, 15 to 16c; farmers' separator prints, 20 to 22c; creamery prints, fresh, 23 to 24c; do., storage prints, 22 to 23c; solids, storage, 20 to 21c.

Eggs—21 to 23c per dozen, in case lots.

Honey—Extracted, in tins, 10½ to 11c per lb. Combs, \$2.25 to \$2.50 per dozen for No. 1, and \$2 for No. 2.

Cheese—New cheese, 14 to 14½c for large, and 14½ to 15c for twins.

Beans—Hand-picked, \$2.25 to \$2.30 per bushel; primes, \$2.10 to \$2.20.

Poultry—Fowl, 17 to 19c per lb.; chickens, 19 to 20c; ducks, 20c; geese, 15 to 16c; turkeys, 20 to 23c.

Potatoes—Delawares, \$1.20 on track here, and Ontarios at \$1.10 per bag, on track.

Baled Hay and Straw.

Baled hay—No. 1 at \$14.50 to \$15 a ton; on track here; No. 2 quoted at \$13 to \$13.25, and clover at \$10 to \$11.

Baled straw—Car lots, \$8.25 to \$8.50, on track, Toronto.

Provisions.

Bacon—Long clear, 14 to 14½c per lb. in case lots. Hams—Medium, 18 to 19c; do., heavy, 17 to 18c; rolls, 14½ to 15c; breakfast bacon, 18 to 19c; backs,

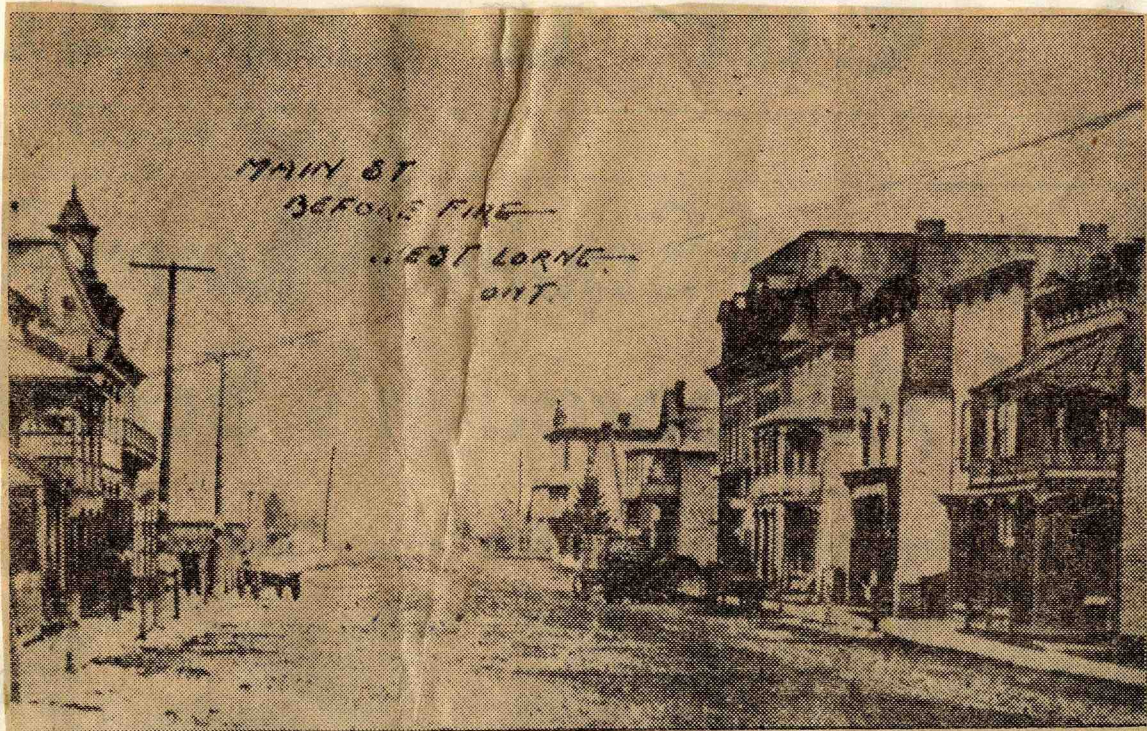

Roome's Hotel Was Early West Lorne Hostelry



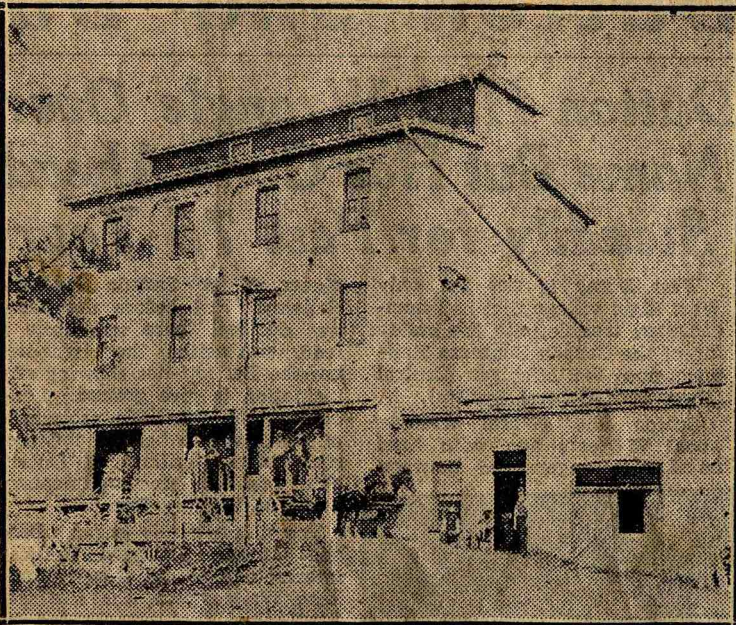

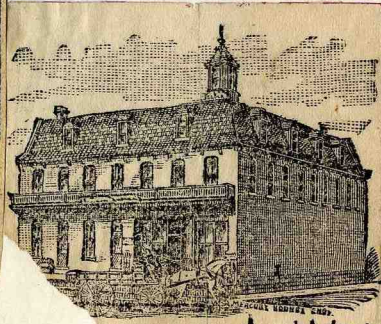
WEST LORNE'S COMMUNITY HALL



MAIN STREET, WEST LORNE, IN 1885 — The picture was taken looking south and the huge oak log was being taken to the McKillop sawmill, which stood just east of where the Pere Marquette station now stands. The men sitting on the log, from left to right, are: John Roach and J. A. McKillop; Daniel McKillop, one of West Lorne's oldest businessmen, and Duncan McPherson. The buildings in order from the foreground are: McKillop block; Alton building; Mettara building; E. R. Mogg building; Phillips building; Duncan McKillop building (West Lorne's first postoffice); Beaton block and residence (now Gibson's cigar store and billiard parlors). The east section of the street was burned out in 1900 and the west side in 1901.



The former West Elgin Milling & Produce Co., built in 1900 was one of West Lorne's first industries. The building was later known as the A. McKillop & Son Grain and Flour Mill and is now operated as the West Lorne branch of the Elgin Co-Operative Services.
