
MRS. FRANK (MARY) KASZA

She was fascinated to learn so much had been done by the pioneer ladies. The Women's Institute contributed many supplies to the soldiers during the war. She realized how much had been done for the good of the country.

Even though in the last few years there haven't been too many members, she felt it was a joy to meet with the ladies each month. She felt each time they met, she learned a little more about this great organization.



Mary Kasza, of London, was like a lot of East Enders in London, England, during the war dodging bombs on the way to work and trying to catch a few hours of sleep each night in the family's backyard Anderson shelter, an earth-covered semidugout about eight by five feet and tall enough to stand up in. Mary came to Canada in 1945 as a war bride of Frank Kasza, a soldier with the Essex Scottish.

he day war was declared, the sirens went off and we all rushed to the bomb shelters.

The heavy bombing started the next year. Many times I had to get off the bus on the way to or from work and take shelter.

One night we were caught in a raid and had to take shelter huddled up against a partly demolished building. Bombs were falling quite near. I felt something up against my foot, and when it finally got light, I saw it was a human arm, still in a sleeve.

We tried to sleep sitting up in the Anderson shelter at the foot of the garden. That went on for months and months.

I remember the rationing and the commradeship of neighbors who were always willing to help and share.
