
### **GIFTS**



Dr. Charles Bruce Cantelon was born in Lucknow, Ontario. His father was a banker. He received his elementary schooling in many schools in Ontario; Meaford, West Lorne, Toronto and Ridgetown.

Dr. Cantelon went to the University of Western Ontario Medical School. He interned at St.Joseph's Hospital in London.

Dr. Cantelon set up his first practice above the J.T. Lemon store on the west side of Graham Street. Later in the year he moved his office to the Campbell and Craig building which is about where the Krebz Jewellery store is today.

In 1949 Dr. & Mrs. Cantelon moved from their apartment on Main Street to their new home at 190 Graham Road and built an office attached to the house.

Dr. Cantelon's favourite sport is golf. He was a charter member of the West Lorne Kiwanis Club when it was organized in 1950. He served for a few years on West Lorne Council and he was coroner of Elgin County for over twenty-five years.

He has two sons from his first marriage, David and John. He later married Joyce (Miller) and has a step-son, John, and a daughter Catherine.

Dr. Cantelon retired in 1990. He spends a great deal of time golfing now. He was a truly dedicated family physician.

Mr. Lashbrook was not only kept busy attending council meetings, anniversaries, etc., but for one year he was presi-

dent of the Canadian Community Newspapers' Association.

The people gathered to honour this man also heard from his wife Shirley and daughters Heather, Jane and Laurie. They admitted that it wasn't always easy being the wife and children of a newspaper publisher, but the pride in their husband and father was always evident during their speeches.


Finally, it came time to hear from the guest of honour himself. "I'm flabbergasted to
