Rick Hansen is coming to our area.

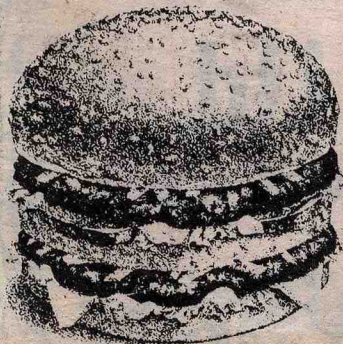

Latest information concerning Rick Hansen's arrival at Eagle is at 4:35 pm Thursday, where WESS students and others will greet him and present donations.

WESS Principal J. J. Prince states students will hold a walkathon to No. 3 highway that afternoon, and are collecting money for sponsorships.

WESES Principal Floyd Patterson said teachers would decide how and if students can be involved. However, at 4:35 special transportation would have to be arranged to return them to school, from where they would have to be picked up by parents.

Weather is also an unknown factor for children to walk that far, he pointed out.

Hansen will spend the night at Wardsville's Wagon Wheel Motel.

He is scheduled to resume his journey west from New Glasgow at 7:20 am Friday morning.

Sgt. Williams of the Dutton OPP Detachment, reports cruisers from there will lead and follow Hansen's entourage through the detachment's district.

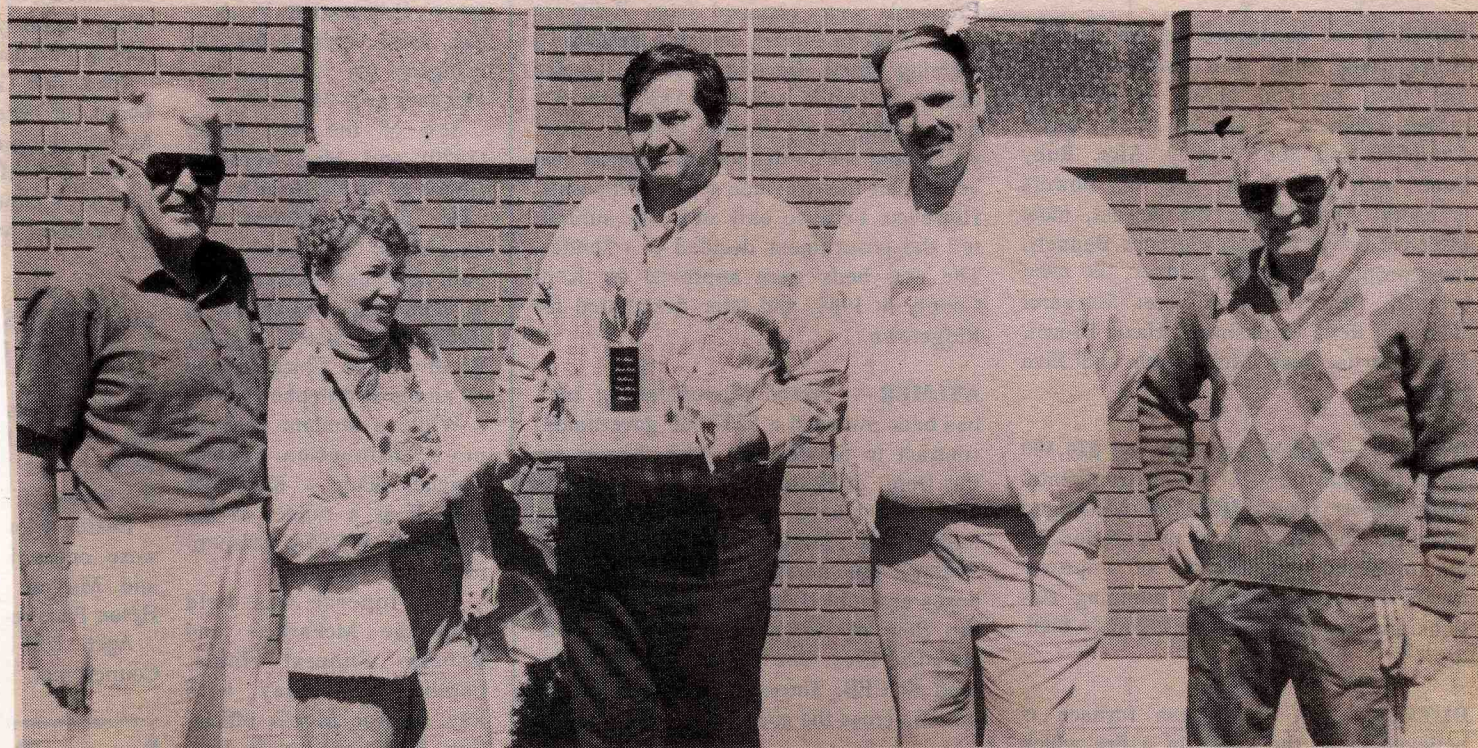

\$3,213 raised in WL's Great Cancer Ride; Rodney \$1,660

West Lorne Kiwanians' Great Ride for Cancer Sunday resulted in beating last year's total by over 50 percent — \$2,000 to \$3,213, which was twice the amount raised in Rodney's initial ride.

So the challenge trophy West Lorne Kiwanians made available was retained for their village.

Dutton's ride was supposed to have been organized by the Lions Club, but it did not materialize because the person in charge went on vacation, taking all the information with him.

Instead, Jim White of Emblematic Jewellery, a member of the Dutton club, and son, participated in the West Lorne "ride" and raised \$1,000.12.

That brought the total raised in the three villages to \$5,873.

Mr. White raised the greatest amount of money. Helen Mooser raised \$546 and Nancy Lashbrook \$516. Arnold Lee raised the most in Rodney \$207.

pleased with results of their initial ride. With that experience under their belts they hope to interest more than 24 riders next year, and in getting more sponsors.

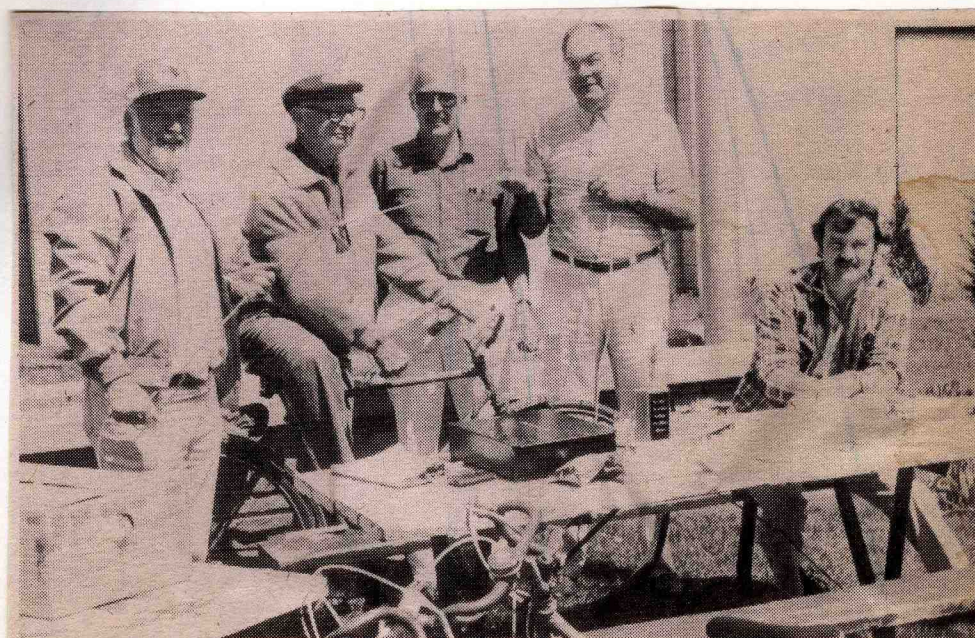
Lack of participation among high school students was obvious, which all three sponsors hope to be able to rectify next April.
