

Father Wm. G. Smith announces retirement; killed in car accident

The Sunday before Christmas Father William G. Smith surprised St. Mary's and St. Helen's parishes by announcing his retirement effective in the new year.

Before he could retire he was involved in a head-on car-bus crash south of Watford, killing him instantly Friday, December 30th.

He was southbound in his '75 Oldsmobile when he ran into the front of a Charterways bus in which the driver and two passengers were injured. His car was a complete write-off, and \$25,000 damage was done the bus.

After a post mortem the body rested in St. Mary's Church, where hundreds of parishioners and friends visited and paid their respects to the family. Prayers were said Sunday night.

. What was to have been the deceased's final services Sunday morning were taken by Father Clare Coleman.


The funeral Mass was said to a crowded church Tuesday at 11 am., with interment at 2:30 in Glanworth Cemetery.


EDUCATION

Studying music with the organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, he was the youngest organist at the church the summer he was converted to Roman Catholicism.






