



St. Mary's School in West Lorne opens new addition

The Separate School Board took a giant step last week when the new addition to St. Mary's School was opened to the delight of both parents and students.

The new addition to the school will now mean that sisters and brothers will be going to the same school from JK to grade eight for their elementary education and parents will no longer have to shuffle between Rodney and West Lorne if they have more than one child attending school.

The new \$1,000,000 addition to the school includes a new principal's office, an expanded teachers work room, complete with storage facilities, photocopiers and a quiet room. A large library and resource center and seven huge brightly lit classrooms. The new wing is equipped with the latest technological innovations including automatic fire doors, a computerized heating and air conditioning system which circulates the air in the classrooms

Use of natural light is also implemented with huge skydomes placed in the ceiling.

With the new addition the school has also expanded its playground, and when the new soccer fields are finished behind the school, St. Mary's will have access to them.


The transition from St. Thomas More to St. Mary's for the eighty students seem to have gone smoothly as students enjoy their new surroundings.





Week One: Teachers digging in

Teachers who teach at the four local schools say it's not about money. They say Bill 160 is a disastrous piece of legislation that will dismantle education and divide the system into two separate levels - private and public - and that it will allow noncertified people into classrooms to teach children.

On the first week of their political protest, teachers feel their hands are tied because of the government's refusal to recognize what this bill will do to education.

They said even criminals have an appeal process but with Bill 160, they are stripped of their rights to question any decision the government makes. They feel the chaos the education minister has created is a result of changing curriculum without teacher and parent input and allowing charter schools to pop up all over Ontario.

Principal of WESES, June Harkness, said the government is headed toward a system of elitism that is found in Britain, where those families with money attend private schools and the rest attend public schools. She feels it will create a "have and have not" situation thus ending the universality of education.

Many teachers demonstrating pointed to the fact in 1991 and 1992, Ontario scholars were globally recognized at the top of the academic field. The next year, the provincial government started chopping from the education budget. Children now have to share text books, librarians were let go, and shop and family studies were cut from the curriculum due to a lack of funding.

They feel comparative test results from China and Japan are skewed. In those countries, there is one language and one way of life. In Canada, many children of different cultures and languages are enrolled in the schools and teachers are given few resources to educate these children. Most English as a Second Language (ESL) programs have been dropped from schools in Ontario.

Also included in Ontario test results are students in resource programs. These children have their learning adapted to their special needs. In other countries, after Grade 6, special needs children are not included in test score results.

The teachers in this community said they want to be part of the consulting process when it comes to decisions affecting the children. Most of the teachers have never been from their desk as a result of a work action but felt it was necessary to inform the parents, students and the community on how Bill 160 will affect the classrooms in Ontario.

High school students protest Bill 104

Concerned about the potential impact of Bill 104 on their education, about half the student population of West Elgin Secondary School took to the streets last Thursday morning. Bill 104 is the legislation which will see the reduction of school boards across Ontario as of January.

Waving signs that read 'Kill the Bill,' '104 out the door,' and 'Save our Schools,' the students marched downtown where they staged an orderly protest, watched by police in a nearby O.P.P. cruiser.

The protest was organized by grade 12 student Sarah Simpson, who said it's the first time she's ever been so involved in something for her school.

She said the main reason for the protest was, "to prove a point to the community and the government. Just because we're not adults, it doesn't mean they don't have to consider our thoughts." Simpson said she's not opposed to the number of cutbacks to school boards. What she is upset about is the potential loss of programming at WESS as the school is swallowed up by the vast Elgin-London-Middlesex-Oxford (ELMO) School District.

Simpson said she's concerned that ultimately, programs such as art and music, as well as sports could become a thing of the past at WESS; victims of budget cuts. As a rural school on the outer fringe, Simpson doesn't feel there's any hope WESS will receive the same kind of advantages students in larger schools enjoy.

Many of the students participating in the walkout agreed.

Susan Dieleman said she's worried about the loss of extracurricular activities, and said, "we're already a small school that gets lost in the shuffle."

"It's our future at stake," said Margery Schostak, adding that the new school district boundaries don't bode well for WESS.

Dave Joyce said, "Bill 104 and other cutbacks could take away our secretaries, librarians, sports, drama... it just sucks."

Bill Dodge is concerned that the new school district will be, "uncontrollable." He said that, "the resources already don't make it here from St. Thomas," and that situation could only get worse once WESS comes under the umbrella of the ELMO school district.

Principal Martha Foster said she couldn't officially condone what the students did, but says personally she feels proud that they took a stand for something they believe in.

"Part of the education process involves teaching students to make informed decisions," she said. Copies of Bill 104, as well as a four-page precis were available to students who wanted to examine the Bill themselves.

Foster said students were reminded to, "know what you're doing and why." She said that anyone walking out just to walk out would make a farce of the protest.

Generally speaking, she said the majority of students taking part in the protest were well-informed about the Bill and were legitimately concerned about its potential impact on the school.

Following the first period protest, most students went back to their classes.



Tutor Time

Youth Tutors Elgin (YTE) are once again taking the fear out of learning and replacing it with fun with one-on-one tutoring, after school clubs and other programs. YTE is a Youth Service Canada project funded by Human Resources Development Canada and administered by the YWCA of St. Thomas-Elgin, The program is made up of 12 individuals who are out of school, out of work and between the ages of 18-24. They are hired full-time for a 30 week period. Three centres of operation - East, West and Central Elgin - have been established in order to meet literacy needs. The tutors for the West Elgin area are, from left, Tim Nelhams, Angela Larson, Suzie McKnight and Melissa Skirtschak. Along with visiting local schools, the four also work out of the West Elgin Health Centre. The program will be seeking volunteers to continue the program once the 30 week period ends in July. 







452 teachers laidoff

13 teachers lose jobs in West Elgin area

Due to the result of the government's new funding formula, 452 teachers in the newly formed Thames Valley District School Board were given their pink slips last week. The layoffs will take effect at the end of this school year.

"The Board is disappointed to have to issue these notices, and we regret the obvious impact on staff," said Heather Wice, chairperson of the Thames Valley District School Board. "We are hopeful that, as we continue to analyze the provincial formula, some of these teachers can be recalled."

The notices include 327 secondary teachers and 125 elementary teachers. Some of the individuals receiving their notices work part-time, therefore, the 452 notices equate to 404 full-time equivalent teachers jobs (303 secondary and 101 elementary). This now brings the number of full-time equivalent teaching jobs at the Board to 4,727.

Wice adds, however, that she remains concerned that fewer teachers will be available to provide support for programs and co-curricular activities in the schools while the student population continues to grow.

Of the 13 teachers laidoff in the West Elgin area, the breakdown is as follows:


